Winners of Scholarships, Medals, Prizes, etc.—Special Musical and Military Features

BINGHAM SCHOOL, Mebane, N. C., May 20.—The commencement exercises of the Bingham School, located near Mebane, have been in progress for two days and closed most successfully Friday night, May 17.

Thursday night the Kallisthenic-Polemia Literary Society contest was held. President Paul V. Phillips presided and made a most appropriate address. Secretary David T. Taylor introduced the following speakers: Messrs Charles McCutchen of Virginia, George Slover of Craven county, N. C., Fred Blakeley of Virginia, Knott Proctor of Pitt county, N. C., T. K. Cobb of Robeson county, N. C., and John C. Paul of Virginia. The judges, Dr. L. Puryear, Rev. B. T. Hurley and Prof. R. A. Campbell, gave their decision and the beautiful gold medal to Mr. John G. Paul of Roanoke, Va. The Bingham military band rendered delightful music for the occasion.

Washington News

James Hamilton Lewis, Democratic candidate for United States senator from Illinois, is being urged for temporary chairman of the Democratic national convention.

Colorado Democrats have delegated Mrs. Anna B. Pitzer to cast the vote of their State delegation for her brother-in-law, Champ Clark, at the Baltimore convention.

The national Prohibition convention, which is to meet the second week in July at Atlantic City, will have a total of 1,484 delegates and an equal number of alternates.

Dr. Harry Lane, the Democratic candidate for United States senator from Oregon, is a grandson of General Joseph Lane, who was Oregon's first territorial governor, one of her first senators and a candidate for vice-president on the Breckinridge ticket in 1860.

In the event of Theodore Roosevelt receiving the nomination for President, friends of William F. Egan, of Pittsburg, now the recognized leader of the Republican party in Pennsylvania, declare that he will be a candidate for the chairman of the Republican National Committee.

Col. Jake Wolters, who is fighting to succeed Joseph W. Bailey as United States senator from Texas, is a leader of the anti-saloon forces in the Lone Star State. He declares that he would make a strong fight for the passage of laws which would prevent the shipment of liquor from wet territory into the dry States under the inter-State commerce laws.

The national convention of Socialists at Indianapolis has called attention to the rapid growth of this party and its increasing influence in American politics. In 1892, when the Socialists first appeared on the national ticket, their presidential candidate polled 20,000 votes was just under 500,000. This year a vote of over 2,000,000 is prophesied, or about one-seventh of the ballots of the country.

Women are to vote in the presidential contest of this year in the State of California, Colorado, Washington, Wyoming, Idaho and Utah. The Republican presidential plurality in 1908 in California was \$6,906, in Washington 47,351, in Wyoming 5,928, in Idaho 16,495 and in Utah 18,414, while Bryan carried Colorado by 2,944.

The Republican national campaign is arriving to employ a staff of women political speakers for these six States this fall, and it is said the Democratic national campaigners contemplate a similar step.

The United States League got a good start in Pittsburg, the first game of the season drawing 7,000 spectators.

Hugh Duffy is having a hard time trying to keep his Milwaukee Brewers up in the American Association race. The Peoria champions of the Three-1 League got away to a bad start this season losing the first six games.

Manager Frank Shaughnessy, of the Boston Braves team, is leading the Central League batters with an average of .468.

Pitcher "Rube" Marquard is tossing the same kind of teasers that won him first place among the National League slabs artists last season.

"Spik" Shannon, the former New York Yankees City outfielder, is now clerking in a Kansas City hotel and declares he is out of baseball for good.

Before the season opened, how many followers of baseball would have picked the White Sox to polish the world's champions and right on the "champs" own lot at that?

With Lajoie out of the game the Cleveland team has found the going pretty tough. The Naps Miss those well bingles the big Frenchman in the habit of putting over.

No doubt that is true for according to the fans there never was a good umpire in the history of the game.





Attempt to Grab Rich Oil Lands

Attorney General Wickerham Proffers Serious Charges Against Southern Pacific

OFFICIALS CHARGED WITH CONSPIRACY TO GRAB

WASHINGTON, May 29.—In a public statement, Attorney General Wickerham today declared that the government is in charge of a case, concerning the recovery of valuable oil lands in Southern California has developed "sensational and startling disclosures." Testimony by witnesses subpoenaed by the government, he says, "presents a remarkable picture of criminal conspiracy among high officials of the Southern Pacific company to acquire from the United States, under an agricultural grant, oil lands valued at \$15,000,000."

The statement was issued after a conference between attorney general and Willis N. Mills, his special assistant in charge of the case, concerning recent important developments in the suit.

The proceedings were instituted by direction of Mr. Wickerham in December, 1910, to set aside patents and revert in the government title to 6,000 acres of valuable oil bearing lands in the Elk Hills country of the McKittick oil district, Kern county, California.

Lays Out Negro Who Had Attacked While Man

WILMINGTON.—Struck in the head with a hammer by the engineer of the steam rolled used on the streets after he had hit the foreman of the force, T. E. Koonce, with a shovel and was lashing him with a whip, R. Crosby, colored, lies in the hospital tonight in a precarious condition.

H. E. Beane, the engineer, who hit him, is held at the police station tonight but is not locked up. The trouble occurred late this afternoon.

Boys Are Killed by Lightning

KINSTON, May 28.—The remains of Simon Parrott, son of Mr. and Mrs. H. C. Parrott, of Lenoir county, were brought here from New Rochelle, N. Y., where the body was buried over a year ago and reinterred in Maplewood cemetery. The young man was killed by a train on the Long Island railroad, near New Rochelle, in 1911, but it was only recently that his parents got the proof of his whereabouts and Thursday H. C. Parrott left for New York to bring the body back.

Saturday afternoon, according to belated reports received here, Ernest and Tobe Luggins, two negro boys aged 16 and seven years, were stru k and instantly killed by lightning near Littlefield, Pitt county. The boys, who had been working in a field, fled from the approaching storm and were about to enter their home when they were stricken, both by the same bolt, in their tracks.

Bankhead and Hefflin to be There.
RALEIGH.—Senator Bankhead and Congressman Hefflin of Alabama, will speak here Thursday evening in the interest of the presidential candidacy of Oscar W. Underwood. A local reception committee and associate committees from each of the other counties in the fourth congressional district have been named. The committee is headed by Frank Stronach as chairman with James H. Poy, John C. Drewry and Col. Armistead Jones.

Eighty People Burned in a Picture Show

Castellon de La Palma, Spain, May 28.—The cinematograph pictures which last evening caused the death of 80 persons in a moving picture theatre in the little city of Villa Rael, was even more terrible than at first reported. The theatre was completely burned out and very few of the audience escaped without injury from fire or from crushing in the panic. A large number of the injured are dying. Virtually every family in the vicinity is affected by the 80 deaths.

RETURNS SO FAR GIVE ROOSEVELT NEW JERSEY

Governor Wilson Running a Strong Race in His Own State With Indications that He Will Carry It

NEWARK, N. J., May 28.—Returns from the New Jersey primary election at 11 o'clock tonight, two hours after the polls closed, were too meagre to give definite indications as to which way the state had swung in the struggle for delegates to the national conventions. The first returns came from Newark and Cape May county, at almost opposite extremes of the state and the few voting districts which had finished their count at that hour gave Theodore Roosevelt a slight lead on the Republican side while the Democratic struggle, which was a fight for and against Governor Wilson seemed evenly balanced.

Early returns from Cape May, one of the sparsely settled four counties comprising the Second congressional district, indicated a majority in the county of 600 for Roosevelt over Taft.

At the same time E. W. Ray, secretary of the Taft Business Men's League, claimed the city of Newark for Taft.

Indication That Taft Rockefeller Refuses to tell Business Secrets

PLANS ARE BEING MADE TO THAT EFFECT

STUBBORN WITNESS

NEW YORK, May 28.—Jno. D. Rockefeller, retired head of the dissolved Standard Oil company, was placed on the witness stand today to tell whether or not he believed the company had been dissolved under the decree of the U. S. Supreme court.

The aged oil millionaire could not be induced at all times to give direct answers to questions, but made indignant denials of all suggestions that there had been any effort to evade the decree of the court.

The aged oil magnate, "the richest man in the world," was subjected to a grilling by Samuel Untermyer, counsel for the Waters-Pierce interests, that caused the witness to pound his fist on the table to emphasize indignant denials of pointed questions as to whether the decree of the court had in fact been carried out.

"Did you ever have a discussion with John D. Archbold as to how the subsidiaries should be cut loose and still held tight?" queried the Waters-Pierce attorney.

"There was never any thought of cutting loose and holding tight," Mr. Rockefeller almost shouted, "I happen to know about that."

Governor's Son to Wed.
CLAREMONT, Cal., May 29.—Several scores of out of town guests arrived here today for the wedding of Miss Amy Bowles, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Philip Bowles and Hiram Johnson, Jr., son of the Governor of California. The wedding takes place this evening at "The Pines," the home of the bride's parents.

For Pocket Billiards Title.
TRENTON, N. J., May 29.—Alfred De Oro, former pool champion, who was defeated for the pocket billiards championship in the Philadelphia tournament some weeks ago, is to meet Edward Ralph of Hightstown, N. J., his victor, for \$1000 a side in a return match here tomorrow night.

The play will continue three nights and will consist of 200 points each night. Alexander Brooks of Philadelphia will referee the contest.

Former Governor B. B. Glenn presided over the exercises which were opened with a historical address by Rev. A. R. Shaw, of Charlotte.

Kentucky Knights Templar.
PARIS, Ky., May 29.—Paris is in gala attire in honor of the Kentucky Knights Templar, whose sixty-fifth annual convocation opened here today with the prospect of being one of the most notable gatherings ever held by the fraternity in the Blue Grass state. Commanders are here from Louisville, Lexington, Paducah, Henderson and numerous other cities. The convocation will continue over tomorrow.

Tornado Leaves Seven Dead in its Wake

TULSA, OKLA., SHAKEN BY BIG WIND STORM

TULSA, Okla., May 29.—Seven persons were killed, three probably fatally injured and a score or more less seriously hurt when a tornado swept through the village of Skiatook, 18 miles northwest of Tulsa and the neighboring farm lands and oil fields last night. The property loss is estimated at \$75,000. Wire communication was severed and the extent of the storm was not known until messengers arrived here late today. The dead:

—Mrs. Dalton.
—Olson and wife and three children.
—12 year old son of George Mayhew.

The storm, which approached from the northeast, swept down the valley for five miles before it struck the town of Skiatook. A number of farm buildings were wrecked and 20 houses in Skiatook were demolished. The twister passed from Skiatook into the oil fields, razing derricks, tanks and pumping stations. Three storm cellars in Skiatook sheltered 75 persons. Relief parties went from Tulsa in automobiles.

FLY SEASON COMING.

These days mark the dawn of another fly season. In fact, recent advice indicates that an occasional fly has been sighted here and there. Swat him and do it now. Remember so far as the fly question is concerned, a swat in time saves nine. Some enthusiastic mathematician has figured out for us, that laboring under perfect conditions, a Mrs. Fly will lay 120 eggs, which mature into flies in from twelve to fifteen days. Swat her. These in turn produce 7,200 grandchildren twelve to fifteen days later. Swat them. The next generation, we are told, reaches the enormous number of 432,000 to be swatted. And so on, until by fall or late summer our mathematician estimates that the grand total number of descendants of this one original Mrs. Fly amounts to some 1,096,181,249,310,720,000,000,000, or a mass having a cubical content greater than the earth itself. Too many to swat. A few ciphers more or less mean, nothing to us. Such figures are mathematics gone mad. It simply emphasizes the fact that a swat in time saves nine, if not more.

As a matter of fact, comparatively few descendants from each successive generation of flies ever live to reach maturity or old age. A very few withstand the rigor of winter and herald in lies our cure. If we can successfully combat these few now and abolish their breeding places, our lot for the summer will be easier.

It has been well said that "A man's flies are they of his own household."

We are fast learning that the number of flies in a house or community is an excellent index to the sanitary conditions or cleanliness of that house or community. Some day, soon, we will consider the fly as much a disgrace in our home as we now consider the bedbug. In fact, it is already so but we don't know it yet.

To a very large extent our freedom from flies for the summer depends on the effectiveness of our first attacks during the next few months. Five or ten cent investments in wire cloth fly swatters placed in the hands of small boys and girls yield excellent returns. Their enormous amount of exuberance and youthful enthusiasm may be put to good purpose in this manner, instead of letting it run to waste under the name of mischief.

In the meantime, if all possible breeding places, such as manure piles, night soil, garbage and filth of all kinds are effectively destroyed, removed or buried, the result so far as flies and disease are concerned will be well worth the effort. Let's try it.

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

Surgeon Is Stabbed In Charlotte

A movement was immediately proposed to divide the city in blocks of ten and it is expected that the scheme will work beautifully and that "before you can say Jack Robinson," the remaining \$8,900 will be on hand; "all that is needed to make the convention a success and redeem the pledges made by the Baltimore committee when it went to Washington last winter and induced the National Committee to bring the convention to Baltimore," says the Baltimore Sun.

In Mr. Mack's opinion, the Convention will be the biggest political gathering ever held in America, and will attract more people to Baltimore than have ever attended a National Convention of either of the great political parties. The demand for tickets to the Convention has been unprecedented, and Mr. Mack estimates that the number of visitors to Baltimore on account of this gathering will reach 150,000. It is proposed to make the distribution of tickets as equitable as possible. The tickets will be non-transferable, and in order that the ticket speculators may not thrive at the expense of the party, Chairman Mack thinks that if any man should be caught selling a ticket, he should be sent to jail if there is any way of doing it. We have no doubt that Baltimore will be able to provide for the convention more handsomely than any other convention of the party has been taken care of. It is to be expected, of course, that there will be a great deal of gouging at the hotels, and the delegates will doubtless be packed like sardines in many places, but those who can not be comfortably accommodated in Baltimore will find delightful conditions, excusing the weather, in the town of Washington, only about an hour's travel distant from the convention city. We may be sure that Chairman Mack and his committee will do all they can for the comfort of the delegates, who will be gathered in Baltimore at the birth of the party of freedom. If the convention itself will do as well in the nominations and the platform as Mack and his associates will do in taking care of the material part of the Convention there will be great rejoicing in November when the party of the constitution shall come into our father's house to stay.—Charlotte Observer.

"Infant Damnation" Clause. We are unreservedly glad that the Southern Presbyterian General Assembly voted to change the phrase "elect infants dying in infancy" to "being elect, all dying infants in infancy." This former expression has been the cause of debate, of controversy and from the mockers, of ridicule, without end. For the phrase "elect infants" it has been contended with much reason that no other import than the one now declared was ever meant and many learned researchers into Calvin and the days of the Westminster divines have been made to establish the point. But that could never by any serious question that the words lent themselves to the hostile construction, hence, if the early divines did indeed choose their language unfortunately, it would be doing their memory and church traditions a service to set the matter straight. For the present good of the church this change had become seriously required. It does not come as a modification of faith but simply as a re-statement of faith. It leaves the continuity doctrine as interpreted by the church absolutely intact. There is no question of "electing" the white father or there should not be. From many conceivable standpoints the proposed substitute is wise. It will be ratified by the presbyteries, we believe.—Charlotte Observer.

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The Crisis

We had hoped for Mr. Taft's nomination because we believe the issue of Rooseveltism would bequest to the country a legacy of evil no less burdensome than the evils that it inherited from the free silver campaign. But apparently a shattered and demoralized Republican party is powerless to check Mr. Roosevelt's insatiable ambition and we must accept the situation as it is.

If the Republican party wishes to go on record in favor of Roosevelt and a third term, the Democratic party can meet the issue.

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What a Big, New Hotel Means.

Here are a few facts and figures profitable for reflection for any Asheville citizen. The New Langren hotel, equipped, will represent an expenditure of well above \$300,000. There has been a weekly payroll of nearly \$15,000 for 55 weeks, and this will continue for something like four weeks longer. On the average 130 men have been employed in the construction of the hotel, the total expenditure on account of wages is now about \$82,000.

These workmen Saturday evening pay money over to some four or five firms each; all told there must be 400 or more bills to be paid every Saturday night out of this payroll.

Thanks for an order from the proprietors of the Langren, the new furniture factory started off with enough business to keep its men employed nearly sixty days. There are 40 men on this payroll.

Will the payroll stop when the hotel is finished? Yes, just as a new one is made out. It will take an army of help to run house; seven cooks, waiters, clerks, porters, chambermaids, clerks, housekeepers, workmen. That is a payroll that will be continuous if we people of Asheville realize what the new hotel means to us as a city.

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Byrd Marion is Re-arrested

Clerk of Court Good Testifies That Bullet Hole in Chair Where Massey Sat Could Only Have Been Fired by Marion. WYTHEVILLE, Va., May 24.—Six witnesses testified today in the trial of Claude Allen for the murder of Judge Massey, among them being Clerk Dexter Good, of Carroll county. During Good's testimony the bullet-seared chair in which the slain jurist sat was put in evidence and the witness described the position in which he saw Byrd Marion just before the shooting began. He said one of the bolts in the chair could have been made by a bullet fired from where he saw Marion.

Wednesday Marion was released on bail, but evidence brought out during the trial now in progress so implicated him that he was re-arrested.

Four of the jurors whose verdict finding Floyd Allen guilty precipitated the Asheville tragedy were witnesses against him. One of them saw a bullet strike Miss Bettie Ayres and looking up saw Claude Allen with a gun pointing in that direction.

The other witness was a civil engineer who displayed and explained maps he had made of the Carroll county court room, the maps showing where bullets had struck and their range.

WASHINGTON, May 27.—Senator Bankhead, chairman of the Underwood national campaign committee, issued the following statement today: "As to the result of the Virginia state convention and the election of delegates in North Carolina Saturday: Governor Wilson has six and one-half votes in Virginia and no more. These were accorded him as a compromise to some of his ardent friends in Virginia. Wilson's six and one-half votes will be given to Governor Wilson on the first ballot, after which the unit rule will be applied in accordance with the rule of the convention. Therefore, after the first ballot Mr. Underwood will have the 24 votes from Virginia. Our advice is that the delegates in North Carolina should vote in that state. Any other statement is a deliberate attempt to mislead the voters of North Carolina and the parties who make it known that it is totally incorrect. We are far more interested in the success of the Democratic party in November than we are in who shall be nominated at Baltimore."

WASHINGTON, N. C., June 4.—News reached here this morning of one of the most brutal and cold-blooded murders ever committed in this country, when Joe R. Gibbs, a white man, residing in Bath, N. C., about 20 miles from here, it is alleged, killed his two year old son by cutting his throat from ear to ear with a razor.

The facts as nearly as can be learned are that Gibbs, who was a widower, resided with his mother and child, yesterday afternoon late entered the home and found his son playing on the floor with another child. He called to him "Come here honey Daddy wants you" and took the child in an adjoining room. His sister happened to pass the door a few minutes later and heard a gunshot. She started to enter the room, but Gibbs, who was putting his son to sleep, She opened the door to deliver some message and was horrified to find the child lying on the bed with its throat slashed from ear to ear, and the head nearly severed from the body. She screamed and the rest of the family entered the room. The father in the meantime leisurely walked out on the porch as if nothing had happened. When questioned he said he had a motive for killing the child, but would not divulge it.
