My Dear Friend

Your favor of 23<sup>d</sup> inst is to hand  
& I am very much obliged to you for the information  
it gives me. Excuse me, however, for troubling you  
further on the subject. You say we are assured that  
we can have all the Cotton bagging that we want.  
Please advise me as to who will furnish this bagging -  
weight, price &c and also what steps have been taken  
to arrange with the Cotton Exchange of Norfolk & New  
York for the allowance of 8 lbs per bale where Cotton bagging  
is used. I suppose, if such an allowance is made,  
it will only be on bales of or over a certain weight.  
Norfolk & New York take all the Cotton from this section  
& unless their exchanges agree to the arrangement we will  
receive no benefit. I am thus particular about the matter  
because I would not like to have our County Allow  
adopt Cotton bagging & afterwards have to back  
down.

I shall be more than pleased to have you make me a

Our Crops have been greatly damaged by floods & storms  
during the last ten days. Yesterday evening hail stones
