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to override the veto of the President, which I apprehend it will surely receive. Then we must look to the Fifty Second Congress for relief. The political construction of that body will, in my judgment, present to us peculiar and embarrassing difficulties which nothing can overcome but the united, determined voice of the people. To the people we must appeal, and it should be done systematically during the present year.

Impressed with these views and convictions, I feel that our body should mature a system by which the people may be reached and informed and educated as to the necessity for united, earnest action. This I believe can be done through a system of lecturing and by the aid of the Reform Press, and I hope to submit a formal plan to your body when it meets.
