ANOTHER LETTER FROM LONE STAR STATE

COUNT VISCONTI WRITES ABOUT PRINCIPAL SEAPORT

Corrects Last Letter—Continues Description of Country and Advantages

Delfina, Hidalgo Co., Tex., Feb. 20 Editor Reflector:

Perusing my letter of Jan. 25, published in The Eastern Reflector I find two statements incorrect and herewith beg to correct them. They refer to the port of Tampico, Mexico as to the cost of the walls erected at the mouth of the Panuco river on both sides. The cost was not 2,000,000 but 20,000,000. Further, the distance of the two walls, i. e., the width of the Panuco river is not 100 but 1000 feet. In case I wrote these numbers, it was done in a hurry; I know I thought right but my pen must have reduced each of the numbers by one zero.

I will now conduct the readers back to Tampico and speak of some of the American settlements, or colonies, established during the last 6 or 7 years in the Tampico country. The first American colony on a larger scale was started in 1903 near the Panuco river by people from Texas, Oklahoma and Kansas. The latter two of the colony of Tampico, near the Tropic of Cancer. That colony is about 50 or 60 miles from the Monterey.

Tampico R. E. Escandon was then the station where the colonists left the cars and went over land with their own conveyances. The pretty little town Xicotencatl on a neck breaking from the land of the colony. The leaders of that colony had brought the lands for a mere nominal price in Mexican money and sold parts of them to settlers at \$5.00 and over per acre, in gold. The Tamapalisco state government has now built a very good road from Pretil Station, a few miles south of Escandon to the colony, as the governor of Tamapalisco, with whom I was closeted over an hour, had told me himself. PUBLIC INTEREST DEMANDS IT.

In Rebuilding Court House Adequate Protection Should be Provided

Raleigh, N. C., Feb. 25. Editor Reflector:

In an effort to secure information useful in the distribution of State reports, laws and documents etc., the Secretary of State last year addressed a communication to the clerks of the court for the various counties, asking for the public records of the county. The public records of the county had been destroyed by fire. The date of fire, extent of loss, present fire protection, etc. The clerks of seventy-four counties made answer, and of these, twenty-two reported (Pitt not included) total or partial loss of public records by fire. In some cases the county court house had been burned twice. Many of the counties now have fire proof vaults. Some of the large and more prosperous counties have handsome court houses with large and commodious fire proof vaults, that are located on grounds apart from other buildings.

The recent disastrous fire in Greenville, in which the court house was burned, recalls the fact that the county of Pitt suffered a similar loss in 1858. That immediate section of the State has been peculiarly unfortunate in the loss of public records by fire, the court houses in the following counties having been burned with more or less loss of public records, viz. Jones, Lenoir (burned twice), Craven, Martin, Washington and Greene—contiguous territory. Almost all these fires have caused irreparable loss and much confusion to the public and private interests of those counties.

I am especially impressed with these losses from fires in the State by the constant demand for records, etc., and also frequently reminded of it by the difficulty the State Historical Commission experiences in gathering data which should be accessible in the county court houses.

It is to be hoped that the county commissioners of Pitt in rebuilding that court house will erect on a square to itself, a large, fire proof building equipped with fire apparatus, with all modern improvements, commodious and in keeping with the growing needs of a prosperous people and a great county.

GOV. VANCE'S MANUSCRIPTS

Are Being Collected by the N. C. Historical Society.

To the People of North Carolina: The North Carolina Historical Commission is making a collection of the letters and papers of Gov. J. B. Vance, with a view to their preservation and publication. Through the co-operation of Mrs. Vance several thousands of such documents have been secured, making one of the most important manuscript collections ever made by the State. The publication of these papers will do more to establish the State's Confederate history beyond dispute than any other collection in existence. But, unfortunately, this collection contains but few of Governor Vance's own letters, most of those in the collection being letters received by him. It is most important that the publication of these papers should be made as complete as possible. The Historical Commission, therefore, takes this means of requesting those who possess letters of Governor Vance to turn them over to the Commission either for permanent preservation or for copying. No letter or paper is so unimportant or trivial but that it may have its place in such a collection; and we think the possession of the Historical Commission is sufficient guarantee that no improper use will be made of any letter or paper. The publication has the sanction of Mrs. Vance.

Nor is the publication a private enterprise undertaken for the purpose of making money. It will be issued by the State as other State printing, and its purpose is to perpetuate the fame of North Carolina's best loved son, to extend the reputation of the State, and to make available for the historian the material for studying her history during its greatest epoch.

Any person, therefore, who possesses a letter or other document of Governor Vance will render a service to his memory and to the good name of the State by co-operating with the Historical Commission in this work. Due credit will be given to all who help to forward this work. All communications should be directed to the secretary at Raleigh.

"Yes, thank you, take this baby and carry it to my house quick," was the grateful reply. "Madam, where is your house?" the salesman inquired. "At Mrs. Alfred Forbes," he was told hurriedly. "Where does Mrs. Forbes live?" he next asked. "Right across the street from Mr. Munford's," he was told. "And, Madam, where does Mr. Munford live?" he once more asked the puzzled salesman, wanting to get out of his mission.

"Man, don't ask so many questions, but take this baby and go quick as I have told you," was the eager command.

He took the precious bundle of humanity and went on directly, inquiring his way diligently until he reached Mrs. Forbes' home. After leaving the child and returning to the scene of the fire, some one asked him if he got to the right place with the child. "Guess I did, as I found another one there just like it," was the proud response.

SAVED NEGRO'S LIFE.

From the Burning Masonic Temple Office.

There were so many heroic deeds during the recent fire it was impossible to learn of and chronicle them all up to the minute, and every day we hear of something worthy of mention. We heard last night that while the fire was at its height in the court house and Masonic temple Mr. Roy Hearn probably saved the life of an unknown negro who had been overcome by smoke and heat and had closed himself in the law office of Mr. S. C. Wooten. It is supposed for protection. Mr. Hearn says he saw the negro go in there and after waiting a reasonable length of time he ran over at the risk of his life to see why he did not come out and to warn him of the danger, when he found him crouched close to the wall almost smothered. Just after the negro was taken out the office was enveloped in a sheet of flame which would have annihilated him in a few seconds more. Mr. Hearn did lots of cool headed fire fighting on the buildings S. W. Sumner, of Grifton. The pall bearers were Mills Smith, E. S. Norman, R. A. Nichols, Ivy Smith, J. B. Joyner, Lloyd Smith, John Leggett and J. C. Crawford.

Mrs. L. L. Meeks, of Tugwell, came Sunday evening to visit at Mills Smith's for sometime. Rev. S. W. Sumner, of Grifton, came last Thursday to preach at Smith's school and Sunday, and to help work on the Christian church at Arthur for a week. The weather has been so snowy and rainy that there has been but little done so far. No services were held at the school house morning nor night. We are having it very rainy, and it looks as if the end of the wet spell is not yet in sight.

Taken all together it does not look like a fire could have occurred that at once caused a loss to so large a number.

The Reflector certainly appreciates the esteem in which it is held by the brethren of the Press of the State. So many have extended congratulations, some even expressing themselves in words of joy, at our escape from the fire, that it has touched us greatly. We hoped to preserve these expressions and print them for the home people to read, but in the days of confusion and strain following the fire we lost some of them. We send this greeting to the brethren to let them know we appreciate their kind feelings more than can be expressed in words. The Reflector hopes to always merit their good wishes.

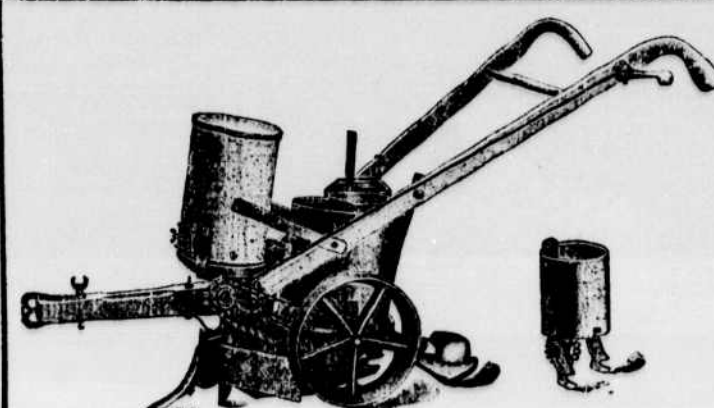

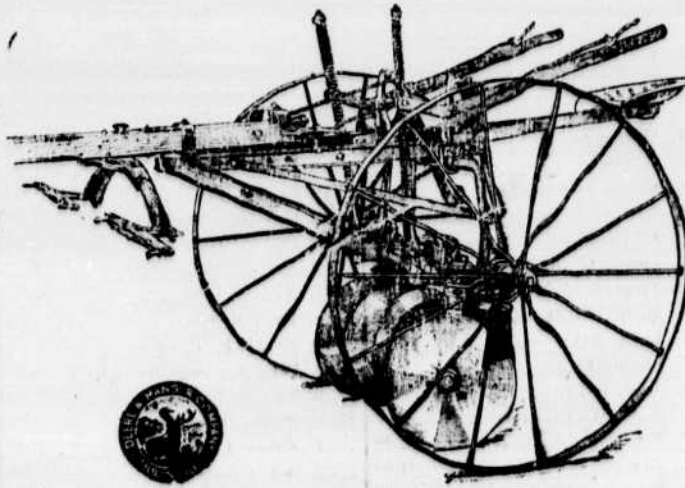
