SATURDAY.—Liverpool advices show Market opening quiet, closing steady at 11 3/8d. for Middling Uplands, with sales of 12,000 bales.—Our Market quiet, and we reduce quotations 1/2 cent per pound.—Sales, 900 bales.

MONDAY.—Liverpool advices not received until after the close of the Market.—Our Market steady but generally quiet—the sales were embraced in a few lines and reached 1,730 bales and unchanged quotations.

TUESDAY.—Liverpool advices of yesterday's Market show Market opening firm but quiet, becoming easier, and closing at a decline of 1/8d. per pound; sales, 12,000 bales; Middling Uplands, 11 1/4d. This day's advices show Market opening quiet and easier, becoming very dull and heavy, closing quiet with sales of 10,000 bales, at 11 1/8d. for Middling Uplands.—Under these advices our Market was dull and prices declined 1/2 cent per pound.—Sales, 630 bales.

WEDNESDAY.—Liverpool advices show Market tending downward at the opening, becoming quiet and steady with firm prices, closing quiet at 11d. for Middling Uplands, sales, 10,000 bales.—Our Market more active but at lower prices; the demand was for export and for spinners.—Sales, 2,500 bales.

THURSDAY.—Liverpool advices show Market opening quiet and steady, closing quiet with sales of 10,000 bales at 11d. for Middling Uplands.—Our Market quiet; prices unchanged; sales, 1,000 bales for export and to spinners.

FRIDAY.—Liverpool advices show Market opening quiet, continuing steady at 11d. for Middling Uplands, sales 10,000 bales. Sales, for the week, 69,000 bales, of which 20,000 were for export and 2,000 on speculation. Stock in Port, 774,000 bales, of which 439,000 bales are American, being a decrease in total stock for the week of 52,000 bales, and of American, 18,000 bales.—Our Market a little more active, but without improvement in prices.—Sales, 1,930 bales.

Our Market for the week has been dull and heavy and prices have declined 1 1/2 cents per pound from the closing prices of last week, closing quiet but steady at quotations. Holders are unwilling to sell freely at present prices, and the amount of Cotton offering on the Market is small. The demand is entirely from spinners and exporters. The exports for the week are light, being only 3,053 bales. The engagements for next week, 2,490 bales. Freights by steam, 3/8d. dull; by sail, 5-32d., dull.

We have this week again taken an account of the stock of Cotton at this Port, visiting every warehouse in New York and Brooklyn in which Cotton is stored, also every pier on which Cotton is received, and find the stock to be as follows:
