In an address to the Tarmers' Alliance, President Hall of the Missouri Alliance makes a comprehensive statement of the evidence connecting Dr. MACUNE, editor of the National Economist, with the attempt to elect Mr. PATRICK CALHOUN to the United States Senate from Georgia. Mr. Calhoun is one of the ablest of the many able attorneys connected with the Southern railroads, and the evidence showed that he had Dr. MACUNE's active support for the Senate; that he furnished him with free passes from Washington to Atlanta, and that he loaned him \$2,000. It was on such evidence that Mr. Hall refused to sign the report exonerating Dr. Ma-CUNE, investigated at Ocala as one of the salaried officers of the Alliance. An examination of the evidence in the summary made by Mr. HALL elsewhere in this issue of THE REPUBLIC will hardly fail to carry conviction that the National Economist will be untrustworthy as long as there is a possibility of its being controlled as Dr. MACUNE seems to have been controlled in the Georgia contest.
