Execution Taken to Local Churches  
Discussed Such Things in Churches  
NECESSARY IN THESE TIMES

The Idea Sought to Be Conveyed Is That the Churches Must Be Up-to-Date to Hold Their Members.

A column and a half in the Daily Reflector of Greenville Tuesday afternoon was devoted to an article in which Essie Collins Matthew expressed her regret that a swimming pool and gymnasium were to be installed in the New First Baptist church building here. Miss or Mrs. Matthew explains that she has just come from Ohio, where she has frequently seen dining-rooms, kitchens, etc., in churches. But she purports to present evidence that the installation of a pool for swimming and a gymnasium for making gymnasts of the church members are out of place. For instance, she contends, John Bunyan didn't teach the people to have such earthly things in their places of worship.

About midway the article, after she has stated that the Wesleyans of England, Baptists of Europe and Methodists of America all claim John Bunyan, she takes a dig at the way some Methodist churches of this time are conducted. Where will the churches be in fifty years? she asks. What would John Wesley think of the Methodist churches in Ohio and elsewhere with their kitchens, amusements, etc.

It would seem that Essie Collins Matthew is on the wrong tack. She isn't in Ohio at all, and might, with propriety, follow the advice of a certain backwood editor of this section: "When in Rome, be a Roman Catholic."

At any rate, it is certain that the construction of the swimming pool and gym. objected to is going right ahead as if she didn't deplore the fact at all. And besides, there is a niche in one auditorium in the church where a motion picture machine can be set up. What would Essie Collins Matthew, who can't see why churches in this day and time shouldn't be like they were before the churches had to get a hump on to keep up with modern progress, think of that?—Free Press.

**Indian Win Victory.**  
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**BIG SHIPMENT OF HALIFAX HOGS**

Scotland Neck, Dec. 9—The largest single shipment of live hogs perhaps ever sent out in Halifax county was loaded at Neal's Station on the Norfolk and Carolina Railroad Monday morning by Mr. Frank P. Shields, one of the largest farmers in this section. The shipment was two solid carloads and was consigned to a Virginia live stock concern, to be used for butchering. The hogs weighed on an average about 200 pounds each, and many of those who saw them declared it to be the finest lot of hogs they had ever seen.

Besides this large shipment Mr. Shields has a big quantity yet on his farms, which are located on Ronoake River, about five miles south of Scotland Neck.

## SHOOTING LAST NIGHT.

Will Mason shot at several times but not hit.

The negro ball, festival or what ever it is called was in full swing last night when Will Mason left and started down the steps. When he had reached the foot he encountered a strange negro known as "Big Eye" who immediately started an altercation. It rapidly progressed to a point at which guns usually appear and they appeared or rather it appeared for so far as can be learned Mason had forgotten his or did not have it. "Big Eye" opened fire on his opponent and whether he tried to see how close he could come to him and still miss, or whether he did his best to hit him, is not known; but the fact remains that a bullet perforated the vest and shirt of Mason but did not touch him. Several shots were fired none of which hit Mason except the one mentioned. The negro who did the shooting left for parts unknown and at present is still at large.

## PLAN TO REBUILD A BRIDGE

Total Loss Is Nearly Seven Million With Five Million Insurance Valuable Laboratory of Inventor Is All Saved.

W. J. Orange, N. J., Dec. 9—The bridge which was destroyed by the explosion of the dynamite at the bridge here last night, was valued at \$7,000,000. The inventor, Thomas Edison, has a valuable laboratory of inventions under the immediate supervision of the inventor, Thomas Edison. Special efforts made to save the structure were successful. It is estimated that 2,000 men and women will be temporarily thrown out of work because of the fire. In all about 1,000 persons were employed at the plant, but as the storage battery building across the street from the main plant was saved with other buildings nearby it will be possible to keep something more than half the force employed.

## EDISON WILL REBUILD.

"Although I am more than 67 years of age I'll start all over again tomorrow," said Mr. Edison. "I am pretty well burned out tonight but tomorrow there will be a rehabilitation here and the debris will be cleared away if it is cooled sufficiently, and I will go right to work to reconstruct the plant."

## TOBACCO MARKET.

The tobacco sales here this week have been very heavy. The tobacco on all the floors was sold Monday and Tuesday without a block but the sale blocked yesterday and will be blocked again today. The weather is probably the cause of this heavy sale as it has been favorable for handling it during the past week. There is also a desire to get the tobacco, as much as possible, sold before the holidays which start after next week. The prices continue very satisfactory indeed running just about where they generally are for the different grades. This week's sale will be much higher than last week's when 1,200,000 pounds

Pageant is Enjoyed by a Very Appreciative Audience and is Highly Commended by All Who Witnessed It.

Hiawatha, the Indian pageant-play presented by the Edgar Allan Poe Literary Society at East Carolina Teachers' Training School last night, was one of the most brilliant and beautiful performances ever given at the school; it was indeed an artistic performance. In spectacular pageantry were shown the daily occupations, the games, dance, soul and worship of a picturesque people. The sixty-six members of the cast were frequently on the stage at one time and the groups of warriors, squaws, youths maidens and children, each group sometimes carrying on different action, then again one group occupying the central place and the others in the background as spectators.

Just before the curtain went up the prologue was spoken, Longfellow's beautiful lines of "Gitchie Manito, the Mighty," telling his people of the great prophet he is sending to them. In the opening scene, in the early dawn the Indians, sleeping on the ground around the tents, are awakened to the notes of a tribal melody played by a flutist on the way to the lodge of his loved one. Then follow the morning occupations, the squaws preparing the meal, the old chief teaching the children to shoot, the games of the children and youths, and the games of chance, Pau-puk-kewies, wins from old lagoa a charming youth. The prayer for success in hunting was one of the most impressive scenes in the play. This is followed by symbolic dancing, scouting and shooting. At the close of the scene Hiawatha, appearing for the first time, signals for all to hear, then he tells Nokomis of Minnehaha.

The next scene is the wooing at the home of the old Arrow-maker, in the "Land of the Dakotahs." In the wedding feast scene again there is dancing, song, and feasting. Pau-puk-kewies dances the "big-gar-gar dance," Chibbaho sings a love song, the bride and groom dance, the warriors have a mock battle, the maidens give the "corn dance," and finally the scene closes with the "peace-dance" when the braves throw their weapons at the feet of Minnehaha.

The most beautiful of all the scenes is the death of Minnehaha. The snow scene, in the dim purple light was one of rare beauty. Miss Ernestine Forbes, as Minnehaha, crouching away from the ghost of Pauline and Fever, singing her death song, comforted by Nokomis, did a remarkable piece of acting, showing true artistic temperament. **FOOTBALL RESULTS**  
University of Virginia Makes Important Regulation.

Charlottesville, Va., Dec. 9.—Football at Virginia is becoming much more popular in the opinion of the faculty of that august institution which has just adopted, by an unanimous vote, a resolution to the effect that future events will not be allowed to play on any grounds except the home grounds of one of the contestants.

The one exception to the ruling is in the case of the game with the University of North Carolina, which for historical reasons and obligations will be permitted to continue in Richmond, Va., on Thanksgiving

day, until North Carolina shall have had time to complete its stadium.

**SUIT COMPROMISED**

Raleigh, Dec. 9.—Secretary Josephus Daniels will get \$12,500 in the compromise of the Wake Water company action and Tuesday of next week the big suit goes off the board. It is 16 to 23 per cent of the amount sued for, but it is regarded a fine settlement here. That Washington case which has been hanging a year had not come down when the 19th district appeals reached and the 18th has been twice passed without an agreement of the court.

It was not known in Raleigh until today that agreement outside the court was possible and the story of settlement came as a surprise to every man connected with the city administration in whose hands the water supply and service have been for more than a year. The Supreme court took this case early in 1914 from the first district, but there is no suggestion as to the cause of its delay and every week an opinion has been expected. The courts of the land have very generally held that a water company is not liable to and individual when the water supply is not adequate.
