SEC. DANIELS SUCCEEDS IN PLAN FOR GREAT NAVY

Sale of the Mississippi and Idaho to Foreign Powers

PURCHASE NEW DREADNOUGHT

With Money Received From the Sale Which Will Be Twice as Powerful as Both Combined, Will Name 4 Battleships

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 23.—The Secretary of the Navy is being congratulated in Washington tonight, not only in naval circles but by all friends of an adequate navy, in having secured, through his earnest recommendation the sale of the Mississippi and Idaho to a foreign power and the permission of Congress to use the proceeds of the sale for a new dreadnought. Opponents of the plan, led by Representative Mann, Republican floor leader, put up a stiff fight in the House but lost the amendment proposed by Mr. Mann which was to sell the ships and turn the money in to the treasury. Inasmuch as the naval appropriation for two dreadnoughts, this will make the third big battleship to be built in the year. Had the Mann amendment carried, it is believed that little navy men would have seen to it that loss of two minor battleships would not have been made up but the money would probably have been appropriated for far different purposes.

Secretary Daniels Puts Out Economy Efforts in Navy

WASHINGTON, June 30.—President Wilson's signature to the naval appropriation bill today authorized the construction of two super-dreadnoughts and fourteen auxiliary war vessels and the building of a third large battleship with the proceeds from the sale of the Idaho and Mississippi.

Secretary Daniels tonight pointed out that the bill carried half a million dollars less than last year's appropriation, said retrenchments had been accomplished "through economies and insistence on economy."

The 1913 building program consisted of only one super-dreadnought, six destroyers, four submarines, one transport and one supply ship.

"The navy is a seagoing institution and expenditures ashore should be subordinated to expenditures afloat has given us these advantages in new building," said Secretary Daniels. "Yet while the fleet is greatly strengthened generous provision is made for expenditures ashore that are urgently required for efficiency and economy."

CRITICIZES VIEWS OF JUDGE CLARK

MINNEAPOLIS Lawyer at Bar Convention Scores Carolina Jurist

WRIGHTSVILLE BEACH, June 29.—The second day of the sixteenth annual session of the North Carolina Bar Association was featured by an address this morning by Chief Justice Walter Clark of the North Carolina Supreme Court, on "Reform in Law and Legal Procedure," in which a number of reforms were urged, over a roast and accessories at Luncheon in the afternoon and an address to night by Hon. Home G. Brown, of Minneapolis, Minn., on "Modernizing the Constitution," in which he criticized Chief Justice Walter Clark of the North Carolina court who he said, in an address recently, denied it consistent with his high judicial position to attempt to hold up to derision the American Constitution.

Donation Day Dinner in London

LONDON, July 1.—Sir Thomas Skinner presided this evening at the customary dinner given in celebration of Donation Day. Among the notable in attendance were Prince Alexander of Teck, who is soon to become Governor-General of Canada, Lewis Duff, the Colonial Secretary, and George H. Percy, the temporary successor of the late Lord Strathcona as Canadian High Commissioner in London.

Shilman to Return.

In view of the strong influence that he has been and still is being exerted to bring about peace in Mexico, there are those who believe Carranza will yield to a conference. But even those who believe this, dwell on the difficulty of making Mexicans admit the United States really is a factor in the internal affairs of their country.

Responsibility on Carranzas

Whatever may be the present expectations of the Washington government as to the effect of recess in mediation was assured that this government would continue efforts to influence the Constitutionalists to confer with Huerfias delegates towards reaching an understanding as to some form of provisional government. It was noted that Carranza's agents have been sent to Carranza through his agents here setting forth the enormous responsibility resting on the Constitutionalists as to the fate of their country.

Pleasure of Intervention

Carranza agents here have been told to picture the possibility which might follow intervention in Mexico by the United States. They have been reminded, it is said, of the dream of Thomas Jefferson of one solid nation from the Canadian border to the Panama Canal and urged to appreciate how public opinion might force the American flag to wave for years at least over Mexico should it once be hoisted in the capital.

For Meeting of Huerfias and Constitutionalists Representatives

TO DISCUSS MEXICAN AFFAIRS

Carranza Agents Told to Picture the Possibility Which Might Follow Intervention in Mexico by United States.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 29.—With the Niagara Falls mediation over for now on the eve of a recess pending a proposed meeting of representatives of General Huerfias and the Constitutionalists to discuss Mexican international affairs, General V. Carranza, first chief of the Constitutionalists, tonight telegraphed his Washington agents that he had not heard from his associate leaders with regards to participation in such a conference.

Carranza's representatives who enter in the day have expected that some definite reply might be received by night, although later that nothing would be learned until tomorrow at the earliest. The general belief here was that it would be some time before any decision was reached.

In the event the Constitutionalists finally refuse to negotiate with Huerfias delegates over the International affairs of Mexico, it is said, a proposal between the United States and Huerfias to international problems will be completed, but with some form of provisional government. It was agreed to, it hardly could be effective so long as the internal revolution continues.

Considerable apprehension was created in official quarters over an unofficial report that General Huerfias had sent two of his children toward Mexico City. This led to a report that he was preparing to flee to save himself and family from falling into the hands of the Constitutionalists.

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
