A good illustration of the old saying that trouble never comes singly is furnished by the case of Edison, who just finishing up rebuilding from a former fire is visited by another.

A blind is sweeping over part of the mercantile world accompanied by heavy showers. Such news as this makes the people in the South glad. Misadventure is almost unknown here.

Although the people did not get just what they wanted in the way of a liquor law, the new law is a big improvement. Next time a whiskey is taken at it we hope an end of the matter will be made. It will be pretty dry and time will hang heavy on those who must have their liquor during the next two years.

An occasional outbreak of smallpox shows that the virus still a large number of people who are not vaccinated. In spite of all that has been said and written on this subject, some people still refuse to be vaccinated and become immune from this disease. But it is like this in other cases: people never think about the preventive measures until it is too late.

Judging from reports from other central countries our country is in splendid shape compared with them. Almost all the other neutrals have been forced to mobilize, or if not forced to mobilize are having great difficulty in getting food and in keeping down inflation and disorder.

The great pest of small warships which is forcing its way through the landlocked is making with fierce resistance on the part of the Turkish Empire is concentrated at this point and it is no wonder they are putting up a hard fight. And it is almost certain that the fall of Constantinople and defeat of the land forces defending it will end the war as far as Turkey is concerned.

Conditions in Mexico have again reached such a serious state that in interference on the part of the United States seems almost necessary. None of the factions in Mexico is able to control enough of the country to bring about peace. While we are strongly against war and interference in other country's affairs, we believe it will finally be necessary to take some action to bring peace to that country and from present indications it seems that it will not be very long off.

Religious census taking has been started and seems to be popular. Kingston has just finished taking such a census and we venture to say that it shows more church members in that city than were thought to be there. This census taking is a splendid plan without such, no place knows just where it stands on these matters for census taking at regular intervals shows whether a gain is being made or a loss is suffered. We would like to see such a census taken here for we believe it will help to arouse the churches to greater activity in addition to showing the exact number of church members. Such a census is very easy to take when the proper methods are used and we would like to see it started.

The recent report that an American chemist had discovered a way to produce gasoline more cheaply than it has been produced heretofore, and that he had made important discoveries relating to the dye industry is attracting much attention and exciting wide comment. If this war has caused this man to redouble his efforts to make these discoveries we hope other equally important discoveries will be made before it is all over and we can depend on Germany for a knock, and not in a strange place where it cannot do a particle of good but may do a world of harm. If you can't boost your way from home keep your mouth shut.

Harry K. Thaw is again in court. It is hard to see how he will be convicted of conspiracy if he is treated about with the lawyers and experts which he has employed there is no telling how he will come out. As long as his money lasts he will be able to get a trial or some kind of a hearing it seems.

Germany's prisoners of war are being allowed to become heavy drinkers and it is constantly getting heavier, too. If the reports are true which say they have been 20,000 prisoners this year alone. And Germany's prisoners cannot be sent to colonial possessions to be kept; they must be cared for in the country itself.

The cities in this part of the state are improving their fire lighting apparatus by the addition of motor driven trucks and other up-to-date machinery for fighting fire. The annual fire loss is very heavy and improved methods of fighting fire will reduce it very much.

How about a clean-up day for Greenville? Other cities are beginning to do such days and it is a good plan. We do not believe our city to be especially dirty but in the cleanest city in the world there is room for improvement. The Spring is the proper time to clean up and it ought to be done.

Secretary Linnah is right when he says a soldier in the navy and wearing his uniform should not read a policeman who seeks to arrest him when he is disorderly. Being an enlisted man, either in the army or navy, does not give license to violate the rights of others or to violate the law even if a number of other privileges are granted.

From the reports regarding the condition of the Balkan States and Greece it seems that all of them are on the verge of war. The best thing to give cause for war will not doubt prove state general war among them. In the event of a war between Greece and Bulgaria, our interests are being put at risk. We feel very glad we do not live there.

A Washington man is bringing out a play at a theatre because one of the chorus girls kissed him against his will. This part of the story sounds rather strange. It is usually the men who try to kiss the girls, not when we hear that the attempt to kiss the girl was made in the presence of his wife it is all very clear. He had to do it to save himself perhaps.

The trans-Atlantic liner, La Touraine, was reported to be on the middle ocean and in bad condition. A number of ships went to her assistance but the fire had been put out and the danger was passed. With all the modern improvements, both in building and equipment, sea travel is still hazardous under normal conditions and much more so under present conditions.

A large brewery located in the Northwest had hit by the prohibition laws has made arrangements to use its plant as a cranberry after the dry laws are in effect. One of the strongest arguments of the liquor people is that prohibition throws men out of employment and injures the right to own property, but so far we have not heard of any brewery or saloon man failing to find a use for his plant when he wanted to cut out the liquor.

This seems to be the day of investigations, everything must be investigated. Men, railroads and almost anything else you can name. The latest victim, we believe, is the Southern Railway which is accused of conduct worthy of investigation if those who are so anxious to investigate had to foot the bills on investigation will be hard to secure. As long as the tax payer meets the bill we will have investigations.

One of the best results of the anti-liquor law which was passed last week will be the stopping of the large amount of money which has been sent to other states for mail order shipments of liquor. We are strong on the rates at home. "Make it at home" and "buy it at home" are positions except in this one case and we refuse to urge those who use to make it at home. There are exceptions to every rule it is said.

The time to knock, if there is a time to knock, is while at home, where it may do some good. If there is reason for a knock, and not in a strange place where it cannot do a particle of good but may do a world of harm, if you can't boost your way from home keep your mouth shut.

Notorious Outlaw Is Captured by Officers As He Steps from Launch
Wilmington, March 7—Jesse P. Walker, aged 25, who was outlawed soon after his escape from jail at Southport, where he was awaiting trial for murder of Sheriff Jackson Standand of Brunswick, six years ago, and for whose capture dead or alive there was a reward of \$250, was taken in custody here this afternoon by six police and constabular officers working under direction of Justice George Harris, to whom the presence in the city of the desperado was first reported. Walker was overpowered before he could offer any resistance.

With Walker when he was captured was his brother-in-law, Frank Leonard, at whose home the murder of Sheriff Standand occurred, on the night of November 29, 1908, when a posse went to arrest Walker for store breaking. Young Leonard is mate on a government launch that tends a dredge and Walker stayed aboard the launch when it was in the hands of Sheriff Standand. Walker was ordered to leave the boat by a clever ruse engineered by Magistrate Harris. Word was got to Leonard that if they did not leave the launch, the rans of coast guard cutter Seminole, lying nearby, would be trained on her.

Prepared for Battle.
With his hands in his hip pockets the night on a 45 Colts revolver and the left on a 32 automatic blue steel Colts, apparently ready to move down anybody who should make a move to take him in custody, Walker stepped laughing from the launch accompanied by his brother-in-law. Evidently looking only for blue coats, Walker paid no attention to Officers Kelly, Jones, Coleman, George, Godwin and Lavis in plain clothes and stationed a short distance from each along the route it was known Walker would have to come in leaving the boat.

Officers closed in on him with utmost precision, two catching his arms while others threw pistols in his face and told him any resistance meant death.
Besides two revolvers, Walker had a large quantity of cartridges, a razor several knives and two store door keys of his own make. He said that love for his wife and children brought him back.

He said that he was prepared to fight, but he was not prepared to die. He was taken to the jail and will remain there until he can be sent to the State Prison.
