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# MEETING IN BAPTIST CHURCH

Rev. C. E. Madrey, of Tabernacle church, Raleigh, who is here assisting in the meeting in the Baptist church, is a preacher of ability and force and his sermons are much enjoyed. His subject Tuesday afternoon was "Christ's Dealing With the Man Who Falls." He showed where the man who falls is given another chance and that he never finds peace and happiness until he comes back and stands by the side of Christ. He used the parable of the draught of fishes and said too many professed Christians waste their time in the shallow waters, that is merely play at religion and keep in touch with worldliness at the same time. Christ would have them "launch out in the deep" where their efforts will result in something. And He never bids His followers go anywhere that He is not ready to go with them.

Tuesday night Mr. Madrey's subject was "How to Reach the Masses," the scripture lesson being from the parable of the sower where Christ said go out in the highways and come and dwell with them. To win men for Christ you must first be conscious of their need, that is believe that they are lost as God says they are. Then there must be a belief in Christ as the only source of salvation, for "there is no other name given among men whereby ye must be saved." Morality and good works are commendable, but nothing will save a soul outside of belief in Christ. And people must be taught in the same spirit of love that Christ has for them. The speaker pictured the appalling condition here in what we call an evangelized land, with such a large per cent of the people lost through unbelief in Christ, many even within the shadow and sound of our churches.

**Russia's Championing of Serbia's Interests to Culminate in War With Austria-Hungary, Europeans Fear**

**MOBILIZATION OF TROOPS IN A LARGES SCALE MEANS THAT AUSTRIA INTENDS TO KEEP SERBIA FROM HAVING PORT ON THE ADRIATIC—RUSSIA BELIEVED TO BE ON WAY TO SUPPORT BALKAN STATE CLAIMS—DIPLOMACY REACHES BREAKING POINT.**

**FIGHTING IN TURKISH FRONT CONTINUES**

**BERLIN, Nov. 25.—**Relations between Austria-Hungary and Serbia are now so strained that political circles in Vienna have abandoned hope of the preservation of peace, according to the Neue Gesellschaftliche Correspondent, which says it has its information from a diplomatic source.

Despite official Austrian denials of the reported mobilization of the Austro-Hungarian army the Correspondence declares that five army corps have already mobilized and the reserves continue to be called up in large numbers.

The Austro-Hungarian government continues, is resolved not to await the return of the Serbian troops operating against the Turks and an ultimatum to Serbia be expected within a few days.

The situation has become more acute through the changed attitude of Russia. Sergei Sazonoff, the Russian foreign minister, after having declared suitable as a basis for further negotiations the Austrian proposal guaranteeing Serbia a free port on the Adriatic Sea and a Serbian railway through Albania, but without territorial rights has now abandoned this standpoint.

Austria is now disposed to push the matter to a decision because if war is inevitable she wants to take advantage of her mobilization being more advanced than that of Russia.

**Servians Arming The Belgrade Forts**  
VIENNA, Nov. 25.—It is reported here that the Belgrade forts are being hastily armed with heavy guns by the Serbian war office. Information has also been received that all the Serbian troops who can be spared from Priestend and Monastir have been recalled to the Serbian capital.

**Loss of Warships a Handicap to Turks**  
LONDON, Nov. 25.—The loss of the Turkish cruiser Hamidieh is a severe handicap to the Ottoman commander in chief, according to special dispatches from the front. The guns of the other Turkish warships are almost ineffective for the purpose of stopping the Bulgarian advance.

The battleship Mesoudieh, which was formerly employed for the defense of Rodosto and latterly in the left flank of the Tehtaltja lines has now been dispatched to the Black Sea in order to strengthen the menaced right flank of the Turkish army.

Considerable activity has been observed among the Bulgarians who have brought up some heavy siege guns which are being rapidly placed in position to command the Turkish quarters at Hademkeul.

LONDON, Nov. 25.—A special dispatch from the Turkish headquarters at Hademkeul confirms that the Ottoman troops captured six Bulgarian prisoners during the last engagement with the Bulgarian right wing on the Tehtaltja lines. The Bulgarians also left six field guns and one machine gun on the field.

Another special dispatch from Antivari says Austria Hungary is mobilizing a striking force at Port Ragusa, which is worth \$19,950.

**WINSTON-SALEM, Nov. 25.—**What is perhaps the largest damage suit ever instituted in Forsyth county has been brought by Kerner Bros., of Kernersville, trading as the American Hosiery Mill, against the Southern Railway Company and John Snider, where they are suing for \$95,950.

The plaintiffs allege that the building in Kernersville occupied by the American Hosiery Mills was set on fire by sparks from an engine owned by the Southern Railway Company which John Snider was the engineer. They further allege that the machinery and manufactured goods, and goods in process of manufacture, together with merchandise in the building, were worth \$80,000 and that the building was worth \$19,950.
