Replying to your note of this  
date, just recd. I wish to state  
that just before leaving Richmond  
I was informed by the proprietors  
of the Jefferson that they had  
just received a letter from  
Col Hamill, countermanding  
his previous order for 6 rooms  
but directing them to re-  
serve one good room for  
you, stating that the Staff  
would make their own  
arrangements &c. as

I presumed that this order was the result of instructions received from you since my departure from Raleigh. I must content myself with making suitable inquiries in regard to your room & for one for myself.

During my stay in Richmond I tried to find out something definite about the programme; but could only learn that it was expected that all of the Governors

would appear in the procession mounted accordingly in my responsibility, I made arrangements with Mr J.W. Biley Cor. 3<sup>rd</sup> & Marshall Sts. to furnish if necessary, at least six (6) horses for the use of the Gov of N.C. & his staff. Explaining to him that I could not at that moment tell him exactly how many would be needed, and finding that saddles were scarce: told him that we would furnish our own saddles & ship them from the Arsenal here to him
