

Detroit, Mich, Nov. 12th, 1890.

My Dear Sir:--

I have the honor of being acquainted with one of the alternate commissioners, from the State of Ohio, of the World's Columbian Exposition. In conversation with him recently, he stated that he thought it was the intention of the general commissioners, as well the alternate commissioners, to prepare a bill to present to the next legislature of the State of Ohio, asking them for a State appropriation, to enable the State of Ohio, as an example, to be well represented at our coming World's Fair Exposition.

He concluded that if the bill was allowed, they would expect to have two commissioners appointed, for the purpose of looking after this special State appropriation, and his suggestion was that it would be well for all the alternates from the different States to act upon something definite, or, in other words, to act together to bring about, in each State, this condition of things. He favors, and I heartily concur, in asking for the appointment of two State commissioners to look after this special State appropriation, and further favors providing in this bill for the appointment of the alternate commissioners, to fill these positions.

I conclude you will heartily concur, and indorse this sentiment, which we trust will prove acceptable, and also very satisfactory to the general commissioners.
