"The band has played in several of the Greek functions and clubs downtown," said Karen Clough, assistant director of the alumni program.

"The Dickens Band is well liked by the student body. The Student Union helped us find and book them. The committee putting on the birthday party selected them," said Carolyn Thompson, coordinator of Centennial Planning. According to band's Web site, they "mix up classic R&B, classic and modern rock, 80s retro, reggae, old skool and current hip-hop, and everything in between. From Bob Marley to the Beastie Boys, Otis Redding to Outkast, the Stones to Snoop, Stevie Wonder to Sublime." Tax tips for college students

Receive a refund in less than 10 days

The two most popular methods for filing taxes are e-filing or a newer service called Free File. Free file was first introduced in 2003; it's a method available for any taxpayer who earns less than \$52,000 a year. In fact, last year alone more than 72 percent of taxpayers qualified for this service.

One of the main reasons Free File has become so popular is that by using this service, taxpayers can receive their refund within as little as 10 days.

"Most students should really consider e-file, because if they have all their information together e-file is a great way to do their taxes, it will walk them through the form and if they qualify they could get their refund within 10 days," said Mark Hanson, field media relations specialist for the Internal Revenue Service.

Hanson made it clear that even though e-filing is the easiest option, anyone using their computer needs to be especially careful when they are when punching in personal information.

Hanson said anyone filing needs to pay special attention to things like typing in the correct digits on social security numbers, putting in a new last name when married or rechecking any calculations for simple math errors.

Besides double-checking for mistakes, many students who are filing for the first time say they would prefer to use the Internet but are worried that their personal information may not be totally secure.

"I know that filing online is the easiest option, but the last thing I need is to fall prey to some ridiculous tax scam," said Cameron Todd, junior elementary education major.

What Todd is actually referring to is something Mark Hanson calls a "phishing scam." A phishing scam is when a person who filed their taxes online gets an e-mail or a phone call supposedly from the IRS, telling them that some of

E-filing tips

Want to e-file your taxes online? According to the Internal Revenue Service's Individual e-file Electronic Tax Filing Program Overview, you'll need to follow these steps.

- First, get all your tax information together. You'll save time and won't have to stop in the middle of preparing your return to find a missing document. You'll need:
 - Social Security numbers for yourself, your spouse and any dependents.
 - Forms W-2 from all employers are required for yourself and your spouse.
 - Forms 1099 for Dividends, Retirement, or other income, or any Forms 1099 with Income Tax Withholding.
 - Receipts for expenses for Itemized Deductions (Schedule A)
 - Receipts and records for other income or expenses
 - Bank Account numbers (for a fast refund, or to pay electronically)
 - Prior year Adjusted Gross Income amount or prior year PIN if using a Self-Select PIN as your signature
 - Complete information on what records you need, and how long to keep your records.
- Next, choose the method of e-filing that works for you
 - Tax Professional
 - Personal Computer
 - Free File

Last, but not least, e-file. If you are using a Tax Preparer, be sure to take all your information with you, and don't forget to ask for IRS e-file.

For those filing taxes online, just answer the simple questions in your tax preparation software, and the software will do the rest for you. For more information and tips, visit irs.gov/efile/article/0,,id=118451,00.html.

Buccaneer statue to premier at Pirate Fest

Sculptures will give local artists chance to be part of ECU history

Painted fiberglass animals like the Outer Banks' Winged Horses and the Cows of Wisconsin have become a huge craze in numerous cities around the United States. As a part of ECU's Pirate Fest celebration, the ECU Alumni Association and the Greenville Chamber of Commerce have teamed up to bring ECU its very own version of these decorated statues.

Many cities around the United States have chosen to embellish animals as a way to raise money for charity, or to celebrate special events in their hometowns. Running with these ideas, various members of the ECU Centennial Planning Task Force came up with a public art project that they felt would honor ECU's 100th birthday and at the same time reflect Pirate Pride.

The task force decided that instead of bringing in statues of animals, which may not relate to the ECU pirate theme, they would hold a contest asking artists to submit sketches of pirates.

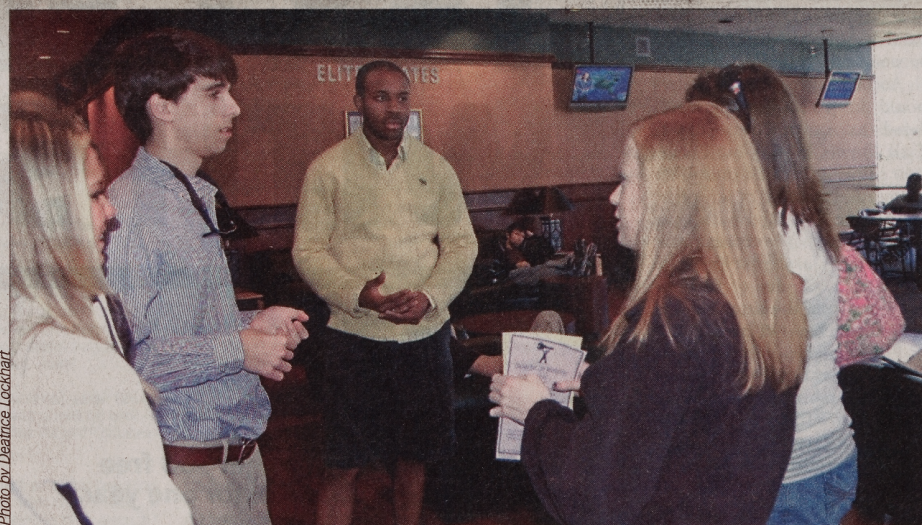
Receiving upwards of 60 entries, the university selected Glen Eure's sketch of a pirate holding a sword and wearing an eye patch. Eure is a 75-year-old ECU art school alumni and well-known Nags Head artist.

Eure's drawings of a pirate from the front, back and side angles have been sent to "Cowpainters," the Chicago based company responsible for creating the molds for more than 160 exhibitions of this kind around the United States.

"We did a call for entries and now we are having a prototype made by Cowpainters in Chicago, Ill., they should arrive as white fiberglass in their natural state, from there we'll have artists and sponsors create the next leg of this project," said Carolyn Brown Thompson, coordinator of Cen-

The purpose of SGA representatives is to participate in decisions affecting the student body and primarily to act in the best interests of the student body.

Every class has a president and a class council, which can include up to nine students. The senior class president Brandy Sherrer came into office after Nadia Payne resigned.

"My goals for the senior class are to prepare for the senior class gift, which is a benefit dinner which will be at the end of April. I also want to raise money for the senior scholarship endowment. I want to get a professor from every department to nominate a student for the outstanding student award, which will be given out at the end of the semester to acknowledge their achievements. Another one of my goals is to work with the Alumni Association and keep in contact with them," said Sherrer.

When asked what she does that directly benefits the senior class she stated, "I do workshops to help interested seniors with different ideas, for example, financing and budgets, networking, just 'real world' things. I just want to be visible to the senior class at school events, like games. I am also open to student ideas to take them to the higher officials."

Eka Isangedighi, senior family and community services major, expressed her feelings about being invited to meet her senior class president.

"I do not feel like she has done anything for our class. The semester is almost over and she just now sent an e-mail about coming out to meet her; we are about to graduate, why should we care to meet her now?" said Isangedighi.

Kelly Shelton is the junior class president for the 2006-2007 academic year.

"My main goal is the Success for Life Workshop. They include two real world workshops. One is in March, which is the networking workshop, and the other one is in April, which is the finances workshop," said Shelton.

When asked what she does on campus to help the junior class she stated, "The Success for Life workshops and trying to build up SGA and get more student involvement especially between the junior class and SGA." Sherrer and Shelton both have plans to work for Service N.C., which is a week long event that competes against other universities doing different service projects.

Since the sophomore class president resigned, SGA has been looking for an officer to fill the position. For another president to be selected, the SGA president has to select two names and do background checks for eligibility. Next, the student Congress votes to elect someone.

The freshman class president for the 2006-2007 academic year is Patrick Sebastian.

"My goal for this year is to build unity within the freshman class, I did this by supporting the Support for Life Workshops. I also go to events to put a face with the officer. They elected us to work for them and we just want to serve every constituent," said Sebastian.

When asked what he thinks is most important in being the freshman class officer, Sebastian stated, "Having good communication. I get about 10 to 15 e-mails a week, with people asking me questions. I answer them all within a few days. You have to be on your level. I'm just like them. I'm no more experienced than they are, I am right there with them."

Brent Richards, freshman sports studies major, said he was unsure what his class officer did.

"I have seen him around a few times but I never knew exactly what he does for the freshman class. I know that there are always a lot of activities being held on campus but I usually don't know which organization is sponsoring it," said Richards. Although Richards was unsure of his class president's role, other freshmen feel differently.

"I really appreciate the effort of the class officers to communicate with students," said freshman, hospitality management major, Taylor Suttle.

SGA members are seeking individuals to serve on the class councils for every class, with the exception of the freshman council, which is already full. The class council is a vital component since they help improve the lines of communication between the SGA and the student body.

Michael Harris, freshman councilman, stressed the importance of getting involved on campus early on.

"It is extremely important for freshman to get involved their first two years of college because it helps them to become aware of their surroundings."

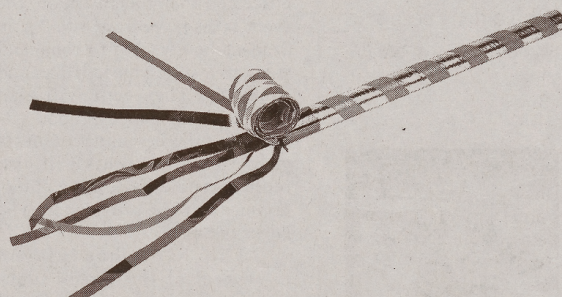

the information on their electronic tax return application was incorrect and that they need to provide additional information in order to better process their tax return.

Hanson also said that phishing scam-artists will also send out e-mails asking for more personal information from tax-payers, saying in the e-mail that the information is needed to send the tax payer more money for their refund than originally intended.

Hanson made it clear that students need to be especially careful about these types of situations because many hackers target e-mail addresses ending in ".edu."

A few things to keep in mind when figuring out if you are falling prey to a phishing scam is to realize the IRS would never send out unsolicited e-mails and taxpayers will not be asked by the IRS to provide credit card numbers, checking account or savings account numbers over e-mail.

However, if you are unsure about an e-mail that claims to be from the IRS, you can forward it to phishing@irs.gov, or you could call the IRS 800 number at 1-800-

tax-1040.

"There are predators who prey on people who have good intentions and we don't want people to fall for these scams. A lot of these scams originate overseas and they can really be a problem," Hanson said.

According to IRS.gov, filers should "keep a copy of your completed tax return. Keep Copy C of all Forms W-2, your Forms 1099 showing interest and other income, and a record of any other information you filed with your return. Keep these records for at least three years from the date your return was due or filed, or two years from the date you paid the tax, whichever is later."

Filing can be a simple process if you understand what you're doing. For more information on how to easily file, go to the IRS Web site and type in "tax information for students." A page will come up that easily outlines any questions or concerns you may have.

ennial Planning. That next "leg," that Thompson is referring to is the painting or decorating stage of this art project.

When the model is unveiled on April 14, the last day of the Pirate Fest celebration, the large statue will be unpainted, as a way to provide a clean "canvas" for a local artist to decorate. The task force is inviting artists to come out to the Pirate Fest with sketches ready to submit.

"We'd love to have at least 40 pirates [created] if not more, it all depends on how many sponsors and entries we can get," said Thompson.

The Centennial Task force is hoping that local businesses will team up with the artists

selected to decorate the 6-foot tall fiberglass pirates, and sponsor their work.

Once both sponsor and artist have been paired up, the final product will either be displayed in front of the business, which gave the sponsorship, or at another selected area around the Greenville community.

Thompson said that she and all members of the task force are hoping that by this time next year all of the pirate statues will have been painted and that for the 2008 Pirate Fest celebration they can hold "a long parade of painted pirates with them all dressed in their artist's glory."

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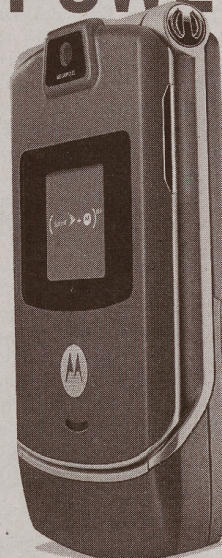

Whose tomb is it, anyway?

Casual sex among college students

College-aged students often have numerous relationships in a short period of time, allowing themselves to meet a variety of

people but not forming romantic attachments with each one. This situation can lead to the practice of having casual sex or sexual activities outside the context of a romantic relationship that consist of a range of informal sexual encounters.

While many students consider this to be a common practice with no real problems, many are

not aware of the physical and emotional harms these kinds of relationships can cause.

"People come to college to figure out the type of person they want to become and the type of people they want to be with," said Tara Grissom, freshman political science major "You can't really grow as a person without allowing yourself to try out dif-

ferent things and get to know different people."

While creating strong bonds with peers and meeting new people are key elements students seek when attending college there are several aspects that each individual must consider before making the decision to be sexually active at this period in their lives.

"Many students are careless

when it comes to the practice of safe sex," said registered nurse Donna Turner. "This can lead to the contraction of sexually transmitted diseases and unwanted pregnancies that can affect the rest of your life."

The fact that many college-aged students often drink in social settings is also a factor associated with the practice of casual sex.

"Being under the influence of alcohol lowers inhibitions one might normally feel when considering having a sexual encounter," Turner said. "Students often make poor decisions at these times without thinking of the consequences that may arise after the night has come and gone."

A study done in a recent publication of the Journal of Sex Research, "No Strings Attached: The Nature of Casual Sex in College Students" with a sample of 404 undergraduate students at a large public university in the southeastern United States shows that more than half of the participants surveyed actually engaged in the practice of casual sex.

"In general casual sex is associated with depression, etc. However, often it is a symptom of esteem or other issues rather than a root cause," said Associate Communication Professor Dr. John Howard. "The major negative impact of casual sex for those people is they are often seeking validation that, by definition, can only be temporary."

The study from the Journal of Sex Research also concludes that college-aged women who have a history of casual sex tend to feel more depressive symptoms after

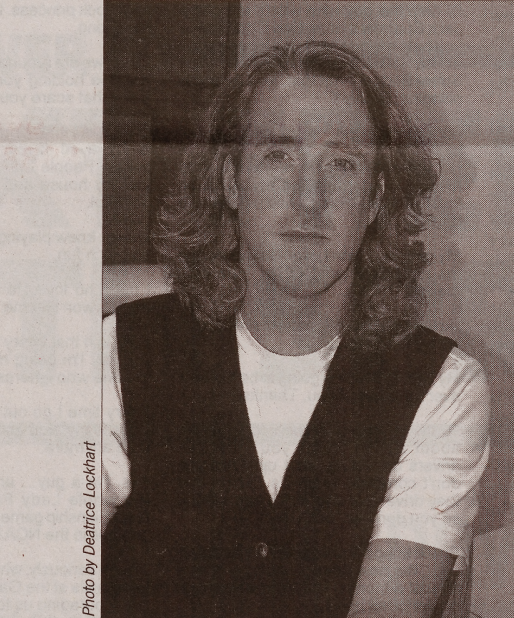

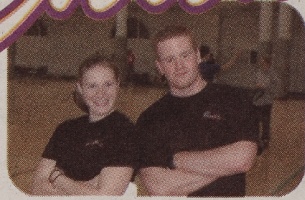

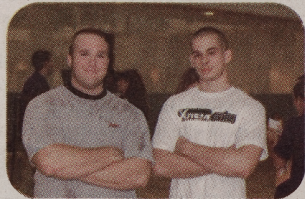

their sexual experiences than men do.

A reason cited for this conclusion is that often one of the persons engaging in the practice of casual sex expects that a romantic relationship will evolve from the act. When a romantic relationship doesn't result, the negative feelings created oftentimes lead to lowered self-esteem and depression.

"It isn't unusual for people who engage in such behaviors to feel guilt, remorse or even shame for their actions," Howard said. "Such feelings can fuel further depression and esteem issues."

While the practice of casual

sex with various partners seems to be present everywhere, many students still believe that waiting for the right person, chosen based on personality and compatibility is the best way for them.

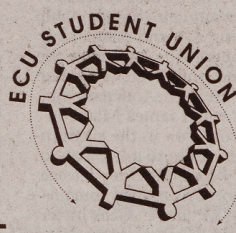

Newcomer proud to wear purple and gold

Defensive lineman Khalif Mitchell drops the Carolina blue

Khalif Mitchell walked across the turf at the Pirates football practice complex with a gigantic smile that makes his presence heavily felt among the other players. The 6-foot-6, 320-pound transfer from the University of North Carolina couldn't be any happier.

Mitchell, a Virginia Beach native who didn't start playing football until his junior year of high school, started two games for the Tar Heels as a freshman, recording 15 tackles [4.5 which were for loss], 1.5 sacks and one forced fumble. As a sophomore in 2005, he tallied 13 tackles, two fumble recoveries, and four quarterback hurries.

Perhaps Mitchell's biggest contribution to the North Carolina program came on Oct. 9, 2004 as the UNC defense lined up against rival N.C. State on its own one-yard line. As Jay Davis took the snap and handed off to T.A. McClendon, Mitchell burst through the Wolfpack's front seven and hit McClendon in midair forcing a fumble and sealing a Tar Heel win. "The Play" as it's referred to is one of the most significant in the North Carolina football program's history.

"Oh man, I remember that play like yesterday," Mitchell exclaimed with laughter.

"There's one thing on the Carolina board; it's still there today because I wrote it in permanent marker," said Mitchell. "It said, if you play hard then you will win. I put 'if you believe you will win'."

"I just went out there and said to myself they're not going to score, and it didn't matter whether it was me or the guy across the field, they're not going to score," said Mitchell as he recalled the play he is most remembered for. "I just believed we were going to win. I didn't even know he fumbled, I just knew he didn't cross the line because I took two steps up and that's all I needed."

Mitchell appeared to be on the verge of greatness, but shortly

before the 2006 season former UNC head coach John Bunting issued a statement announcing that Mitchell was no longer part of the team.

"He will not be with us this fall," Bunting said according to the statement, without providing the reason for Mitchell's departure. "Khalif's a good kid who has a lot of potential both on and off the field."

While rumors stirred around Chapel Hill and Internet message boards all across the region, Mitchell disappeared without a trace.

"I want to say factually, I didn't get dismissed from Carolina," Mitchell stated. "I left Carolina. It just wasn't for me anymore. I just felt like I needed a change."

Mitchell said a lot of thought went into the decision.

"I talked to my family about it, I made sure I took a lot of time to think about it," said Mitchell. "I love Carolina; I still love Carolina. I was there for two years so I took time to think about it. When I thought about it, it was the right thing to do."

While Mitchell eventually found his way to ECU, that wasn't always the plan.

"I was actually about to go to Arkansas," Mitchell said. "I had a good relationship with coach [Houston] Nutt."

Mitchell hesitates before revealing why he didn't end up with the Razorbacks.

"When it came down to academic credits, I had done a lot of schoolwork at North Carolina. When the credits transferred over to Arkansas, they wouldn't have transferred over to get me the amount of credits that I'd worked for."

Mitchell said that coach Nutt advised him not to come to Arkansas because of the credit situation. So Mitchell looked for a second opinion from a couple of trusted friends and mentors. He spoke to his former Hargrave Military Academy coach.

Finally he sought advice from close friend Marcus Hands. Hands is an ECU defensive lineman who went through a very similar situation as Mitchell.

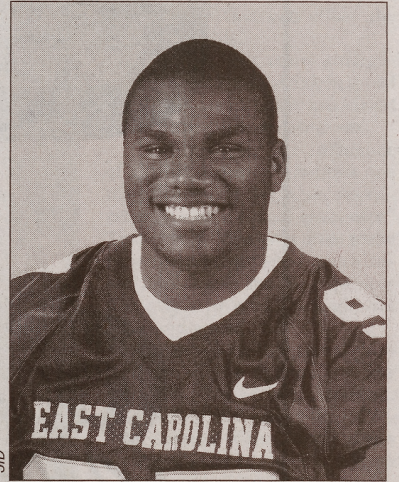

and the guys," said Mitchell. "I got to talking to the coaches and the next thing you know I came here [ECU] and I'm loving it."

One person that certainly isn't upset with Mitchell's decision to transfer to ECU is Pirates Head Coach Skip Holtz. At a pre-spring football press conference, the third year head coach mentioned Mitchell as player to specifically look out for.

"He plays with a passion, an excitement, an enthusiasm and emotion. He plays the game the way it's supposed to be played," said Holtz. "He plays it and he's all heart. I'm really excited; I think he is one of the guys that has a chance to make a real splash this year."

After transferring, Mitchell has learned that Coach Holtz is totally different from what coach Bunting was like during his tenure at UNC.

"Coach Bunting was a great guy," Mitchell said of his former coach. "He was very, very different; he's from the NFL, so obviously the coaches in the NFL are a lot more stern; more business friendly."

"Coach Holtz is more of a friend to people. If I catch coach Holtz walking outside I might go jump on him or something. You know I couldn't do that with coach Bunting because he is more

about business and serious," said Mitchell. "I can just come out here and relax and relate to coach [Holtz] a lot better. He understands that I came from Carolina. He understands that there is a lot of tension since [the teams are] close. So he just made the process a lot easier."

Mitchell had to sit out last year due to transfer rules and considers it a blessing.

"I had a chance to try out different moves, try out different scenarios," Mitchell said of using the redshirt time to his advantage. "I started loving practice. It was the only time I could put on pads, so I fell in love with practice. It showed me how to polish up my skills and be a better player."

When he returns to the field for the 2007 season, Mitchell wants to prove to his new, as well as old coaches, that he can bounce back.

"My personal goals for the season are just to take all the coaching I've learned from both coach Browning over at Carolina and coach Thompson over here at East Carolina and just show both of those guys that I'm the type of player that when you coach me I'm going to learn it, go ahead and get it right, and polish up on it," Mitchell said. "The one thing I want people to gain from me, if

they can say something, is that "he was resilient against odds."

The Tar Heels will make their way to Dowdy-Ficklen Stadium for the first time since 2003 on Sept. 9.

While having thought about the clash since transferring from UNC, Mitchell banished the thoughts from his mind as soon as spring practice began.

"I dreamt about it everyday until today," Mitchell said on the opening day of spring practice. "I'm like everybody else now; I'm not redshirting anymore so I have to worry about Virginia Tech first. That's still a rivalry for me because I'm from Virginia Beach, so that's the "boys" I worked against [in high school]. I'm just taking it a game at a time."

Mitchell added that there's no question he is looking forward to playing some of his former teammates.

"When Carolina comes around I'll tell you how I feel about that," he said. And with that, Mitchell walks off the turf in the chill of the early spring night and is finally exactly where he wants to be; wearing the purple and gold.

ECU women's tennis holds court at home

Pirates extend winning streak to three

The ECU women's tennis team pulled out a 4-3 victory against the previously unbeaten Coastal Carolina Chanticleers Friday, Feb. 23, and defeated the Wofford Terriers 5-2 last Saturday morning. The Pirates prevailed in both matches despite nagging injuries and illnesses. The victories improved the Pirates record this season to 11-5 and dropped the Chanticleers to 6-1 and the Terriers to 1-5.

"We played hard, were beat up a little bit and were not playing our best tennis," said Pirates Head Coach Tom Morris. "Everybody played hard, maybe not well, but they played hard."

The Pirates started out the match against Coastal Carolina by winning the doubles point with wins by the tandems of Luiza Borges with Mireia Gol, and Alex Smith with Brooke Walter. The doubles point made the difference, as the teams split the six singles matches.

In singles play, Borges defeated Coastal Carolina's Amy Pazahanick (6-0, 4-6, 6-1) and Varinia Soler defeated Sofie Ahlberg (4-6, 7-6, 6-2) for crucial three set victories. The other Pirate singles victory came from Gol who defeated Sarize Coetzee (7-5, 6-3).

Morris applauded Soler's come from behind victory after the match.

"Soler lost the first set and was just battling in the whole second set, but she got through it and [won] the tiebreaker and really opened a door for us [by winning] the third set."

Against the Terriers the Pirates doubles duos of Borges with Gol and

Soler with Anca Dumitru swept the Terriers to earn the doubles point. Singles victories by Gol, Borges and Brooke Walter clinched the win for the Pirates.

The team showed remarkable perseverance by defeating a quality opponent like Coastal Carolina.

"About half the team is struggling with something, in terms of injuries or illness," said Morris. "It's always a challenge with Coastal, you know they're going to play well... they have a good, strong team that's going to fight hard. Usually the team that fights hardest gets a little lucky and gets the win, and that was us today."

The wind blew especially hard during the Coastal Carolina match on and clearly effected play.

"It affects some player's games more than others, but nobody plays well in the wind, that's why it is so important to fight and not let it bother you and keep focusing," Morris said. "Nobody likes playing in the wind, you'd much rather play in the cold than the wind, but it affects both teams."

The women's tennis team is now in the midst of a 12-day break from competition. Their next match is Thursday March 15 at South Carolina State. The time away from competition comes at a good time for the team.

"We've played an awful lot of tennis up to this point," said Morris. "Now we have a little bit of a break where we can really practice and focus."

The Pirates loaded schedule to this point in the season is evidenced by the fact that they have already played twice as many matches as Coastal Carolina and Wofford at this point in the season. The team hopes to use the time off to improve in practice and recover from injuries.

"Hopefully we can get some good practice in the next few weeks," Morris said. "Were going to use that time to get healthy and improve."

(SID)—ECU sophomore Stephen Batts collected a pair of hits, scored and drove in a run, and senior Jason Neitz fanned 4-of-7 batters he faced as the Pirates picked up a midweek win against in-state foe N.C. A&T, 7-4 inside Clark-LeClair Stadium.

Neitz, who improved to 2-0 on the year, came in to relieve starter Bailey Daniles in the top of the fifth with two outs and the bases loaded. The crafty lefty struck out Joe McIntyre on four pitches, getting the Pirates (8-6) out of the jam.

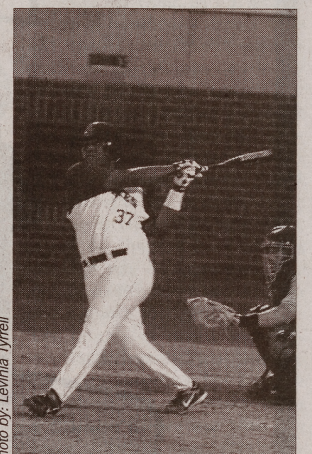
Daniels worked 4 2/3 innings, allowing one run on four hits with five strikeouts and three walks.

Brett Butts and Josh Ruhlman combined for one shutout inning before giving way to Mike Flye, who faced four batters, giving up three runs on three hits. Closer Shane Mathews notched his fourth save of the year after working a scoreless ninth inning.

For the Aggies (2-8), John Primis dropped to 0-2 on the season after working 7 1/3 innings. He allowed five runs (two earned) on four hits, while walking four and striking out three on 117 pitches.

The Pirates pushed three runs through in the bottom of the third to take an early 3-0 lead. Corey Kemp started off the inning when he reached base on a throwing error by Nick Mayo, which advanced Kemp to second. After David Forbes followed Kemp with a walk, Ryan Wood reached on another Aggie throwing error, which scored Kemp from second. Harrison Eldridge scored Forbes from third on a ground out to second base. The Pirates scored their final run of the inning when Dale Mollenhauer singled up the middle scoring Wood.

N.C. A&T scored its initial run in the top of fifth inning when Mayo doubled to left-center and scored Neil Rosser to put the game at 3-1. Rosser reached first after

being struck by a Bailey fastball. Lester Rivenbark singled to third base moving Rosser to third setting the run.

ECU added another run in the bottom of the sixth inning, extending the lead to 4-1. Henderson singled up the middle, stole second base and crossed the plate on Stephen Batts single to left field.

Ryan Tousley, Kyle Roller and Kemp each collected hits in the bottom of the eighth inning that scored runs to push ECU's lead to 7-1. Mollenhauer walked to lead off the frame, stole second and scored on Tousley's single to center. After Tousley got caught stealing third, Batts singled to left, stole second and scored on Roller's double to right field. Kemp capped off the scoring with a single to left that plated Roller.

The Aggies plated three runs in the top of the ninth inning pulling within three, 7-4, before Mathews came in to close the game.

ECU will continue its home stand this weekend when they host No. 6 Cal State Fullerton in a three game series. First pitch Friday night is scheduled for 5 p.m. when T.J. Hose and Wes Roemer take the mound.

ECU men's basketball to open journey play against Tulsa

The Pirates and Golden Hurricane set to square off tonight

(SID)—Twelfth-seeded ECU will take on fifth-seeded Tulsa tonight at 9:30 p.m. EST in the first round of the 2007 C-USA Men's Basketball Championship presented by Aeropostale, March 7-10, at FedExForum in Memphis, Tenn.

The winner will face No. 4 seed Tulane Thursday night at 9:30 p.m. in the quarterfinals.

The Pirates suffered a 67-49 loss to the Golden Hurricane in Tulsa on January 10 to open

conference play. Junior Darrell Jenkins led ECU with 15 points, while Tulsa guard Rod Earls led all scorers with 25 points, hitting 7-of-9 three-point attempts. The Pirates trailed by one at halftime, 33-32, but after shooting 60 percent in the first half shot just 29.4 percent after halftime and were outscored 34-17.

Regular season champion Memphis will be the No. 1 seed. As the top seed, Memphis will have a first-round bye at the tournament. Other teams receiving first-round byes include No. 2 UCF, No. 3 Houston and No. 4 Tulane. Other Wednesday first round match-ups feature

No. 7 Rice vs. No. 10 UTEP at 1 p.m., No. 6 Southern Miss vs. No. 11 SMU at 3:30 p.m., and No. 8 Marshall vs. No. 9 UAB at 7 p.m. ET.

In Thursday's quarterfinal round, No. 2 UCF will take on the winner of the Rice-UTEP game at 1 p.m. and No. 3 Houston will face the winner of the Southern Miss-SMU match-up beginning at 3:30 p.m. No. 1 seed Memphis will take on the winner of the Marshall-UAB game at 7 p.m.

The quarterfinal and semifinal rounds will be televised by CSTV with Saturday's championship game scheduled to air on CBS at 11:30 a.m.

Fields named to the C-USA All-Freshman Team

ECU rookie ranks second in the league in field goal shooting

(SID)—ECU forward John Fields has been named to the C-USA All-Freshman team as voted upon by the league's 12 head coaches and select media members announced league officials Tuesday.

Fields is the fifth Pirate to earn all-freshman team honors during ECU's six-year membership in C-USA.

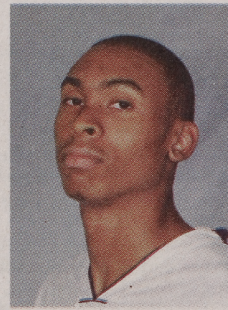
Fields has the fifth-highest scoring average among all conference freshmen (9.5 ppg) and the second highest rebounding average (5.88 rpg), second only to fellow freshman and teammate Gabe Blair (7.0 rpg). He ranks second overall in the league in field goal shooting (.627) and fourth in blocked shots (1.96), a category in which he has ranked among

the national leaders all season.

Fields is joined on the all-freshman team by Jeremy Wise and Sai'Quon Stone of Southern Miss, Tulane's Kevin Sims and Tulsa's Ben Uzoh. Wise was voted the league's Freshman of the Year and currently ranks fourth in C-USA for scoring, averaging 17.6 ppg, and free throw percentage (.828). Stone and Uzoh are also scoring in double figures with a 10.3 ppg average. Sims averages 9.9 points and 3.5 assists per game for the Green Wave.

The league also revealed its other specialty award winners Tuesday. Senior Jeremy Hunt and junior Joey Dorsey of the fifth-ranked Memphis Tigers were selected the Sixth Man of the Year and Defensive Player of the Year, respectively.

Joining Dorsey on the All-Defensive squad is teammate Antonio Anderson, seniors Paul Delaney III of UAB and Oliver

Lafayette of Houston, as well as sophomore Bamba Fall of SMU. Lafayette is pocketing 2.5 steals per game this season to lead C-USA and rank 15th nationally. Delaney (1.90 spg) and Anderson (1.83) are ranked second and third in the conference. Fall was averaging a league-best 2.58 blocks per game before being sidelined by a broken finger in February.

Johnson was later named the tournament Most Valuable Player.

This is Johnson's first career weekly C-USA honor. She is the first Pirate to receive C-USA Hitter-of-the-Week since Ashley Quick was given the award for the week of Feb. 13, 2006.

"J.J. (Jessica Johnson) was clutch all weekend coming up with key hits that drove in runs for us," associate head coach Natalie Kozlowski said. "Her power was impressive as she showed great patience and discipline at the plate. Every time we needed that big hit, J.J. (Johnson) delivered. She is maturing as a hitter and has proven to be very dangerous in the box."
