Girls Dormitory at Dawson College Is Burned to the Ground

KINSTON, Dec. 14.—A report reached here yesterday morning telling of destruction by fire of a girls dormitory at Industrial Christian College at Dawson, eight miles from here, last night. The blaze was spectacular and a number of thrilling escapes are reported. An overheated stove in a teacher's room was responsible for the fire. Starting on the first floor of a two-story frame building, the flames spread rapidly to every part of the structure and thirty minutes later nothing was left but smoldering ashes. Forty-four female teachers and girls were in the dormitory when the fire started. A panic ensued and male students and members of the faculty effected a number of rescues. Only two of the students had retired. The fleeing girls had to run between flames and walls, make their escape from the main corridor to the campus. In the confusion a number of them fainted, some of them in the building. Boys carried several to safety. Matthe Bone, Spring Hope, N. C., fell the distance of a flight of stairs and has a broken collar bone. Several were slightly burned. Miss Koons, States Line, Pennsylvania, and Earl Rooks, Havelock, N. C., a rescuer leaped safely from the second story window. Not a single piece of personal property nor a cent in money was saved by roomers, who today are being cared for by neighboring farmers, while a committee is raising funds here to send them home. Several are here from the very young, the college grading a little better than a high school.

Second Trial on Murder Charge

HELENA, Mont., Dec. 15.—The first degree murder case of Walter Whitworth was called for trial before Judge Clements here today. Whitworth was tried and convicted on a charge of murdering Andy Levin on Willow Creek last spring. He was sentenced to life imprisonment, but later secured a new trial by an appeal to the supreme court.

Local Market Sold Nearly Two Million Pounds While the Twin City Market d Something Over 3 Million.

RALEIGH, Dec. 10.—Winston-Salem had a big lead over all North Carolina tobacco markets for November according to reports of sales just summarized by the state department of agriculture. Winston-Salem's sales aggregated 4,563,374 pounds compared with 1,394,112 pounds by Greenville, the next highest market. Total sales for the state were 27,451,683 pounds against 26,628,129 pounds for November, 1912. The Henderson, Winston, Rocky Mount, Reidsville, Kinston, Roxboro and Oxford markets all sold more than one million pounds each. The sales by markets follow:

W. M. BOND JUDGE

Election Lawyer Was Appointed by Governor Craig Yesterday.

RALEIGH, Dec. 14.—Hon. W. M. Bond, widely known attorney of Edenton, was yesterday appointed judge of the superior court to succeed Hon. Stephen C. Bracey resigned, and will begin the circuit shortly after Christmas.

Mr. Bond's appointment came as no surprise. He had the endorsement of almost all the members of the eastern North Carolina bar. He had often been backed by his friends for one of the judgeships before the re-districting had been completed, but he never sought the place and discouraged the activity in his own interest.

After the resignation of Judge Bracey several weeks ago, the Bond men renewed their interest and from all parts of the east, particularly in the first district, came appeals to Governor Craig to name Mr. Bond. Yesterday the governor telegraphed his secretary the brief message: "Announce Bond's appointment."

Mr. Bond is one of the ablest lawyers of the east. He has been often declared the brightest man in speech in that section. He has been active in politics a great many years and his going on the bench will add strength to it.

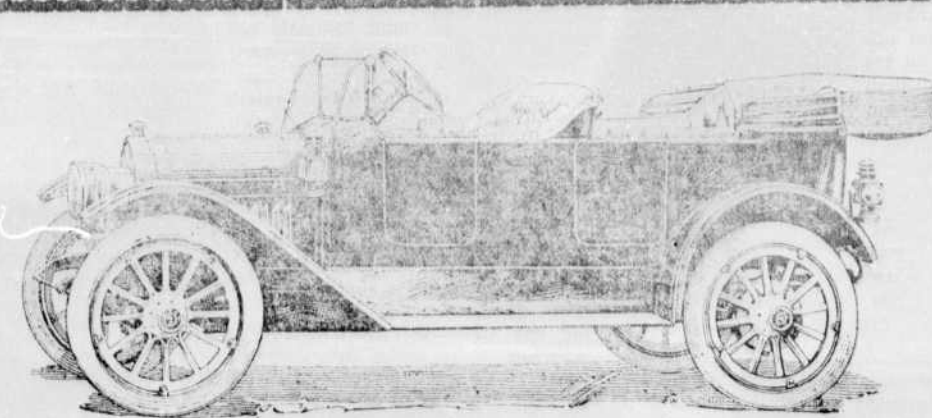
