My Dear Sir

The enclosed communication speaks for itself. I would be glad if you would have it published immediately, as I do not wish any one to think that I have amended my opinion about the Warehouse Bill for a moment. I have answered a great many private letters, asking me how I stood. In fact quite a month ago I wrote to Mr Beddingfield to the same effect. The only reason why I have not sooner published a communication was because I was waiting to see what the Committee would do with the Bill; earnestly hoping that they would give me

in such a shape that I could vote for.

I would be glad to have your opinion about the suggestion in my letter as to the establishment of these warehouses in connection with the present Custom Houses. That would undoubtedly be Constitutional and would make the Government give both storage and insurance for all articles deposited. It would accomplish everything the other bill proposes except the issuing of Treasury Notes upon the deposits. If you think it will give any relief I will prepare and introduce such a Bill immediately.

The Republicans here predict that the Democratic Party in N.C. will be broken up by the Farmers movement. They are zealously promoting it with that view. Some unimagined is really felt
