## Baseball Tryouts Begin March 18

Spring is just around the corner and its roaring the time when the sound of a bat cracking against a ball will be quite familiar. Despite the frequent flow of liquid "sunshine" in these parts, the baseball season is starting to be felt.

According to Coach Smith, the first week in March will be a rest week for the team who are changing from winter to spring. On March 11 the future Pirate batteries will be called forth to show their form on the mound and behind the home plate. Regular practice for all try-outs will begin March 18, immediately following the spring holidays. No opinion has been given thus far as to how the team will shape up.

A schedule for the season has not been made but it will probably begin around April 1. Teams to be met by the Pirates will include A. C.
