SMITH LEADS BLEASE IN THE S. C. PRIMARY

Governor's Strongholds Among Farmers Go Over to Sen. Smith WHO WILL WIN BY 15,000

Is the Prediction at Present Making in the Lead For Governor Over the Ten Other Candidates.

COLUMBIA, S. C., Aug. 25.—Returns from the Democratic primary held today throughout South Carolina indicated that the re-nomination of Senator E. D. Smith over Cole Blease, W. P. Pollock and L. D. Jennings. With about half the vote heard from Smith has a lead of 8,200. The vote at midnight stood: Smith 35,721; Blease 25,519; Jennings 922; Pollock 833.

For governor, a second race is a certainty, with Richard I. Manning the leader in the returns up to midnight, and Robt. O. Cooper and John G. Richards as his opponents. The vote at midnight stood: Manning 11,361; Cooper 10,799; Richards 9,290; Chikscates 8,444.

Senator W. F. Evans Replies to Mr. Harding's Article of Last Week

Mr. F. C. Harding, Greenville, N. C.

Dear Sir:—

Your letter declining my invitation for a joint canvass is pitched upon such a very high plane and is filled with so much venom of the slow working kind, that I desire to call attention to a few things which seemed to have escaped your "unbiased" attention.

In the first place you deny that you had ever made any statement that you had expressed a desire to meet me in joint discussion of the political matters before the people, and of that I cannot personally testify. But while making a speech a few weeks ago at Black Jack, a gentleman who at least gives your word credence, took occasion to break into my remarks and announced to the audience that on the day before at his house before his wife and boy, you had declared to him a readiness and a desire to meet me in a joint canvass before the voters. This man still says that you told him this and names can be had for the asking. And from other sections of the county has come this same report, and your partisans have been using it as a taunt with which to accuse me of cowardice.

Germany Pressing Hard The Lines Of The Allies

Where Now Hangs The Fate of The French Nation

Weak Points Strengthened During the Night, and War Office Has Professed Confidence That the Line Will Hold. The Germans Resumed the Attack at Day Break, and are Being Heavily Reinforced at Every Point. Luneville the Scene of the Heaviest Fighting

PARIS, Aug. 26—Fate of the nation admittedly hanging on result of the Allied lines along the northern and eastern frontier which is being pressed by the entire active German army. All night the enemy brought up fresh troops. Joffre devoted his time in strengthening the weaker points of defense. The Germans resumed the attack at day break. War offices professed confidence that the line will hold. Fighting front covers boundaries departments of Nord, Ardennes, Montmedy and Meuse. At West Luneville the heaviest fighting is in progress. The French withdrew from Mulhausen, Altkirch and other points to reinforce the Lorraine border south of Luneville. Sent general Pau to fill gaps to prevent a break in the French lines north and south of Epinal.

TRYING TO DRIVE GERMANS FROM LAKES

ST. PETERSBURG, Aug. 26—Russian armies with bases at Gumbiennen in north and Bials in the south are co-operating in an effort to drive the Germans for the lake region in the eastern part of Prussia. Attacking forces with sixty miles front. The country is filled with forests, marshes and lakes.

MILITARY GOVERNMENT ESTABLISHED

AMSTERDAM, Aug. 26—The Kaiser has established military government at Belgium. It is reported that Berlin state field marshal Von Dergeltz has been appointed military governor.

U. S. CRUISERS AVAILABLE.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 26—Secretary Bryan admitted that he had received warning from Ambassador Morgenthau at Constantinople of danger of "Holy war," Secretary Daniels announced that cruisers Tennessee and North Carolina were available for service for the protection of Christians now in Turkey. Officials however, not alarmed over the situation.

FAVORABLE REPLY TO HIS PLAN

RALEIGH, N. C., Aug. 26—Governor Craig is receiving favorable replies from the Governors of cotton states for his plan of conference of the governors, cotton growers, dealers, manufacturers and bankers at Atlanta on September 3, to protect the Southern cotton situation.

NO FARMERS MEETING FOR THIS SUMMER

Hon. John H. Small in a Letter Gives Reason For Same PRESENT WAR THE PRINCIPAL Which Has Temporarily Demoralized The United States Finances on Foreign Commerce Depressed Prices of Farm Products.

Washington, D. C., August 24, 1914.

To The Farmers:—

I regret to announce that the usual Farmers Educational Meetings cannot be held this summer. A number of reasons have united to bring about this result. Congress is still in session. This horrible European War has temporarily demoralized our finances, our foreign commerce and depressed the prices of those staple farm products of which we export to Europe a large proportion, notably cotton and tobacco. Congress and the Administration are striving to avert every remedy so far as legislation can help, but law unfortunately cannot restore the demand for these products to the extent which it has been diminished by this War. Much will remain to be done by our own people through co-operation between the growers, bankers and public spirited citizens.

But I have diverged. Another and primary reason for the failure to hold these meetings was the inability of the Federal Department of Agriculture to furnish the experts to address the meetings.

I am greatly disappointed, and I feel sure that those who have heretofore attended these meetings feel a similar regret. That they have been benefited is attested by ample evidence. I have received hundreds of letters and heard very numerous expressions commending them and asking for their continuance. Through these meetings the drainage movement and our modern drainage law, which are proving such a blessing, were inaugurated. The first Corn Judging Day held in the State, or in the South for that matter, was at one of these meetings. In other respects they have emphasized better and more productive methods. If possible to do so, a series of meetings will be held next summer.

contest between Mr. Blow and myself. Now you have become a "per-simmon" higher than either Mr. Blow or myself. As candidate, you would have us believe you to be a better Democrat than as Chairman. Even now I suspect that you only regret over that contest is that your favorite was defeated, and the recollections of that defeat furnishes the real motive that prompted your declining my invitation.

"I have charged, and I now charge," is the beginning clause of your expetive sentence in which you accuse a Democratic Senator of wrong doing. You profess innocence in one line, and betray yourself in another. I was aware that you "had charged" and I wanted you to do it openly before the voters of Pitt County in a place where all was free and fair and where I could defend myself. Unlike Mr. Blow, you may have ascended into the clouds, but you do not show that confidence in your "charges" that gives you confidence to meet me on equal terms; but forthwith with the party machine which quarters in your back room office, and with the partnership and help of the present Chairman of the Executive Committee, you feel satisfied in your entrenched position. You "charge" all right; but you charge in the tent of the captain and not out upon the open battle-field. In some of the townships "friendly" influence has been able to place all the poll-books from among your friends and I am denied representation; yet you sanctimoniously appear for "an honest, Democratic Primary."

You have constantly cried that Republicans voted in the Democratic Primary, and yet until I became a candidate, as party chairman you never raised your voice against it. Two years ago republicans voted in the Democratic Primary for Mr. Blow, and who ever heard you complaining about it? If you want names and places I can furnish them. You now complain that the primary law may prevent such, and then make a bid for republican sympathy by laying the alleged fault of such law at my door. As a "primary" jurist you are consistency gone to seed. The present primary law was introduced by Mr. Clark in the original, and with the exception of substitute portions and cutting down by the Senate Committee on Elections, in his law. It does not represent my views of what a primary law should be. However, your friend Clark voted for it, and you and he like twin statesmen are of one accord. Had not the party machine of this county boasted and carried out the threat to nullify my efforts to legislate for the people of the county, you might now at least with some degree of force and truth do that which you say you do not do against democrats. You and your crowd prophesied what should be done, and the people know where the responsibility rests.

In glowing terms you proclaim yourself the upholder of peace, and promise to settle the differences that exist between the warring factions. Did it ever occur to you that it was under your administration as head of the County's Democracy that the differences have grown up? Will you as Senator become the champion of peace? Did you as chairman propose when you are present the unfair terms by the party's representative in putting the stock-law over the people in the new stock-law territory? If as senator you desire to settle their troubles, cannot you take them into your confidence and tell them how you will do it? Have you ever lifted your hand to obtain relief for them? You say that I am denouncing democrats without reason and that I charge those opposed to me as being "rascals." Surely you draw upon your imagination in shaping your facts. I regret that it is impossible to discuss politics with you, saying something that you will create them, but I can truthfully say that in all my speeches I have gone no further than necessary in describing political conditions that are written up, our county records. I have called no one a rascal, but have studied their connection with the political affairs of the county. And if perchance, in the heat of debate, I should have over-leaped the bounds of discretion, surely I have been sinned against more than sinning. Anathemas have been hurled at me, insults spoken, and rabid correspondents of recent newspapers in which to describe me, for language I have endeavored to meet these attacks with good humor, and I have suffered them or depended upon respectable language to defend myself. I, and my friends have not resorted to violence and bullying; to supplant the truth or to intimidate opponents.

Russians Advancing to Lorraine Driving Germans Back Heaviest Fighting in Vicinity of Montdidier, Where Germans Have Great Strength.

Turkey Expected to Enter Into War Today. Austrian Army Withdrawn From Lemburg. Allies Driven Back to Oise Fifty Miles From Paris. British Losses Are Heavy, Hundreds Have Been Killed And Wounded

ARTILLERY FIRE ANNIHILATING.
ROME, Sept. 2.—The Austrian army fighting from Lemburg has withdrawn. Did not enter city. General staff wished to have Lemburg bombarded. Eighth day fighting finds Austrian out numbered and hard pressed. Casualties are appalling on both sides. The artillery fire is described as annihilating. Whole bridges are mown down. They have no time to bury the dead and they collect the wounded while the battle is raging over them.

RUSSIANS THROUGH AUSTRIA
LONDON, Sept. 2.—Russian embassy has announced that "Russian advance will through Austria. Galicia continues in a most successful manner."

AUSTRIANS Routed AT POINT OF BAYONETS
ST. PETERSBURG, Sept. 2.—Sweeping success over the Austrians reported at war office. It was announced that Russian left wing was operating from a position on Dneister and captured supposedly impregnable Austrian, and heavily garrisoned position of Russians charged, position at point of bayonet swept over entrenchments completely routing the Austrian troops and five thousand Austrians were left dead in the field. The Russian have captured thirty-two big guns, more than a thousand prisoners including Commanding General is result of the success of the Russian left. Not being able to co-operate with center and retreat the Austrians were seriously menaced.

THREE HUNDREDS MILES OF BATTLE
ROME, Sept. 2.—Vienna dispatches state that a three hundred mile of battle from Prussia to the Dneister river have reached a height of fury. The Austrians have abandoned Lemburg after the bloodiest fighting battle. The Russian general staff are attempting to annihilate the entire Austrian army.

BRITISH LOSS SEVERE
LONDON, Sept. 2.—General French reports of the British losses were early fighting and killed one hundred and sixty, wounded six hundred and eighty, and there was missing forty two hundred and seventy. War office announced that the National relief fund started. Prince of Wales funds have reached ten million dollars.

ALLIES DRIVEN BACK
PARIS, Sept. 2.—It is officially stated that the Allies center holds the battle lines that run east and west through departments Oise Aisne Ardenne. It is admitted that the Allies were driven back to Oise within fifty miles of Paris.

WIRELESS STATION ATTACKED.
ANTWERP, Sept. 2.—Zeppelin was flying at the height of six thousand feet and dropped a bomb into the city. An attempt against wireless station but missed the mark. Zeppelin was forced to fly before a heavy Fusillade cannon and rifle fire from the fort. Four civilians were injured from Zeppelin bombs.
