Matter. The amended "Act" to  
the "Act" creating the Circuit  
Criminal Courts, retained the  
Solicitor (Col. Brown) and the  
Clerk in office until the expiration  
of their terms and made no  
provision for such a contingency

of their respective terms. It is  
too clear to admit of a doubt  
that the Solicitor of the District  
can not fill the unexpired term  
and that the appointing power  
rests with the Governor of the  
State. It is fortunate that it  
is so, because that County needs  
a local Solicitor and New  
Hanover is now suffering for the  
want of one.

I have been  
induced by the sollicitations of  
several of my friends who are  
prominent citizens of the  
County of Mecklenburg to  
recommend the appointment  
of Mr J D McCall to the  
vacant Solicitorship of the  
Circuit Criminal Court of  
that County. While I entertain  
the opinion that his appointment  
would be a good one and  
would meet with the approval  
of a large portion of the

Democratic Party of that County; including many of the most prominent Citizens; yet if there had been some others of the Charlotte Bar of equal claims upon the position who had announced their desire to obtain the appointment I would have declined recommending either of them for obvious reasons.

I have received letters however informing me that Mr McCull (up to yesterday) was the only person who had been generally spoken of and who has expressed his desire to be appointed. I have received letters, among others from Senator W. C. Dowd and Mr Alexander (Member of the House of Representatives), assuring me that the appointment of Mr McCull would be a

very popular one and would give general satisfaction.

He has practiced before me for <sup>my</sup> a number of years and I think his appointment would be a judicious one because in the first place he is a man of good private character and of sober and industrious habits.

In the next place he is possessed of the requisite professional ability and in the next place he has done good service to the Democratic Party.

I am informed that some members of the Charlotte Bar have expressed the opinion that it will be incumbent upon the District Solicitor to fill the vacancy created by Col. Brown's death. In my opinion this is an erroneous view of the
