TOBACCO JOTTINGS AND LOCAL NOTES.

Three bales tobacco cloth at J. C. Cobb & Son.

The Eastern Warehouse sold on Tuesday 13,000 pounds of tobacco for \$1,300.

If you intend buying tobacco cloth call on J. C. Cobb & Son, they have a large assortment at prices to suit.

The weather for the past few days has been favorable for handling tobacco and the farmers have been using the advantage.

Mr. R. C. Cannon, a prominent young farmer of this county says that if he can get the lot at a reasonable price he intends building a prize house in Greenville before another season. He says he means business.

Six more prize houses would be in strong demand in Greenville. Joyner & Heilbronner say they have had no less than half dozen applications for their house at nearly 3 times the price for which it is now renting.

To build and thoroughly equip a 3 story prize house will not cost to exceed \$1,500 which will easily rent for from \$25 to \$40 per month, while smaller ones can be built at half the cost that will rent for \$18 or \$20. No one in Greenville has as yet spent much to make the tobacco market a success. The farmers have done it all and now that a market is partially established will not some one lend a helping hand by building more prize houses and thereby help to build up the town and at the same time make for themselves a handsome per cent. on the investment.

ANOTHER STATE WANTS A SPECIAL CIGARETTE TAX.

A bill has been introduced in the Ohio Legislature to impose a tax of \$300 upon every dealer who handles cigarettes in that State. Now Ohio is an important State and the passage of the bill would only be another strong pull for the cigarette trust and as we stated before it is likely that the trust is really at the bottom of all this special cigarette tax business. The passage of the Ohio bill would give that State practically over to the American Tobacco Co., not only on its cigarettes, but for its other tobaccos as well. Let our readers in Ohio watch this bill and see that it does not become a law. As this is the law making season we can expect similar bills to bob up in other Legislatures any day.

THE ADVANCE IN WRAPPERS.

In 1890 some of our Eastern tobacco planters realized as high as \$350 per acre for their tobacco following this in 1891 the same land (or similar land) returned upon an average about \$65 per acre. This of course was attributed to over-production which in reality was the result of unreasonable weather, hence a bad crop of nondescript stuff that brought but little returns. 1892 with but few exceptions was a repetition of 1891. Some few however, in fact a goodly number of our Eastern planters were successful in producing a right good crop of wrappers which brought good prices all along and now they are clear out of sight. What is the cause of this rapid rise of wrappers? It is simply this; the 1890 wrappers have been consumed, '91 and '92 produced but few and there is a demand for wrappers, wrappers of any kind and all grades.

We are in frequent communication with numbers of leading tobaccoists in nearly all of the leading markets both of this State and Virginia and the opinion generally expressed is that wrappers this year will be higher than they have been for years. For two years past the wrapper crop of Central North Carolina has been an almost absolute failure and as the boom of supply and demand regulates to a very great extent this commodity. He who makes wrappers this year may well consider himself fortunate.

MORE UNSCRUPULOUS METHODS.

Employed by the Cigarette Trust to Break Down a Small Manufacturer.

There is a cigarette manufacturer not two hundred miles from Winston who has been specially persecuted by the American Tobacco Co., with the view of completely breaking down his business. This manufacturer has not a great deal of capital and is trying to make a support for his family out of the cigarette business, in spite of the trust's persecution. What he lacks in capital is made up in nerve, or he would long ago have gone to the wall in the face of the strong odds against him.

This cigarette manufacturer has a strong trade built up in a large section of an adjoining State. He has advertised his goods well, he knows the jobbers and retailers personally and his cigarettes are very popular. The section occupied by the trust and last spring the trust people set about to drive out the small manu-

facturer. They came into his choicest territory and put cigarettes down to and below cost. It was at the beginning, too, of a dull season when the small manufacturer could ill afford to sell without profit. But he was compelled to meet prices, and did so. The trust made a three months fight, all the time selling cigarettes at and below cost, with the avowed purpose of forcing the smaller competitor out of the business. But fortunately for the smaller manufacturer he had plenty of nerve and good backing so he held out to the end. At the expiration of three months the trust restored prices, seeing there was no chance to drive out the small competitor.

In that same territory, we are informed, that the American Tobacco Co. is selling or consigning cigarettes to the jobbers without the jobbers signature to the iron clad contract. The goods of the local manufacturer mentioned above are popular in that territory with consumers and the jobbers know that they sell and hence they refuse to sign the trust's contracts, saying they will handle the other cigarettes exclusively before they will sign away their rights and independence. The trust has threatened the jobbers in every way, but they have held out firm, and to-day those who are selling American Tobacco Co.'s goods are doing so without doing the humiliating act of signing the iron clad contract.

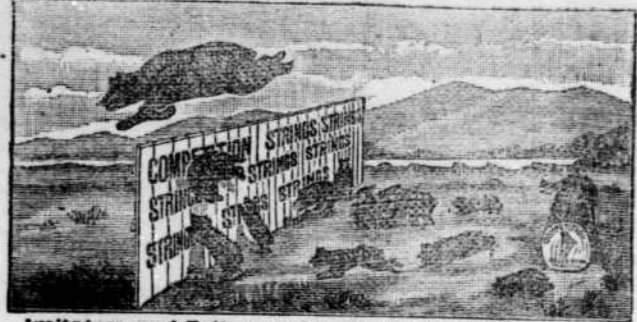

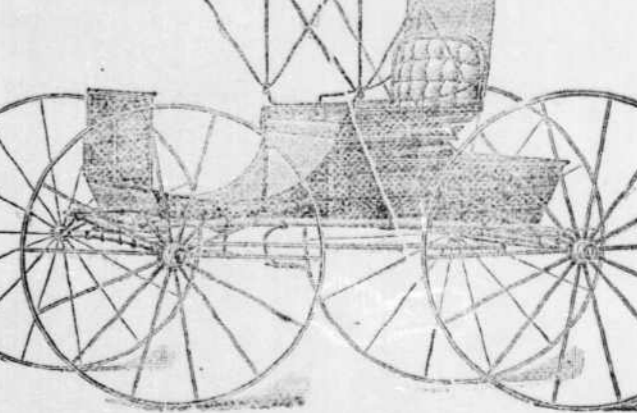
