

My Dear Sir &amp; Bro:

Your kind favor of 13<sup>th</sup> has this moment reached me. I too, greatly regretted not meeting you while in Raleigh. About the door word. It must be a national word - one that can be used at the door of every lodge in the whole country. In the construction of the name, Alliance is made subordinate to Union. The latter word embraces the Wheel, the F. M. B. A. the La. Union, F. d. W. of America & the Alliance & calls it a Union. Suppose we had given it the name of Farmers Alliance, Wheel & F. M. B. A. Union, then to have adopted either of the names of the Constituent <sup>bodies</sup> would have had the effect of making it local in character & could have been used at the door only in those States where such named Constituent body existed. Union is made applicable to all of them & Alliance could not be. Again, the use of this word as a national word, does not in any manner infringe upon the right of your State body or subordinate bodies to use the name "Alliance" in all cases where you are acting under your State character. because but not as a door word, because this word must be common to the whole order, For example; You could not enter a room with "Alliance" in Penn, Ark, & many other States.
