LONGFELLOW TRIAL IN PROGRESS

Gray Sutton, proprietor of Seven Springs hotel, testified that Longfellow and Miss Swift were registered at his hotel May 13th as J. Longfellow and wife.

H. M. McCoy said that on the day Longfellow was arrested in afternoon, they took dinner at the same table at a hotel in Kinston. He asked Longfellow where he was going to locate and the latter replied "we have not decided yet."

W. L. Shelton testified that Longfellow visited his store in Stantonsburg on the 17th of March and in a conversation told him he was going to marry a lady named Miss Bruce Swift.

At 6:10 court took a recess until 9:30 Friday morning. Kinston, N. C., 27th.—W. E. Mewborne was the first witness this morning for state, he testified to having conversation with Longfellow in Battleboro on April 8th.

When the case was called this afternoon the battle began in earnest. Mr. Moore for the defense offered four different motions, each in turn being overruled by Judge Ward.

The state here rested its case and defense then renewed motion for bill of particulars which the court refused. The defense then asked the admission of a sentence contained in affidavit by State that the alleged second marriage took place in Norfolk, May 1st.

The first witness called was Clerk of the Court Collins by whom was proven an affidavit setting forth Longfellow's first marriage.

The second witness was Mrs. Swift, mother of the young lady in the case. She testified that Longfellow first went to her home one night in March to ask her consent to his marriage to her daughter, Miss Bruce.

The entire morning showed a pretty fight between lawyers on both sides. Speeches of length this afternoon, but long as they were, they were well received.

LOSS OF JAPANESE LEAF TRADE

Some Facts and Figures According to Government Report—Trust Not to Blame—Throw Primings Away

It is currently reported that primings and low grade leaf of that type is bringing somewhat lower prices than in recent years. This condition is neither surprising nor alarming, and is readily accounted for.

Prior to the time the American Tobacco Company entered Japan we had very little trade on this grade of leaf in that country. With the advent of the American concern into the Japanese Empire, however, they quickly created a demand for cigarettes for the most part made of the type of tobacco in question.

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PITT SUPERIOR COURT.

Auxiliary Term for the Trial of Criminal Cases Now in Session.

The following cases have been disposed of: Arden Wilson, assault with deadly weapon and malicious injury to personal property, guilty in two cases, judgment suspended on payment of costs.

Leslie Blount, assault with deadly weapon, guilty, judgment suspended on payment of costs. In another case for carrying concealed weapon the verdict was not guilty.

Will Streeter, assault with deadly weapon and carrying concealed weapon, guilty. Samuel Brown, larceny, not guilty.

Will Streeter and Porzy Ruffin, perjury, both guilty, judgment suspended as to Ruffin. David Evans, assault with deadly weapon, guilty, sentenced ninety days on roads.

Louis Smith, assault with deadly weapon, and carrying concealed weapon, not guilty. Will Jones, Lum Cox, Alonzo Chapman and Henderson West, affray, all guilty, Jones fined \$10 and costs, the others \$5 and costs each.

Henry Staton, col. selling liquor unlawfully, pleads guilty in four cases. Charlie Vaughan, assault with deadly weapon, pleads guilty, sentenced three months to roads.

STATE NEWS.

Happening of Interest in North Carolina. A terrific hail storm struck a portion of Wilson county Sunday evening, doing much damage.

Rev. J. M. Dunaway has accepted a call to the pastorate of the First Baptist church of Wilson. Mrs. Troy Rouse, of Lenoir county, died a few days ago of pellagra.

Alexander Ruyter, of Cleveland county, was killed by lightning Sunday afternoon. Miss Musa Ellison, the Raleigh young lady who was recently severely injured in an automobile accident, is reported to be steadily improving.

While two Fayetteville young men were playing with a pistol, Saturday night, W. A. Ashworth accidentally shot and killed Daniel Jones. During a storm Sunday evening the residence of J. R. Creech, near Smithfield, was struck by lightning which set on fire and destroyed the building. Two other residences were struck.

The residence of M. C. Williamson, near Lucama, was struck by lightning Sunday evening and the building and contents destroyed by fire which followed. Harvey Ritchie, a young man of Stanley county, climbed a pole to see if he could get a shock by touching the electric wires. He was instantly killed.

George Stroude, a Confederate veteran of Oxford who attended the reunion in Charlotte last week, and was supposed to have left that city Friday morning, has not yet reached his home and his people feel much anxiety about him. Raleigh, N. C. Aug. 30.—Official announcement has come through the State superintendent of Public Instruction that the State Board of Education which holds the title to all the swamp lands of the state for the benefit of the state public school funds, has entered into an agreement with the people of the Mattamuskeet Lake section of Hyde county that the state board will drain the lake within a reasonable time or if it should sell, will require the purchaser to obligate to drain, the drainage to be accomplished through the formation of a drainage district under the terms of the drainage act of the recent legislature.

The Journal received a telephone message from Vanceboro yesterday telling of the tragic death of Mr. Samuel Sutton, a well-known white farmer who lived about eight miles from that town. Mr. Sutton, an elderly man, 80 years of age, was assisting in unloading a wagon of fodder, standing on top of the load, when he lost his balance, fell and broke his neck. Death ensued immediately. Much regret is expressed at his sudden and tragic end, as he was a man highly esteemed in his community.—Newbern Journal.
