Sept 6th 1876

My Darling Wife,

I was disappointed at not receiving a letter this morning and have concluded you went to Shady Grove on Sunday and did not get back in time to mail a letter Monday morning - Hope to get one of double length in the morning to compensate for the disappointment. I have been busy to day, about the house most of the time - Potting and repotting the house plants, transferring the Hyacinths and Tulips to their new bed (which I know they will appreciate - as I made

it with my own hands,
and canning fruit. I got
a dozen 2[#] cans yesterday
and found one old one but
all of which I filled, with
Tomatoes and apples. If they
keep, and I can tell in a
day or two, I will get more
and pick up some cotton,
of which there is a great
quantity just in the right
condition. My last planting
I fear will be caught by
the frost -

After a more thorough
examination of the earth I
find the cotton is injured
to a greater extent than I
at first thought - I don't
think now that the whole
plantation will make as
much as it did last year
with considerable more acre-
age - How rapidly the prospect
can change - We left here

before it was as bright as it ^{is}
