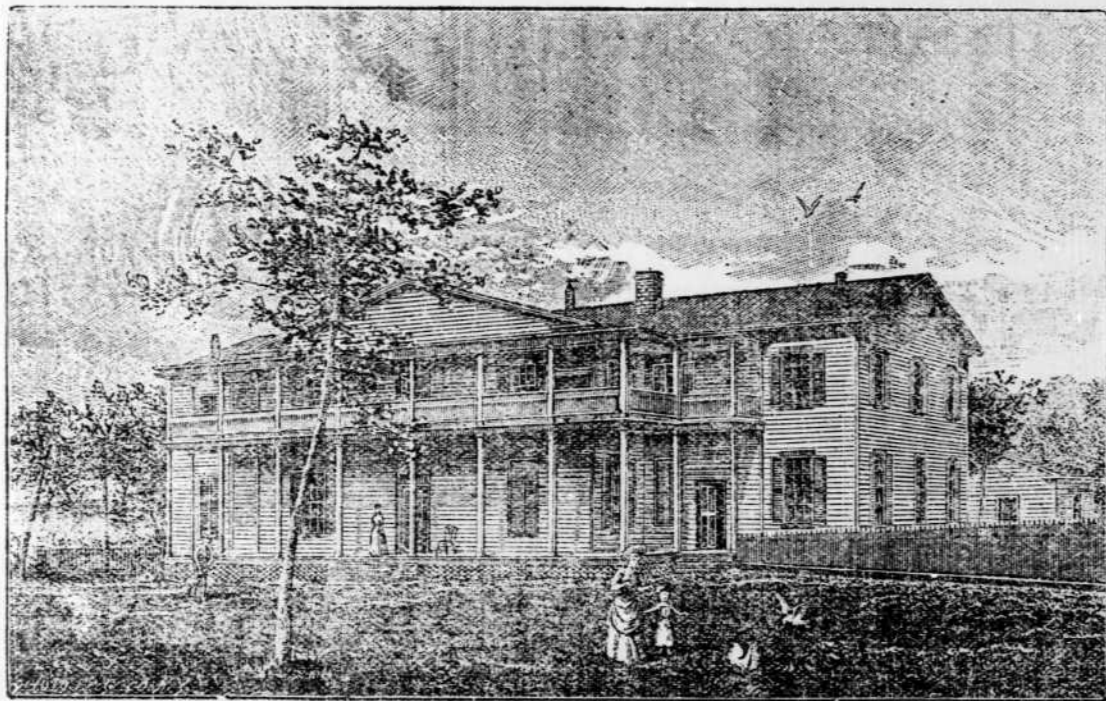

**"The Gentleman From Pitt."**

The next State Senate, like the last, will miss the presence of the popular "Gentleman from Pitt," Hon. Willis R. Williams, who has represented his county in the Senate for more than a decade. He was a landmark in that body until he voluntarily withdrew. His friends all over the State, while regretting his withdrawal from a body in which his voice was always heard in advocacy of the right of the people, are glad to know that the Pitt Democrats have nominated him for Clerk of the Superior Court, an office of good salary. A Pitt Countian Writes an Interesting Letter—North Carolinians He Meets—Pops are the Same Everywhere.

CADDO MILLS, TEXAS, }  
October 3rd 1894.

Dear Reflector:

When I left North Carolina more than three months ago I promised to write to so many that I take the liberty of writing to all through your paper. I have traveled most of the time in Arkansas, Indian Territory and Texas—most of the time in Texas. If there ever was a country where "Flitter trees grow and honey springs flow," it is in the Territory, but a white man can't own land there. In Ft. Worth I met Mr. Jarvis an own cousin of our Senator Jarvis, he is a leading lawyer of that city. At Waxahatchie I also met another North Carolina man—a leading lawyer, his name is Skinner. He is cousin to Harry. I have bought a farm one mile from Caddo Mills. It is located 40 miles east of Ft. Worth and 10 miles east of Greenville, on the M. K. & T. R. R. The town is neatly built on an elevation overlooking the beautiful timber valley of the Caddo, which breaks the vast prairie level stretching away as far as eye can reach in magnificent waves of the most productive and healthy "Blackland belt" in the great State of Texas. The Populist party here, like in North Carolina, is ephemeral, an upheaval of the times and a refuge for every crank who is the advocate of every "ism" that can be conceived by human imagination, that if the party was placed in power it would divide up into factions, each faction wanting to slap a statutory mustard plaster on every spot that developed an ache or a weakness. Each faction would have its favorite remedy, be it herb or pill or plaster, and would discredit the faith of every one who would not accept their prescription instant.

The party here as elsewhere is a conglomerated mass of petty political party, which promises everything to everybody and nothing to nobody. I trust that Old Pitt county will still remain in the Democratic column—the only party that tears the armament of true political economy. Let the old flag of truth float proudly from her masthead, her crew sing loudly and harmoniously together and she will come into the harbor with the doors of sweet peace resting on her bosom. I hope many will leave the sinking ship of Populism and nail in the mast of the flag of the Democracy with deck room for all the Democratic ticket and then you can safely leave all else to the God of storms, the lightning and the breeze.
