Tobacco Sold Last Week.
The tobacco sales last week were very heavy in spite of the weather and the fact that there was a holiday. The sales continued blocked up till the last of the week. Friday's sales were light as the news of the block had become pretty well known. As had been predicted the result of such a large amount of tobacco on the market was a drop in prices. The drop, however, was not very much and the prices will soon regain their former figures if more care is used in marketing. The total sales for last week were 1,395,000 with an average of 14 cent a pound.

WANTS PRESIDENT TO POLW FOR ONE DAY.

St. Paul, Oct. 26—A note of warning to farmers and business men was sounded by E. W. Hill upon his return from the West. He said that the harvest of the crops in North Dakota is late, and despite the ideal weather, there has been little fall plowing.
Mr. Hill declares that it is vital to the welfare of the Northwest that the plowing be done in the fall, and he is arranging wide campaigns along these lines through the tanks, railroads and newspapers.
"The English and Canadian Governments," said Mr. Hill, "have taken up the fall plowing question in Canada and are pushing it vigorously. By plowing in the fall one gets the benefit of the winter moisture and is able to seed properly in the spring."
President Hill suggests that in order to give the move of fall plowing a strong impetus President Wilson do as did the Emperor of China—go into the fields and plow one day during the fall.

French Bomb Kills Fifteen.

Paris, Oct. 26—The Excelsior's correspondent at Vitry-la-Francoise says:
"The town of Revigny, 12 miles from here, where Crown Prince Frederick William had his headquarters several weeks ago, recently received a visit from a French aeroplane which dropped a bomb, killing fifteen people and injuring 22 others. The Crown prince was uninjured."

THREE MINISTERS ON SAME TEXT

And Give Their Congregations Timely Admonition.

By agreement the pastors of the Baptist, Christian and Methodist churches of the town all used the same text for their sermons Sunday night—"Thou art weighed in the balances and found wanting." After giving the incidents of the feast of Balaazar in which the words of the text occur, each of the ministers gave their hearers some striking comparisons how people of the present day are weighed by the balances of God's standard, and found wanting. Having other gods before Him, as prophesied in the first commandment; taking God's name in vain, as warned against in the second commandment; desecration of the Sabbath contrary to the fourth commandment, and failure to honor parents as enjoined in the fifth commandment, were standards the standards by which many are weighed and found wanting.

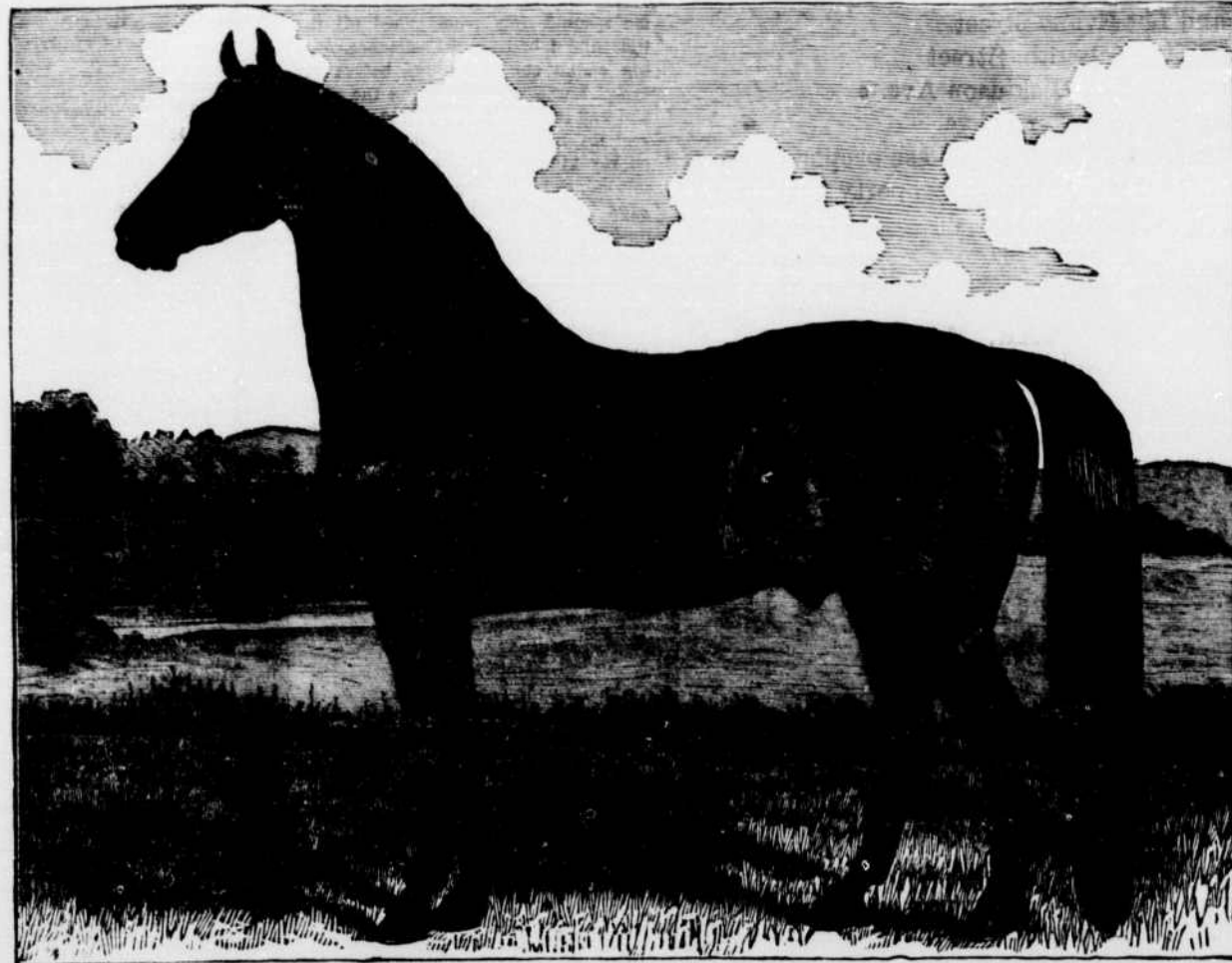

Teachers' Monthly Meetings Are to Be Held This Fall And Winter and The Teachers Are Urged to Attend Them.

A great many of the county schools opened for the fall and winter term Monday October 26. Most of the others will open on November 2 and 9. With a very few exceptions all of them will be in operation by the latter date.

The schools at Ayden, Grifton, Farmville, Fountain, Bethel, Stokes, King's Cross Roads, Brier Swamp, Quinners and Pactola have been in operation since September.

The Board of Education has fixed the first Monday in December as the date for the beginning of the four months compulsory period for children between the ages of eight and twelve. The Board invites and hopes for the earnest co-operation of the people of the County in carrying out the provisions of this State Law. Its requirements are really very lenient and the law is intended only for the benefit of the children, and through them the State at large. It is mild enough to work no hardship on any one simply requiring all children between the ages of eight and twelve to attend school four months, the period of compulsory attendance to begin on the date set by the county Board of Education. It is not intended to be a burden and no thoughtful person can consider it so after careful consideration of its provisions.

A gathering of much importance to the County will be a meeting of the school committee of the entire county which has been called for Thursday, November 5, at eleven o'clock at the court house in Greenville. School affairs of the county will be discussed and plans laid for the year's work. State Superintendent Joyner has consented to be present and with the committee and the members of the Board of Education and the County superintendent will of course be on hand. The county superintendent has sent out the following letters regarding this meeting and other school matters:

Mr. S. T. Hicks Hurt

Mr. S. T. Hicks, contractor of Plumbing and heating, met with a serious and painful accident yesterday. He had been out hunting with Mr. R. L. Johnson and on the return had reached the boat landing here. Mr. Hicks was at the stern of the boat and in the act of passing the gun to Mr. Johnson, who was in the cabin of the boat, struck the hammer against the door sill discharging it. Part of the charge took effect in Mr. Hicks' hand tearing it practically to pieces and several shot grazed his face and passed through his ear. Dr. Laughlin, house doctor, the wound it being necessary to amputate all the hand with the exception of the thumb which was saved although the muscles were injured.

It will be remembered that Mr. Hicks lost his 11 year old son last summer by drowning.

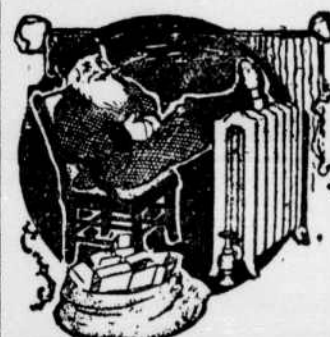

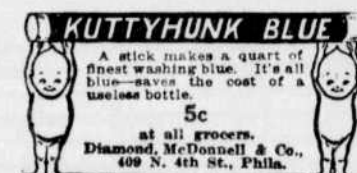
