Dear Elias

Without any of kind favors  
to reply and at the request of Mr.  
Solomon Williams I write you a few  
hurried lines to ask you to send up to  
me the Bond you hold against W B  
Carr. <sup>Mr. Williams</sup> He thinks Mr. Kearney will pay  
off the Bond Mr. W. H. A. Kearney owes  
W B Carr where Mr. Clements is security,  
by a credit on the Bond Mr. Kearney  
holds against you - I myself, don't think  
it is necessary for you to send the Bond,  
if you do, take a copy & send the original  
by Express, to care of Parker Watson & Co.  
All that is necessary, is for you to say  
that you will credit Bills Bond, if the  
arrangement is made, & I have very



little doubt, but that it will be made and it  
ought to be made Please write promptly —

You promised to write, but have never  
had a line, think you might have written

We have had delightful weather & made  
a fine crop of Corn, Cotton about as I  
expected rather short. shall finish  
housing every thing in a few days —

I am busy moving the old House from Mr  
Sol Williams plantation (the White Springs place)  
to Franklin for Buck, who bought 100 acres  
from A. D. Williams on the Ransom's Bridge  
Road. about  $\frac{3}{4}$  of a mile from Gov. All. place
