

CALL FOR DEMOCRATIC PRIMARY.

At a meeting of the Democratic Executive Committee of Pitt County, held in Greenville, on Saturday, the 13th day of July, 1912 the following resolution was adopted relative to the holding of voting primaries at all the voting precincts of Pitt County to nominate Legislative, County and Township candidates to wit:

Be it resolved by the Democratic Executive Committee of Pitt County this day in session assembled, that this Democratic Voting Primary be and the same is hereby ordered to be held in the County of Pitt and for the purpose of placing places designated by law for the general election of the various precincts of Pitt County on Saturday, the 17th day of August, 1912, for the purpose of nominating by ballot Democratic candidates for the Legislative, County and Township officers of the County of Pitt and for the purpose of electing Democratic Executive Committee members from the various townships of said county at which said primary election all Democratic Electors, who are qualified and entitled to vote at the general election to be held on November, 1912, shall be entitled to vote. That the polls shall be opened and kept open from seven o'clock a. m. until sunset in all the voting precincts of said county and said primary election shall be held and conducted in accordance with the plan for holding Primary Elections described by the State Democratic Executive Committee.

At the close of the voting, the poll holders, in the presence of all such Democrats as may choose to attend, shall proceed to count the ballots and make a list of the persons voted for and the office and the number of votes received by each person for each of said offices and they shall sign such list in duplicate and send the original thereof immediately to the Chairman of the County Executive Committee and the copy thereof to the Chairman of the Township Executive Committee; and for the purpose of ascertaining and declaring the result of said primary election the Democratic Executive Committee of Pitt County shall meet in the Court House in the town of Greenville on Tuesday, the 26th day of August, 1912, at 10 o'clock a. m. and shall open, tabulate, canvass and declare the result of said primary election in accordance with the Democratic plan of organization.

That all persons who are to be voted for at the said primary election for legislative, county and township offices shall cause to be filed with the Chairman or Secretary of the County Executive Committee on or before 12 o'clock noon, on Wednesday, the 7th day of August, 1912, a written notice of their candidacy and shall pay to the Treasurer of the County Executive Committee of the county such sum as shall be determined by the Executive Committee of the County as may be his or their necessary part for defraying the expenses incident to holding said Primary Election, and shall also subscribe to a pledge that he will abide by the result of the primary election and support the successful candidate or candidates chosen in said primary election in accordance with the Democratic plan of organization.

That all matters and things arising in respect to holding said primary election not herein provided for are referred to the Central Executive Committee of Pitt County with full power to act and their action shall be deemed and held to be the action of the executive committee.

That the person receiving a majority of the votes cast for the particular office for which he is a candidate shall be the Democratic nominee for said office in the general election to be held in November, 1912. That if no candidate for any office voted for in the primary of August 17, 1912 receive a majority of the votes cast for all of the candidates for that respective office then a second primary is hereby called to be held on Saturday, the 7th day of September, 1912, to be held under the same rules and regulations as the primary of August 17, 1912, at which said second primary the only persons who shall be voted for for any one office shall be the two persons receiving the two largest numbers of votes cast for said office, at the primary on August 17, 1912, provided any candidate for any office who receives the second highest number of votes cast for such office at the first primary shall file with the Chairman of the Democratic Executive Committee of Pitt County written notice within five days for the date of the vote of the first primary is canvassed, that he demands a second primary, and if no such written demand is filed the person receiving the largest number of votes cast for said office in the first primary shall be declared the winner of said office.

Will Disarm Americans in Mexico

EL PASO, Tex., July 29.—Ominous reports from the Mexican frontier declaring that rebels had determined to disarm Americans in the insurrection zone and that guarantees of protection were to be withdrawn, were confirmed in part today by Louis Luch, a Mexican, who fled from Chihuahua, Chihuahua, with his family last night.

El Paso, July 29.—The correspondent of the El Paso Herald wired a statement here today declaring that General Inez Salazar, second in command of the Mexican rebel army, had made several addresses Sunday in which he asserted that all Americans in the rebel zone were to be disarmed and all protection guarantees for American citizens withdrawn.

Salazar is reported as saying that inasmuch as the American government had treated the rebels as bandits they may as well act such parts.

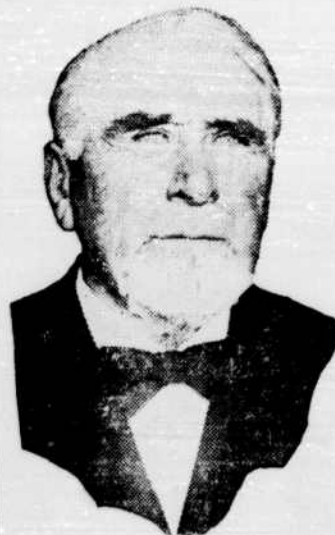
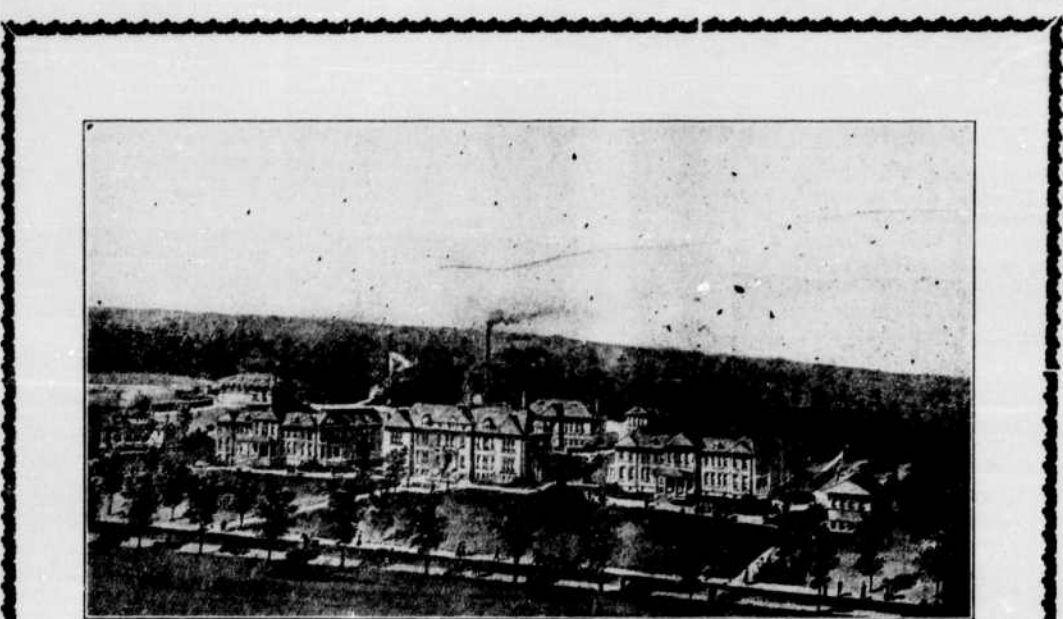

These are good looking for certain purposes, but on a midsummer afternoon the more delicate colorings have a greater charm and there are plenty of the light toned tulle to choose from. These with white grounds strewn with nosegays in Dresden colorings or in soft rather dull shades of blue and rose and violet, etc. are perhaps the most satisfactory, but there are others, equally attractive, of pale toned grounds, faint rose, blue de ciel, maize, lilac with scattered floral design in harmonizing colors.

Kitchen Craft

Egg Plans
