My Dear Cou^t,

Myrtle Lawn Febry 21st 1869

Yours of the 13th Inst. was rec^d
a few days ago; was glad to hear you were
all well. I told Whit. I would answer your
letter to day; he wishes me to say to you, that
he is very much obliged. for your kindness in
being mindful of, and offering him the chance
to attend to your farm &c - but that he and
the boys have been very busy in making Compost
& preparing for a Cotton Crop at home. I do not
think they will make an Edge Comb Crop, but they
think they can make 15 Bales. I would be pleased
for Whit to be with you on your farm - hoping
he might be benefited by your good management,
but think he will do better this year, at home, as
he has already done a good deal towards making
a Crop - he is now sowing Oats.

I saw Mrs. Kearny a few days ago - her health is
only tolerable. - My own family are well &
join in love &c - to you all -
