

GREATEST AMERICAN NAVAL REVIEW

ONE HUNDRED AND TWO VESSELS
Keep up Roar of Salute—Manned by Bluejackets at Attention.
NEW YORK, Oct. 31.—One hundred and two vessels of the American navy, the largest fleet ever assembled under the Stars and Stripes, in their gayest holiday dress, were reviewed by Secretary of the Navy, Meyer today, while hundreds of thousands, ashore and afloat, saw the spectacle. The aggregate tonnage of the assembled war vessels was over one-half million as compared with less than one-third of this total present at the navy review by President Roosevelt in Hampton Roads five years ago. The aggregation of the American dreadnaughts and smaller sisters taking part in today's spectacle represented approximately the huge outlay of \$300,000,000.
Dressed from stern to stern in a riot of hunting, the gray lines of the warships, with a background formed by the Palisades, beautiful in the autumn foliage, made a magnificent spectacle as viewed from Riverside park and other points of vantage on the Manhattan side of the river.
On the broad bosom of the Hudson the vessels floated in three columns, each 8 miles long, stretching from a point about opposite Fifty-seventh street up the river to the mouth of Spuyten Duvel creek. Proceeding from the lower extremity of the columns, Secretary Meyer, standing on the bridge of the naval yacht Mayflower and surrounded by his aides and a number of invited guests, went northward through the lines formed by the battleships, cruisers, torpedo boats and destroyers, submarines and naval auxiliaries.
All the while the ships kept up a roar of salutes. The ships' sides were manned by bluejackets at attention, the quarterdecks were fringed with officers and marine bands, red-coated bands played the national airs, while "ho-ho's" whistles piped out the order of the day.
At the completion of its progress through the anchored lines the Mayflower took up its station near the flagship Connecticut. Rear Admiral Osterhaus, the commander of the fleet and all of the flag and commanding officers boarded the yacht and were received by Secretary Meyer on the quarterdeck. As the officers, in full dress uniform, came over the side of the yacht they were greeted by the blast of bugles, the ruffle of drums, and finally by a cordial handshake from the chief of the navy department.
In addition to the giant battleships the long lines of fighting-machines included the two big armored cruisers, Washington and North Carolina, the fast-flying scout cruiser Salem, the unprotected cruisers Des Moines and five flotillas of torpedo boat destroyers and torpedo boats, eight of the newest and finest submarines in the world and a fleet of splendid naval auxiliaries.

There is another circle of sensitive souls who are worried throughout life by the imaginary hereditary legacies handed down by fathers and mothers in the shape of physical weaknesses and bodily deformities. Still others, owing to a weakened nervous system and overstrain, fall into a condition of nervous irritability that renders them very liable to anxiety and worry upon the least provocation. Such persons—in fact, all of us—are greatly predisposed to worry by sleeplessness. Sound sleep is a great preventative of the mental state that borders on worry.

The state of the physical health is not an infrequent occasion for worry. Many worry because of lingering illness or unusual affliction, while others grieve because of the sickness and suffering of their loved ones.

Another form of worry is the fear of "old age." As the years pass over us the arteries begin to harden, the memory gradually fails, the skin becomes visibly wrinkled and leathery, and the old age brings its peculiar worries to the majority of people. There is a tendency to undue anxiety on the part of the aged that is born both of the retrospective view of life and anticipation as to what the future holds in store. Especially is this true in the case of those who do not have sufficient means laid up properly and comfortably to care for them to a good old age.

N. S. Train Cuts A. C. L. Train in Two

ENGINE AND TWO CARS WRECKED

White Atlantic Coast Line Train is Struck by Norfolk Southern Heavy Norfolk Southern Freight Crashes Into It—None of Crew Injured.

About 7 o'clock Saturday night the long blowing of a steam whistle caused considerable uneasiness among the people of the town. At first some thought it was fire at one of the tobacco factories or lumber plants but no outcry was heard. A large number went out in the direction of the blowing whistle and found that a bad wreck had occurred at the junction of the Norfolk Southern and Atlantic Coast Line railroads, just on the limits of the town, and that the noise was caused by escaping steam from a disabled engine.

Two freight trains were involved in the wreck, but the damage was mainly to one of them, the Norfolk Southern. The southbound freight of the Atlantic Coast Line had just been derailed by the crossing of the Norfolk Southern. The freight train was derailed by the crossing of the Norfolk Southern. Just then the Norfolk Southern through freight train, a heavy train of four and a half cars rounded the curve west of the junction. It was so dark that the train was nearly to the junction before the engineer saw the other train standing across the track in front of him. He reversed his engine and applied brakes, but it was too late to stop short of the crossing. He and the fireman went jumped out to save themselves and escaped injury.

The Norfolk Southern train came from the north and was on the main track, picking up the empty box car that stood on the crossing and drove it down the embankment just beyond, smashing it almost into fragments. This was the only damage to the Atlantic Coast Line train, as the car which was struck became uncoupled and the others on both sides remained on the track.

Things went much worse with the Norfolk Southern train. The engine was badly smashed, it tore up the track and rolled over in a ditch not far from the junction. A box car loaded with cotton was thrown down the embankment and broken to pieces.

It took all night and until Sunday afternoon to get everything cleared away. Attention was first given to repairing the damage in time for the early morning trains. A wrecking train with hoisting derrick came from New Bern and fitted the engine back on the track so it could be pulled to the shops at New Bern. The hales of cotton were pulled out and loaded on another car and the remainder of the two broken box cars were burned.

Thronges of people were going out all day Sunday to see the work of clearing up the wreck.

Strong Address by Rev. J. H. Shore.

TO EDUCATION

Large Audience in Graded School Auditorium to Hear Him. The auditorium of the graded school was nearly filled with people Friday night to hear Dr. Rankin, secretary of the state board of health.

After a few brief introductory remarks by Dr. Skinner, superintendent of health in Pitt county, Dr. Rankin proceeded to read the discussion of the "Relation of Health to Education." He made his address intensely practical. At all times it was plain, and in such terms that the laymen had no difficulty in understanding it.

First of the defects common to school children which the speaker took up was defective vision. He stated that according to statistics ten per cent. of all school children have defective vision. Dr. Rankin gave a very clear explanation of the common eye defects, and showed the consequences of neglect.

Another very common defect which was discussed at some length, was throat troubles. Twenty per cent. of the school children of the state have throat troubles of one form or another, the more usual one being adenoids. Dr. Rankin explained fully the usual symptoms of adenoids, and then showed the result of neglect cases. He said probably the worst result was the great drain on nervous energy. All of us are born, he said with varying degrees of health. Some inherit much, some little, some none. In the same way all of us are born with much nervous energy, some with little, some with practically none. Throat troubles, particularly adenoids, exhaust nervous energy. We become nervous, irritable and thousands commit suicide every year. Neurasthenia, or nerve exhaustion, is so common in America that it is known as the "American disease."

Next Sunday's meeting will be held in the Methodist church, when the subject will be "Beware of Covetousness." Text, Luke 12:15. Leaders, Messrs. B. B. Sugg, J. S. Cockrell and R. M. Bearce. It will do every man in Greenville good to study this subject and be present at the next meeting.

GIRDLING PECAN TREES.

How to Destroy The Insects And Prevent Damage. Mr. R. M. Hearne recently discovered that something was damaging his pecan trees. He wrote to a nurseryman for the reply to his letter for publication, so that any others who are finding similar trouble in their pecan trees may know how to remedy it. The reply says: "We note what you say about girdling of your pecan trees, and beg to advise you that this is a small bug or beetle known as the pecan girdler. If you will examine the fallen twigs of this season near where girdling has been done, you will find the bug has deposited its eggs in the bark girdled the limb just below the egg, causing the twig to decay and break off, falling to the ground. The egg hatches, goes in the ground and in the course of the time another bug appears to repeat the process. Keep all twigs taken up and burned as soon as they fall, or before they fall, as soon as leaves begin to die show where the work has been done. Catch and destroy all bugs possible."


