Dear Governor: I march, in confidence, to ask you two or three questions about the present status of the C. C. R. R.

We had definite assurance that you had advised with your Attorney Gen'l. about the legality of this lease before we ever acted. We were positively assured that, in the judgment and opinion of that officer, the lease was valid and we knew you approved of it. I still think as matter of law that it is valid; but the Atty. Gen'l seems to have changed his mind. Please tell me what is the issue of this matter. I know Osborne to be a first class lawyer, and a loyal man to his convictions, and, above all, a man entirely free from public clamor and opinion.
