WILSON AND HIS CABINET ARE RELIEVED

Huerta Suspends Former Order to Blockade Tampico

OUTLOOK IS MORE HOPEFUL

WASHINGTON, June 8.—Huerta's order today, suspending the order to blockade Tampico against the delivery of ammunition by the steamer Antilla to the Constitutionalists served to dispel apprehension over a new crisis between the United States and the Huerta government which had threatened mediation of Mexican affairs. Through Washington officials expressed satisfaction over Huerta's action, it was persistently suggested unofficially that the blockade had been suspended only conditionally as a result of conference between the South American mediators and the Mexican and American delegates at Niagara Falls. It also was said the Antilla might be diverted in her course through an agreement with officials of the Ward Line, her owners and an American corporation. President and Cabinet officers relieved.

President Wilson, Secretary Bryan and Secretary Daniels gave evidence of great relief over the late developments which, temporarily at least, have averted another clash at arms. From no official source was their confirmation of the reports that Huerta had not under standings with the mediators or the United States which would assure him that the Antilla's cargo would not be delivered. Meanwhile, nothing has been heard from the Antilla which is due to arrive off Tampico Wednesday morning.

Mediators Almost Ready To Throw Up the Job

Declare That Peaceful Solution Is Not Probable
THEY ARE ABOUT TO DISBAND

Villa and Carranza Have Had a Break and It Is Feared the Republic Will Become Anarchistic.

NIAGARA FALLS, N. Y., June 16.—Luis Carranza and Frederick W. Lehmann, the American delegates to the mediation conference, were here today to discuss the situation in Mexico. Just what disposition will be made of the American forces in Vera Cruz one here is in a position to conjecture.

Outlook Is Dark.
The atmosphere here is wholly pessimistic. The American delegates declined to discuss in detail their trip to Buffalo. Mr. Lehmann made a special trip across the river to Niagara Falls, where he met Carranza and his wife. Carranza, who had come from Washington, especially to see the American delegates, told them why they could not agree to an armistice; why only a man prominent in the constitutional movement could be accepted by them for the provisional presidency and finally, they said they believed the Constitutionalists army would settle the Mexican problem soon if left unhindered by foreign complications.

End of Mediation Foreseen.
The Americans returned to Niagara Falls feeling that so far as the political pacification of Mexico is concerned mediation had accomplished nothing and probably the end of the conference was very near.

The next full conference is set for Friday. Until then little will be done because of the absence of Minister Nason of Argentina. Most of the principals here incline to the view that Friday's session may be the last. The three mediating plenipotentiaries virtually have abandoned hope of solving Mexico's internal problems. The Huerta delegates are ready to accept a Constitutionalist partisan for provisional presidency and there appears no sensible way of keeping all elements in conference much longer. Only developments not now foreseen, such as change of attitude on the part of the Constitutionalists or of the Huerta delegates can keep the conference in session.

Armistice Is Impossible.
Justice Lamar and Mr. Lehmann had gone to Buffalo only in the hope of arranging some practical way for negotiating with the Constitutionalists which would be in progress. The discussion ended shortly before 7 o'clock when Carranza and Lehmann returned. When the Americans returned they telegraphed Secretary Bryan. Mr. Lehmann commented on the results of their trip to the mediators.

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Dispatches of the forcible seizure by a Villa official of the telegraph office at Juarez held previously by Carranza officials, created a stir in the mediation colony. The Huerta delegates said it plainly showed the corruptions of their repeated warning that a lack of cohesion in the Constitutionalists ranks would lead to anarchy in the north. The news served also to confirm suspicions current in many quarters here of a breach between Villa and Carranza.

Incidentally it is understood the American delegates inquired of Carranza and Carranza what they thought of the stories of a split between Villa and Carranza. The Constitutionalists emissaries said they had confidence in Carranza's good faith and ability to smooth over such difficulties.

The gravest apprehensions, nevertheless, is felt here of what may follow a break between Carranza and Villa. Should their forces clash, condition of anarchy might ensue again demand for armed intervention by the United States.

War Has Been Halting.
The mediators hold no opinion that they have accomplished anything in that war between the United States and the Huerta Government was halted by mediation. General

Captain of Ill-Fated Empress on Witness Stand

Denies That His Ship Made False Moves
IS SUFFERING FROM INJURIES

QUEBEC, June 16.—Capt. Kendall, of the Empress of Ireland, was the first witness called today when the government began its investigation into the collision between the Empress and the Storstad in the lower St. Lawrence river and the loss of more than 1,000 lives.

Kendall, injured from injuries received in the disaster. Examination of witness was preceded by the introduction of brief summaries of the facts by the counsel representing the owners of the two vessels.

Counsel for the Storstad declared that when she sighted the Empress the latter was off the starboard port. Two minutes later the fog shut down. The Storstad signalled by whistle that she was underway and keeping her course heading south by south. Their starboard continued.

When the whistle of the Empress was heard again the mate in charge of the Storstad put his wheel to port while the ship showed up. The ship did not answer properly. Two long blasts were given to indicate that the vessel was now ahead so that the vessel would not time the engine room was ordered to become unmanageable.

The captain who had gone below was called up by the mate. He asked "Can you see Father Point?" and the mate replied that it had just been shut off by the fog. He made no mention of the Empress and called the captain because he had asked to be called if it got foggy.

"When the captain got on deck he saw the mast light of the Empress three points to port. He immediately ordered full steam astern. The vessels were then about 300 feet apart. In green light of the Empress appeared. Three minutes later the vessels came together. The master of the Storstad heard a hail from the Empress telling him to keep going ahead. He had ordered this but found he could not keep the collector's nose in the wind. The Storstad was swung around until she was parallel with the liner and the collision was averted. The Empress was struck on the port side by the starboard quarter of the Empress. He had swung around in a complete circle, and in the meantime the Empress disappeared.

JACK JOHNSON MUST SERVE HIS SENTENCE

CHICAGO, June 16.—The United States Circuit Court of Appeals has affirmed a previous decision reversing portions of a decision of the lower court, which convicted Jack Johnson, negro prize fighter, of violating the Mann White Slave Act. It was also ordered that Johnson be released.

Turks Slay One Hundred Greeks

ATHENS, Greece, June 16.—Greek refugees from Asia Minor today brought reports of the massacre by Turks of one hundred Greeks, including priests, women and children in the town of Phoka, 25 miles northwest of Smyrna.

The town, according to the official report, was invaded by a horde of armed men who looted and then set fire to all the buildings. They are said to have been assisted by the Turkish police.
