Dec. 30. 1874.

Dear Mr. Carr.

it was too early.

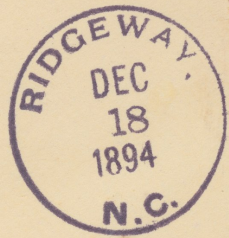
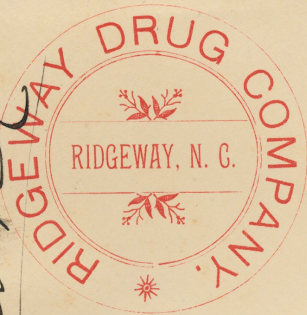
We would be glad to have
