Charlotte, N. C., June 24th.—All last night and this morning delegates and visitors kept pouring into Charlotte, and though the streets it had almost the appearance of a town run over with folks, no one was heard to complain that Charlotte was not taking care of them all right.

Some visitors were so enthusiastic that they seemed not to sleep at all, but throughout the night the streets resounded with cries of "Kitchin," "Craig," "Horne." Everything was good humored.

This morning the Pitt county delegates held a caucus in the Manufacturers' Club rooms and elected H. W. Wheelbee spokesman. J. L. Fleming was recommended as the first district caucus as a member of the committee on organization, William Bigham, of Chowan.

Committee on platform, W. L. Cohoon, of Pasquotank.

Members State executive committee, W. G. Lamb, of Martin; L. L. Smith, of Gates; E. A. Daniels, of Beaufort; Everett Thompson, of Pasquotank.

Delegates to national convention, Walter Jones, of Hyde; S. C. Bragaw, of Beaufort Alternates, L. F. Wright, of Camden; W. K. Jackson, of Beaufort.

At 11 o'clock the doors of the immense auditorium were thrown open and delegates began pouring in for the greatest convention the State has known. The auditorium is ideal for such a gathering, and Charlotte certainly did herself proud in constructing it. The building seats 4,800 people and is admirably arranged.

The assembling delegates showed that they had their enthusiasm and their lungs with them. Some men would give vent to a shout for either of the three candidates for governor and instantly the friends of the others would raise their voices for their man, and it was a contest to see which could drown the others.

Ex-Gov. T. J. Jarvis was given an ovation when he entered about 9 o'clock and took his seat on the speakers stand. Near him was Chairman Chatham of the State executive committee, Elder P. D. Gold, State officers, senators, congressmen, and other distinguished visitors. Quite a number of ladies had seats in the galleries and on the stage and showed much interest in what was going on.

Chairman Chatham then spoke a few minutes and after declaring the convention ready for business called Ex-Gov. T. J. Jarvis temporary chairman. Gov. Jarvis spoke for fifteen minutes, such words as brought great applause. He urged harmony in all that be done in the convention. Districts were called for vice-presidents and members of credential, platform and organization.

Gov. R. B. Glenn not being able to attend the convention, a letter from him was read.

R. P. Buxton, of Winston, read a resolution expressing regret at the death of ex-President Grover Cleveland which was adopted by rising vote, the convention standing with bowed heads as the band played "Rock of Ages."

The convention then adjourned until 4 p. m.

GREAT STATE CONVENTION

Constantly in Session for Five Days and Nights.—Much Enthusiasm.

WILLIAM WALTON KITCHIN NOMINATED.

W. C. Newland for Lieutenant Governor—Pitt's Son, J. Bryan Grimes, Re-nominated for Secretary of State—A Good Ticket all Through.—Democrats Pleased.

Special to Reflector: Charlotte, N. C., June 24th.—All last night and this morning delegates and visitors kept pouring into Charlotte, and though the streets it had almost the appearance of a town run over with folks, no one was heard to complain that Charlotte was not taking care of them all right.

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The tumult of the afternoon began when two or three Craig banners passed through the aisles. The Craig men sprang

to their feet, mounted chairs, waved hats and fans and opened their faces for a noise. The Kitchin men could not keep still amid this. The same large Edgecombe banner put in an appearance for another tour of the hall. Pandemonium broke loose then sure enough and everybody was going at the same time. Both sides showed the best of feeling and turned loose their enthusiasm with a will.

It was 5.25 before the committees were ready to report and the racket continued until they had gathered when temporary Chairman Jarvis rapped for order.

The committee on credentials was the first to report and all contests were settled.

The next up came when a delegate from Rockingham county undertook to read a resolution endorsing W. J. Bryan such a storm of noises and objections coming that the reading of the resolution could not proceed.

This was followed with a motion to proceed with nominations, and after adoption the chairman declared noncandidates for governor in order.

C. W. Tillett, of Charlotte, spoke first and presented the name of W. W. Kitchin. When he named his candidate the Kitchin men again sprang to their feet with cheers and waved hundreds of small North Carolina flags. He spoke 40 minutes and at the conclusion a large picture of Kitchin was unrolled and carried through the hall amid another prolonged outbreak of enthusiasm.
