Giving the Cattle a Rest. It is found expedient to give the cattle that are brought from the ranches of the Canadian northwest near the Rocky mountains a chance to rest dur ing their long journey to the Atlantic coast. Cattle are not tortured with bunger and thirst and tired to death with the incessant jolting of the cars day after day as they were when cattle shipments first became a large item of railroad traffic. Every steer that is taken on board the cattle cars of the Canadian Pacific at the western ranches is turned loose when he gets to White River, north of Lake Superior, into

large stockyards, where he has a chance to recuperate. Plenty of feed and running water are supplied for the animals, and after a day's rest they continue their jour ney Cattle shippers find that it pays to give stock such an opportunity to recover from the fatigue of the long trip, and it is certainly a humane as well as profitable feature of the cattle

the field of an observer's telescope, that produce the result. These lesser ones are of such slight weight that the small amount of light caused by their combustion in earth's atmosphere is not visible to the naked eye However, these little fellows are continually bombarding the earth day and night, year in, year out, finally reaching the surface as a fine dust. 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
