

New York Nov 28. 1894

My dear Mr Carr

I arrived home last Evg and found your favor of 22nd which returned my check \$25, I regret it could not have been used to advantage for the Bosphore Bank - The Triumph here was carried ~~very largely~~ by the Democratic (Tammany Party) truckling to the low orders, and the ~~bad~~ City appointments & the People largely prefered not to have Hill for Gv^r. - The Democratic growing in the Senate last Spring together with the members of Silver carried a desire for Change, but here no Democrat blames Cleveland. I have no time to go further with political subject except to add I deplore the result in Carolina especially your judiciary when we next meet to converse we can do so freely. I see Cahn in Tarboro & Greenville about 4 $\frac{1}{2}$ & almost made me ill, the great question in my mind is what can be planted to not a profit, the People can live, but they ought to be able to have an accumulation for old age - Thank John for his kind letter & kindly give my best wishes to all the family - & come we feel the shrinking here - In haste
