FIGURES IN WAR.

War history has been made three times before on April 19, the date of President Huerta's refusal to salute the flag in apogee for the arrest of American marines. Here are the instances:

April 19, 1775.
Battle of Lexington and Concord. First bloodshed of the revolution.

April 19, 1861.
Sixth Massachusetts fired on at Baltimore. First bloodshed of the civil war.

April 19, 1898.
Congress declares Cuba free and independent, and demands withdrawal of the Spanish troops. War declared.

April 19, 1914.
Huerta refused to accede to demand of United States that he salute the United States flag.

April 20, 1914.
President Wilson asks Congress to authorize him to use the army and navy to enforce the demands of the U. S. for redress for insults to the American flag.

SMITH-POLLARD Murder Trial

3 O'clock Wednesday Hon. F. C. Harding Opened the Argument For State

FRIDAY

At a late hour Thursday afternoon the jury having been duly drawn and empaneled, the trial of S. M. Pollard, for murder in the second degree, began in earnest. Owing to the late hour only one witness took the stand this being Dr. D. S. Morrill for the state.

The testimony of Dr. Morrill was as follows:

He stated that about 10:15 o'clock Saturday night January 17 he received a phone message to come to the home of T. H. Smith and that he arrived there about ten minutes later. Upon his arrival he found Smith with a pistol shot wound in the left side of the abdominal region. Smith asked him for help. He told Smith that there was nothing that could be done unless he could get him to a hospital where he could undergo an operation. To this Smith replied that he would rather die than to be in the hospital. Smith then told Dr. Morrill how the shooting occurred which as he stated was as follows:

That he entered the store of S. M. Pollard and that Pollard said to him, "Smith get out of here, get out of here." He then stated that he asked Pollard what for, and that without other words Pollard drew his revolver and fired the fatal shot.

Dr. Morrill testified that Smith was carried to the Washington hospital on the midnight train, where he died about six o'clock Sunday morning, having made no other statement than the above mentioned.

After the cross examination of the witness by counsel for the defense, Judge Daniels ordered the court take a recess until 9:30 this morning.

After court had adjourned and the jury retired, counsel for the defense applied to Judge Daniels, under a writ of habeas corpus, for the release of Pollard under bond in the sum of \$10,000. This was opposed by counsel for the state, and there was much discussion on both sides, and the matter ended for the time being by Judge Daniels saying he would take it under consideration until today for his decision.

court assembled this A. M. at 9:30 and it was decided by Judge Daniels that he would take up the matter of writ of capias at the noon hour.

First witness for prosecution this A. M. was Mr. F. S. Corbitt whose testimony was as follows:

That he went into Pollard's drug store for a cigar about 10:00 o'clock Saturday night Jan. 17th, where some boys were playing a punch board. Pollard was behind the counter. After a very short time Smith entered by front door placed hands inside pockets walked toward rear and stopped. Corbitt said he noticed Pollard watching Smith. As Corbitt started to leave store he heard someone say "get out of here," Corbitt then turned and as he did so, he heard the second command, "get out of here" and a revolver report followed immediately. Says that there were only a few seconds from the time Pollard said get out of here and the time of the firing of a gun. The two clunks and a second shot was then fired, and that Pollard had hold of the breach of the

Less Than Three Hundred Americans are Now Left In Capital of Mexico

Pollard went to the cigar case and sold Hobgood's package of cigarettes. He started off. Smith was standing near middle of store. Hobgood heard Pollard say "get out" and turned and saw Pollard coming with a revolver drawn on him, and he fired into him. After shot was fired Smith sprang forward and took hold of barrel of gun, Hobgood then ran to Turnage's store where he found the night policeman and told him that Pollard had shot Chief Smith. He stated that he did not go back to the drug store and that when he saw Smith again he was being carried across the street to his home. Mr. Hobgood held his testimony in cross examination.

Seventh witness was Rufus Skinner an eye witness. That he lived four miles from Farmville, and that he and his brother, had come to Farmville to the moving picture show. That he lit the show about ten o'clock and as he passed Pollard's store a bunch of boys were passing a punch board. Pollard was standing at counter waiting on boys. Skinner stated about 10 minutes, came in with coat unbuttoned and hands in side pants pockets and one of the boys asked Smith to take a chance and he replied that he didn't want to. Pollard moved to the cigar show case. Smith was standing a little distance. Skinner stated that he saw Pollard and that he saw him fire the fatal shot. Skinner said he heard Pollard say "get out of here" and a shot was fired. Skinner said he fled from the store.

Eighth witness was Roy Skinner an eye witness. He stated that he was in Farmville at that same occasion as the boys witness. Smith came in and walked toward middle of store. Skinner stated that he heard Pollard say "get out of here." Smith said what does this mean and without other words Pollard fired at him. Skinner ran out and later returned to the store where he saw Pollard say "that Smith had cursed him like a dog the week before and that he man could do that."

Ninth witness was C. E. Bowen of Martin county an eye witness. That he was in Farmville on business Saturday night Jan. 17th, and that Saturday night he was in Pollard's drug store where a bunch of boys were playing a punch board. A few minutes Chief Smith entered the door with his hands in his side pants pockets. When he first came in he walked to the boys and passed to the middle of the store. Bowen stated that he heard someone say "get out of here" and immediately a revolver shot was fired. He turned and saw the two men clinched and they rushed out of the door. He looked through the window and saw Pollard's right hand on the breach of a revolver and Smith's left hand on the handle of a pistol. He heard a shot and saw the two men separated. The two men were then taken from the store. That when near the door Smith drew a revolver from his hip pocket and turned, fired at Pollard.

Tenth witness L. C. Turnage. The pistol is produced by Mr. Turnage and some of the charges being still loaded. Sheriff Dickey was ordered to unload same within 10 days.

Mr. Turnage is mayor of Farmville and said that a Saturday night January 17th, that he was in office in his store. That about 9 o'clock Chief Smith came in and that at that time he was in a good condition. About 10 o'clock Turnage was told that S. M. Pollard had shot Smith. Turnage rushed in and found Mr. Corbitt and Mr. Askew endeavoring to separate the men. Smith said "he has shot me and killed me for nothing." Mr. Turnage and Mr. Belcher and Askew started to take Smith out. Just before leaving the door Smith drew a revolver from his left hip pocket and fired at Pollard. On the way home Smith remarked several times that he was going to die. Turnage says that he was in the bank Monday or Tuesday before the shooting, and that Pollard came to the window and asked him what he would sell him a pistol for Mr. Turnage told him that he would sell him one for 10 per cent profit.

Immediately after the adjournment at 12:45 the counsel again met with the Judge in conference to continue the motion for writ Habeas Corpus to allow the defendant bail in the sum of \$10,000. After a warm discussion of the matter Judge Daniels refused to allow writ of habeas corpus. He said he would wait until he heard from Mr. Pollard.

Afternoon Session.

This afternoon session of court convened at 2:30 o'clock and went on until this paper went to press the following witnesses for the prosecution had testified:

J. K. Spivey whose testimony was as follows: That he began work at the store of T. C. and J. W. Turnage January 1st. On Monday or Tuesday of the week before tragedy, Pollard came into the store to purchase an automatic gun and Mr. Spivey sold him one. The pistol with which Pollard shot Smith was brought into court and identified by Mr. Spivey as the one sold him Saturday night he was at Turnage's store and states that he went to Pollard's drug store about 20 or 25 minutes after shooting had occurred. He also states that the only statement which he heard made was that of Pollard who said that Smith had cursed him to everything he could think of a few days before and that now he had put an end to it.

Andrew Moore, who testified that he was night police. That at the time of the shooting on Saturday night, January 17th that he was in the rear of Turnage and Co.'s store and that previous to this time he had talked to Smith and knew him to be in a sober state. That upon hearing of the shooting he went immediately to Pollard's store. He entered the drug store where he saw the two men clinched. Pollard holding the breach of a pistol and Smith holding the barrel. He caught Pollard's wrist and tried to part them when Smith said "don't pull my arm like that, Pollard has shot and killed me for nothing." and he shot at Smith with a revolver. He heard him to everything that he could think of an that he had put up with it his late time. The two men were then separated and Smith was carried from the store. That when near the door Smith drew a revolver from his hip pocket and turned, fired at Pollard.

Mrs. T. H. Smith, who testified that she was the wife of the late T. H. Smith. That she had been married 9 1-2 years. That they had one child who was now dead. That on the night of Saturday, January 17, her husband was brought home and that he had been shot.

Refugee Train Left There Last Night With Five Hundred, Enroute to Puerto, Mexico.

CONGRESS ASKED FOR APPROPRIATION PREVENT EPIDEMIC

Reports Coming From Cordoba States That Seven Americans Were Executed There Yesterday by the Federals. Upon Investigation Secretary Bryan Has Been Unable To Have Report Confirmed

WASHINGTON, April 29.—(Special)—Less than three hundred Americans remain in Mexico City. It is the smallest number in that city in half a century according to official dispatches received here. Most of those remaining are expected to take chances and stick in the capital. Jammed refugee train with more than five hundred Americans; several Englishmen and Germans left the Mexican capital last night enroute to Puerto, Mexico, where they will board an American transport. Swamped by influx of refugees from the war scene desperate efforts to care for them are being made by the treasury, public health, labor, state, war and navy departments. Secretary McAdoo asked congress to appropriate one hundred thousand dollars to be used by the public health service to prevent the epidemic that generally hits Mexico about this time each year. The safety of the thousands of American soldiers now in that country.

VERA CRUZ, April 29.—The fighting fifth brigade are still fighting aboard the transports tied up at the docks while General Funston is conferring with Admirals Badger and Fletcher completing details to transfer the control of Vera Cruz from navy to army. Administrative forces of the city now completely organized. Every report from Mexico City indicates that the danger of Americans have passed for the present. Although agreeing to mediation plan Argentine, Brazil, Chile powers are asking Americans to leave interior. Huerta doing everything possible to strengthen his forces. Officially treating with Bandit rebel Zapata with view of forcing an alliance.

WASHINGTON, April 29.—Marching time was the diplomatic status of the Mexican mediation program today. Secretary Bryan stated that this government was on a standstill regarding mediation, pending some affirmative action by Argentine, Brazil and Chile mediations. That representatives of Brazil, Argentine and Chile would act alone without injecting any European powers into the situation. So far as is known as stated by Secretary Bryan no further work has been received from Villa or Carranza. Confirmation was lacking Bryan stated at the reports of several Americans being executed at Cordoba and Aguascalientes.

VERA CRUZ, April 29.—From reports received here there are good reason to believe that not a single American has lost his life in Mexico during last two weeks. Many jailed, but refugees stories indicate that the imprisonment was to save them from the mobs.

Under his efficient administration new and beautiful Public School houses have replaced the old. School districts have been consolidated and the attendance multiplied over and over again. The teaching force has been greatly improved in capacity and efficiency. By constant and persistent work he brought the Public School System of Pitt county up to a high standard and he put the county in the forefront of the most advanced counties of the state in educational progress.

Second. That his soul was ever on fire for the uplifting of humanity and that the education of the children was the great absorbing passion of his life which was one of constant and unselfish service.

Third. That his board regards with peculiar pleasure the fact that the most intimate and cordial relation ever existed between the board and the superintendent. That the board always found him patient and faithful in the discharge of all his duties. He was always tactful and by patient tact he was able to ally and her harmonize conflicts in school and communities when they arose.

Fourth. That in the death of Professor Ragsdale not only the county of Pitt but the entire state has sustained a great loss in its educational work.

Fifth. That each member of the board has learned by long association with Professor Ragsdale to have a generous affection for him and in his death each member feels a personal loss.

Sixth. That these declarations which he so nobly expressed the feelings of this board be spread upon its records and a copy be furnished to his bereaved family, to each member of which we tender our deepest and tenderest heart-felt sympathies, and that a copy be furnished the Greenville papers and the News and Observer for publication.

Civil Service Examination, Clerk Carrier.

An examination for clerk and carrier will be held at the post office in this city on May 9, 1914.

Age limit, 18 to 45 years on the date of the examination.

Married women will not be admitted to the examination. This prohibition, however, does not apply to women who are divorced or those who are separated from their husbands and support themselves, but they are eligible for appointment only as clerk.

Applicants must be physically sound and male applicants must be not less than 5 feet four inches in height in bare feet, and weigh not less than 125 pounds without overcoat or hat.

Free Delivery For Greenville

Postmaster D. J. Whitehead has received the order from the First Assistant Postmaster General to establish the free delivery of mail in Greenville beginning on June 22nd, and gives the following facts concerning the service for the information of the public: The city will be divided into three routes to be served twice daily, except Sunday, once in the forenoon and once in the afternoon. Three carriers and one substitute to serve these routes will be selected by civil service examination the date for which will be announced soon. After notice of the date for the examination is given, any person above 18 years of age desiring to stand the examination, can get the necessary blanks from the postmaster or local secretary of the examining board to make application. Those reaching the required mark in the examination under the rules of the Civil Service Commission, will be placed on the eligible list from which the carriers are to be selected.

The routes as designated to be served

ved are as follows:

No. 1.—That portion of the town beginning at Five Points bounded by and lying between Fifth and Twelfth street east of Washington streets, with a loop south on Evans street to Thirtieth street, a loop west on Ninth street to the Liberty warehouse and a loop west on Eight street as far as the new houses on the former Sutton property.

No. 2.—Beginning at Five Points and embracing the territory lying between Dickinson avenue and Fifth streets, on the outside trip this route will loop south on Sutton Lane to the branch, south on Pitt street to Ficklin factory, north on Pitt street to Bonners Lane through this and Clark street back to Dickinson avenue south by the Atlantic Coast Line station to cross the corner of street, north from Dickinson avenue on Raleigh avenue to Chestnut street, east on Chestnut street with a loop one block north on Pennsylvania avenue, to Grand Avenue, then through Pamlico avenue to the intersection of Elizabeth and Fifth streets, and east on Fifth street to Five Points.

No. 3.—That portion of the town lying between Fifth street and First street, and between Vance street and Short street.

The other portions of the town not embraced in these routes were eliminated by the inspector because of insufficient sidewalks, absence of street lights or sparsely settled.

A requirement of the Post-office Department is to make the establishment of city delivery service at new office contingent upon the provision of private mail boxes or receptacles at all residences and places of business. If a patron prefers he may cut a slot in the door, which will serve the same purpose. This requirement must be met and the local postmaster notified that it is done 15 days prior to the establishment of the city delivery.

FORCE OF VIBRATION.

A Musical Chord That Shattered a Huge Glass Bowl.

counts to customers were \$20,922.91,
leaving a profit of \$8,755.40. In
comparison to the plant amounted to \$11,
\$18.62. The increase of gross receipts
over the year before previous year was
\$7,735.92.

In addition to the excellent showing

ered that the plant is entitled to a
further credit of about \$5,000 for pub-
lic service rendered the town without
cost, this not being carried in the re-
port. Prior to two years ago the town
paid out of the general fund to the
Water and Light Commission a cer-
tain sum each month for the public
service, but this was discontinued af-
ter the plant became self-sustaining.
While the people of the town gener-
ally are benefited by the saving of
this amount in the general fund, the
individual consumer of electric current
and water has received a further ben-
efit in the increased discount that was
given on service the past year.

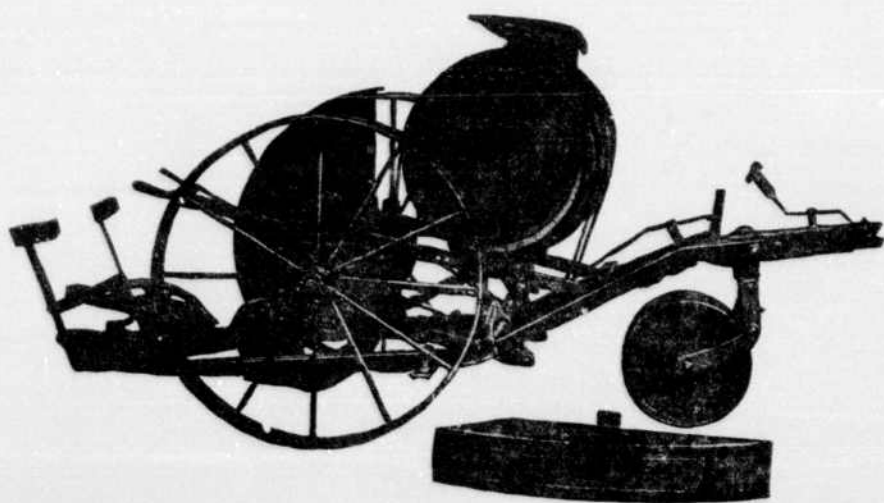

Makers of Cotton Goods in Session.

NEW YORK, April 27.—Manufacturers of cotton goods assembled here from many parts of the country today to take up for discussion and decide on matters of great importance to the cotton manufacturing industry. The occasion of the gathering is the eighteenth annual meeting of the American Cotton Manufacturers Association. The opening session was held at the Waldorf Astoria this afternoon. President Stuart W. Cramer presided and delivered his annual address. Borough President McAneny delivered an address of welcome and T. H. Fennie of Pitt City, Ala., responded for the visitors. N. C. Cobb of the Department of Agriculture, explained the spinning tests of the different government standard grades of cotton, and Ralph M. Odell, a special agent of the Department of Commerce, delivered an address on studies in foreign cotton goods markets. At the close of the convention tomorrow the members of the association will go to Boston to see the textile machinery exhibit in that city.

Great Show of Textile Machinery.

BOSTON, Mass., April 27.—All kinds of machinery and appliances in use for the economical production of cotton, woolen, silk and knit goods are to be seen in operation at the great Textile show, which was opened in Mechanics building today and will continue through the week. The exhibition is said to be the largest and most complete of its kind ever held anywhere in the world. Every process of the industry is shown, from the transformation of the raw material into threads and yarns to the weaving of the finest materials in cottons, wools and silks. Among the marvelous exhibits are machines that tie knots and looms with thousand threads running through them that come to a dead stop the moment that a single thread breaks. During the week the show will be visited by the entire membership of the American Cotton Manufacturers Association.

Utility Machine Shops.

The new enterprise located in the brick building that was formerly used as a knitting mill, is going to prove a great convenience to the community. It is equipped with modern machinery for doing all kinds of work and Mr. W. L. Stubbs, the manager, tells us that orders are already coming in fast. The plant does good work.

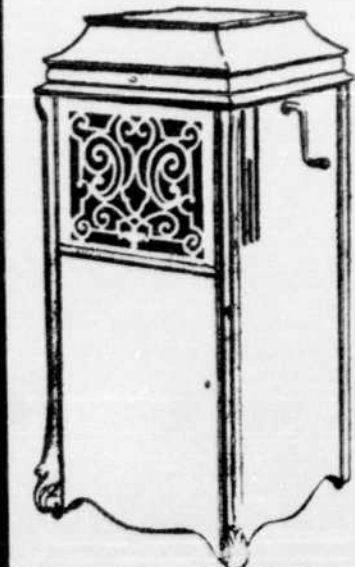

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Smith Pollard Trial

(Continued From Page Five)
The fact that a certain amount was also taken out for the house, F. S. Corbett, recalled, testified that about first of the week prior to the homicide that he was in Pollard's store. That Pollard asked him if he was in the barber shop at the time of disturbance on Saturday night before. That he replied no and asked if that was not a case that would go before his honor. That Pollard replied that he was damned if it would ever go before his honor, and that if he had had a gun with him that somebody would have had to have been carried out.

R. L. Davis testified that he had lived in Farmville since 1872. That he knew Pollard's reputation and knew his general character to be bad in some respects and had known Smith and did not know him to be a violent and dangerous man. That about 10 o'clock on Saturday of the homicide Pollard came in to him for a few minutes. That Pollard told him that on the Saturday night before that Smith had cursed him out in the barber shop. That on Thursday he had been to Greenville to see F. G. James about matter and that Davis advised him to report it to Mr. Davis. That he was in the barber shop discussing a case which he had in court when he made remarks as to E. M. Cox's integrity. That Smith went out and that a few minutes later Smith returned with Cox. That Cox began to ask what had been said about him. That Pollard replied to Smith that was causing a disturbance instead of making peace. That Smith resented it and that Pollard said that he had no pistol and was helpless. The witness further testified that he told Pollard that he would give him a hearing as early as possible. That Pollard remarked that he was not afraid of Smith or any other man living and that if he didn't get protection from the board of aldermen that he would provide other means and that if Smith undertook to abuse him again he would kill him.

Next witness H. C. Lovitt. He stated that he lived in Farmville, worked for the police force and knew Smith. Smith was home on the night of the murder. Went home about 10 o'clock. Left Smith just before going home and said he was sober.

Knew Pollard about 10 years; general reputation was bad. Said that chief Smith was violent and some years ago but of late Smith's reputation was good.

T. C. Tarnage now mayor of Farmville, that he had talked with Smith since Christmas and Smith told him that Pollard was wise to let him catch up with him, but if they would keep close to him Pollard that Smith would get him after a while for his gambling and illegal business. Said that Smith had quick temper and would fight. That he knew Pollard since he came from the army and that his reputation was bad. That Pollard had been indicted once before for kicking the preacher and was fined \$10 and cost.

Next Henry Nichols said he knew Smith. Said he went to the market about 10 o'clock on Saturday morning toward Pollard's store and heard Smith tell Pollard that he would have to carry on his business in a little different shape from what he was at that time. Pollard replied that if you don't go away from here I'll fix you so you will have to stay away. That the general reputation of Smith was good with the exception of a few of those who had trouble with him and that Smith was not a bad man and that if he arrested a man he had to go or he would club him.

W. C. Joyner, said he knew both Smith and Pollard and that he heard Pollard say that if Smith came in and around his place of business that he would ask him out and it was advisable for him to get away. Mr. T. H. Rouse said he worked for Pollard. Said that Mr. Belcher brought a message from the Solicitor General that he had been selling Heno or in other words if they were doing any crooked business in that store that he had better stop or they would investigate and that Pollard sold bottle goods and some of it was labeled Blue Ribbon but he did not know whether it was beer or not. Said that Pollard had license to sell beer. That he had seen Smith in Pollard's store and that Pollard told the labels off the Blue Ribbon bottles and sold it as near beer as that Pollard had a razor over his

It is which was frequently by numerous people, but he did not know what was going on in the room.
Tom Bowling said he lived in Farmville and that he was in Farmville until November. That he heard a conversation between Smith and Pollard and he heard Smith tell Pollard that he would have to stop doing so much unlawful business or he would take hold of him.

Mr. Robert Newton said he lived in Farmville and that he knew both Smith and Pollard. That he had been up the stairs of Pollard's store and that he had played cards in the store that they called the game "Poker" and that at times a small pot would be at stake.
He also stated that he had seen Jack pots as large as \$50.00 or more. That he saw Smith in about 45 minutes after he was shot and that Smith stated that he was shot to death but he hated to be shot by a dirty coward with out any chance to defend himself. He also stated that he heard Smith say that he had had some trouble with the bully last night. That he had had trouble with Sam Pollard and that Mr. Cox was the cause of it all, and that Pollard had been talking about Cox and in the barber shop Cox asked Mr. Pollard about it and that Pollard accused Smith of telling Cox. Smith said he did tell him and that he would back it up. He also stated that Smith called Pollard a damn feather legged rascal. That Pollard told Smith that he was not physical able to fight him and Smith replied to Pollard that he would take off his coat and fight him fair. Pollard told Smith that he would report him as he was trying to make trouble instead of having peace.

G. S. Williams testified that he was assistant agent E. C. Railroad Co. That on Monday prior to homicide he received phone message from Pollard notifying not to deliver his freight to any one except his own drayman. That on Wednesday, Smith came down to station to get Smith's freight and that he already had set one box on the platform when he was told what Pollard had said. He then remarked that he could get along without it, saying that Pollard was mad with him but that he was not mad with Pollard. Williams further testified that he was present when the crime was committed and he gave evidence which caused a true bill of murder in the first degree to be returned against Alexander.

Deputy Talbot will carry Finger to Salisbury this morning on train No. 1. When today he will be placed on trial before an ireddell county jury charged with murder in the first degree. Alexander will remain here until Finger is tried, when he also will be carried to Salisbury and tried.

Joe Maxwell, Will Kirkpatrick and Will Pitts all negroes, are material witnesses in the case, Finger in his confession of the crime, which occurred in the sheriff's office in this city when the prisoner was brought here for safe keeping implicated Maxwell, Pitts and Kirkpatrick, but all three proved alibis.

Both Finger and Alexander have been held in the county jail in this city since their arrest, though it was understood that they had been carried to the state prison farm at Raleigh.

RETURN TRUE BILL AGAINST TWO NEGROES

Charged With Murder of Preston Leyerly and Burning of Store Leyerly and Burning of Store Leyerly.

FINGER TELLS OF CRIME

Negro Woman Says She Was Asked to Put Poison in Conley's Food

ATLANTA, Ga., May 5.—Denial of the state's charge that improper means had been used in obtaining evidence tending to show that Leo M. Frank, the factory superintendent, was innocent of the murder of 14-year-old Mary Phagan, was made today by counsel for the defendant.

Various affidavits were introduced at the hearings in the Superior court on the extraordinary motion for a new trial for Frank which the defense claimed showed that no intimidation, attempted bribery, forgery or other improper means had been used in obtaining sworn statements.

The action of Frank's lawyers followed the conclusion of the county showing of the state against the plea of the convicted man's representatives for a new trial. Notice was given that further evidence would be introduced by the defense tomorrow, when, it is expected the taking of evidence will be concluded. Arguments of attorneys were held today.

An affidavit introduced by the state today from Anna Marie Carter, a negro woman, charged that she had been approached by an unknown person in the county jail and asked to put poison in the food of James Conley, the negro factory sweeper. The woman said she was a prisoner at the time and that she was given considerable freedom in the jail. Conley was the chief witness against Frank and was convicted as an accessory after the murder.

Superior Judge Hill today issued an order placing Dan C. Lehon, representative of a national detective under 1,000 bond for his appearance later before the Fulton county grand jury here. Solicitor General Dorsey, chief of the state legal forces in the case of Frank said that he desired the testimony of the detective in connection with the obtaining of an affidavit from Rev. C. R. Ragsdale. The minister asserted that he had heard Conley, the negro, confess the murder, but he later repudiated the statement.

The solicitor general tonight would not say whether he contemplated asking the grand jury to make a general investigation of methods used in obtaining evidence in connection with the extraordinary motion for a new trial for the factory's superintendent. Various persons have repudiated affidavits and claimed undue influence.

No time has been set by Superior Judge Hill for hearing of argument of the verdict sentencing Frank to be hanged. Counsel for the defendant alleged that it was illegal, as Frank was absent from the courtroom when the verdict was rendered.

Old County Home Sold.
On Monday at 12 o'clock the old county home or better known as the Poor House was sold at public auction being bid in by Mr. E. L. Wealth for \$9,025.00. At first the plot was divided into four sections and put up for sale but the sale was not satisfactory, bringing a little more than \$7,000.00.

No resolution, however, was passed by the board approving the sale but is thought that it will be approved at a called meeting on Tuesday, May 5.

Reunion Next Tuesday.
