THIRD DAY—JULY 2, 1896.

Convention called to order at 10 o'clock A. M.

Final adjournment of the Convention to lay the Corner-Stone of the Jefferson Davis Monument.

General Parade of Military, Masonic, Civic, and Veteran Organizations, led by a band of one thousand uniformed Children of Richmond, Va., Sons and Daughters of Confederate Soldiers, with twenty-five thousand men in line, on foot and on horseback.

Veteran Cavalry Division.

The Virginia Veteran Division will report to Major-General T. A. Brander at First and Broad streets, and form on Broad street, facing south, right resting on First street.

West Virginia Division will report to Major-General T. A. Brander at First and Broad streets, and form on left of Virginia Division, occupying from First to Third street.

South Carolina Veteran Division will report to Major-General C. I. Walker at northeast corner Third and Broad streets, and form on Broad street, facing south, right resting on Third street.

Mississippi Veteran Division will report to Major-General W. D. Holder at southwest corner Fourth and Broad streets, right resting on Fourth street.

Florida Veteran Division will report to Major-General J. J. Dickison at northeast corner Fourth and Broad streets, right resting on Fourth street.

Alabama Veteran Division will report to Major-General Fred. S. Ferguson at southwest corner Fifth and Broad streets, right resting on Fifth street.

Georgia Veteran Division will report to Major-General Clement A. Evans at the northeast corner Fifth and Broad streets, right resting on Fifth street.

Louisiana Veteran Division will report to Major-General Vincent at the southwest corner Sixth and Broad streets, and form on Broad street, right on Sixth street.

Texas Veteran Division will report to Major-General H. H. Boone at the northeast corner of Sixth and Broad streets, and form on Broad street, right on Sixth street.

Indian Territory Division will report to Major-General R. B. Coleman, and will form on left of Texas Division.

Oklahoma Veteran Division will report to Major-General Edward L. Thomas, and will form on left of Indian Territory Division.

Arkansas Veteran Division will report to Major-General John G. Fletcher at the southwest corner of Seventh and Broad streets, and form on Broad street, right on Seventh street.

Tennessee Veteran Division will report to Major-General W. H. Jackson at the southeast corner of Sixth and Broad streets, and form on the left of the Arkansas Division.

North Carolina Veteran Division will report to Major-General W. L. DeRosset at the northeast corner of Seventh and Broad streets, and form on Broad street, right on Seventh street.

Kentucky Veteran Division will report to Major-General John Boyd at the southwest corner of Eighth and Broad streets, and form on Broad street, right on Eighth street.

Missouri Veteran Division will report to Major-General Jo. O. Shelby at the southeast corner of Seventh and Broad streets, and form on the left of the Kentucky Division.

Maryland Veteran Division will report to Major-General George H. Steuart at the northeast corner of Eighth and Broad streets, and form on Broad street, right resting on Eighth street.

District of Columbia Veteran Division will report to Major-General George H. Steuart at the southwest corner of Ninth and Broad streets, and form on Broad street, right resting on Ninth.

Cook and Waiter Brigade, A. N. V., will form on north Ninth street, right resting on Broad.

Sons of Veterans will report to Colonel T. P. Pollard, northeast corner Broad street, right resting on Ninth.

Veteran Cavalry Division will report to General Wade Hampton, form on Broad street, east of Eleventh street, right resting on Eleventh street, facing south.

None but organized Camps and Associations allowed in Veteran Divisions. Civic Societies, and citizens desiring to participate in the parade will form on Ninth street, north of Broad, and take place in line in rear of Sons of Veterans.

Division and Brigade Commanders will have their commands in position ready to move at 1 o'clock promptly. Veteran Organizations will move in column of eights.

On arriving at Monroe Park all Staff and Field Officers will dismount, and their horses will be taken by regularly-appointed horse-holders, and coupons issued for same. Horses will be parked in north Pine street between Franklin and Grace. Carriages will enter the Park at Pine and Franklin and leave at Pine and Main. No vehicles of any kind will be allowed on the line of march.

The line of march will be from Adams down Broad to Eleventh, Eleventh to Capitol, Capitol to Ninth, Ninth to Grace, Grace to Fifth, Fifth to Franklin, and Franklin to Monroe Park.

At the sounding of the taps the parade is dismissed.
