ACTIVE AT 123. Richard Hoops, of Missouri, the Oldest Man of the Country.

One of the oldest, if not the very oldest, men in America lives in a little sharty on the banks of the Osage river at Osage City, Mo., according to the Cincinnati Commercial Gazette. He is a negro, and his name is Richard Hoops.

According to the statements of Hoops, which are well supported by accessible records, he was born in Chatham county, N. C., December 20, 1770, and thus has completed his 123d year.

Born a slave, he was taken to Missouri by his owner, John P. Hayden, while a mere boy. A few years later he was sold to the man whose name he now bears, and lived with him near Vienna, Maries county, until the emancipation of the slaves. Since that time he has lived at Westphalia, but for the last twenty-five years has made his home at Osage City.

Hoops is remarkably well pre-served, and lives alone in his shauty. He fishes a great deal for the big catfish that frequent the waters of the Osage, and is never happier than when he can catch a big one and makes soup of its head.


