40,000 Troops Engaged In What Promises To Be Decisive Battle

Great Struggle Begun Between the Villa and Carranza Factions. VILLA BUILDS AIR CASTLES. Announcing What He Expects to Do Should He Defeat the Forces of Gen. Obregon South of Irapuato.

Washington, April 7.—A battle with 40,000 troops engaged which may be a decisive action in the war between the Carranza and Villa factions in Mexico, is in progress or impending near Irapuato, in the State of Guanajuato.

State Department despatches today, dated April 5th, said the fight would take place soon. That was construed to mean Villa had assembled a force strong enough to meet General Obregon's army and was moving south toward Torreon along the National Railway.

Obregon was last reported at Queretaro, and was said to have sent a column against San Luis Potosi while he protected his march with a second column and a third column under General Hill moved toward Morelia, capital of Michoacan.

Obregon is understood by officials here to have 20,000 men, it is said Villa has gathered an equal number. Irapuato is the junction of the Mexican Central and the National Railway toward which Obregon's forces are advancing.

The State Department issued this summary of the situation: "The department is informed that General Villa has announced that if he is successful in defeating the forces of General Obregon south of Irapuato he will immediately open the lines of communication to Mexico City. The department's advice indicates that should the forces of General Carranza be defeated in this expected engagement, his important strongholds will be Vera Cruz, Tampico and Matamoros."

Advices to the Carranza agency said the Carranza garrison Guerrero reached Guaymas Monday night and her commander notified foreigner to leave as he intended to open a bombardment. Mobs in Guaymas and Hermosillo, the agency statement added were looting business houses.

LITTLE NEWS FROM BATTLE IN CARPATHIANS

Russians Have Crossed First Range of Mountain in Carpathian Fight. An Attempt is Being Made to Force Germans to Give Up St. Michel. Begins Some More Ground.

London, April 7.—Carpathians in the east and hilly country between the rivers Meuse and Moselle in France continue to be scenes of sanguinary engagements but little or no news is forthcoming of the progress of the battle.

Except in Uzok Pass, where the Austrians are offering stubborn resistance, the Russian advance on assistance the Russians are said to have crossed the first range of mountains. It is asserted they are now maneuvering to get behind the Avstro German holding Uzok.

The Austrians admit the condition had. They are also fighting in Romania, but this is a secondary operation. Engagements in Northern Poland also appear unimportant.

Between the Meuse and Moselle the French are on the offensive, attempting to force the Germans to give up St. Michel. The German official reports claim all French attacks have been repulsed but a semi-official statement from Berlin says that contrary to a proarranged plan the Germans were successful in retreating from Remilly and Puy-la-Haye.

The Belgians have regained some ground they lost in Flanders, but where they have been no change in the West.

In Africa General Botha's Union of South Africa forces continue their victorious march along the railways but thus far have not overtaken the main German army.

S. A. L. Machine shops at Portsmouth is Complete Loss by Fire

Portsmouth, Va., April 7.—Fire totally destroyed the machine shop and blacksmith shop of the Seaboard Air Line Railway in this city last night, entailing a loss which will probably reach \$200,000, covered by insurance to the extent of \$250,000. How the fire had its origin could not be ascertained last night.

Shop Men Fight Fire. When the firemen arrived they found the shop force of fire fighters already engaged in combating their spread to other buildings. All hope of saving the machine and blacksmith shops and the erecting department had been given up, but a thick brick protecting wall did finally halt the progress of the flames into the erecting shed. It is well, too, that the flames were stopped by this wall, for in the shed where the fire broke out were a dozen of more valuable locomotives undergoing repairs.

The electric current connected with the shops lighting system was cut off shortly after the fire started, for fear that falling wires might injure the firemen. The failure of the current wall between the machine shop and erecting department, the fire broke out on the roof of the big structure, falling in, leaving only the side walls standing.

May Sew Work to Hallelujah. The loss of the machine shop and the blacksmith department is a severe blow to the shops, where work was already being carried forward in a curtailed schedule. It will throw possibly 200 men out of employment, and aside from that, obliterates practically the most important departments in the shop system.

Emergency repair work on the equipment of the road will have to be transferred to one of the other shops of the line probably to Raleigh.

The fact that an independent fire fighting system, with powerful pumps on the ground, had been installed at the shops added materially in containing the flames to the big structure in which they originated. The shop's system with the aid of the city firemen did effective work to that end.

Mayor Hope called at the shops during the progress of the fire, and had several assistants and men assigned to duty there at the request of Seaboard officials. They were placed on duty for the purpose of guarding against incendiarism in other departments from sparks from the machines shops, and also to clear the yard of all persons who had no business there. This was the first time assigned to them when they were placed on duty.

Aldermen Purchase Fire Motor Truck For The City of Greenville

As Result The Latter Receives Pistol Ball Through His Stomach. ONE OFFICER ALSO SHOT. Interesting Session Held at Regular Monthly Meeting. MANY IMPORTANT MATTERS.

The Board of Aldermen met last night and took up the business of their regular meeting of last week at which time they met and adjourned on account of the District Convention of Old Fellows being in session here. Several important matters were brought up and passed upon last night. The Mayor and the entire Board were present.

The first matter to be taken up by the Board was in regard to the listing of taxes by Capt. J. J. Laughinghouse. The report of the committee was called for, whereupon Capt. Laughinghouse asked to be heard. He requested that the Board rescind its former action. Mr. L. W. Tucker appeared before the Board and asked for an appropriation of \$50.00 to help defray the expenses of a dinner for the Old Soldiers at the celebration on the 11th of May. A motion to this effect was made and carried by a unanimous vote. The sum was later raised \$25.00 making the total \$75.00.

The reports of the Regular Committees were next called for. The Finance Committee filed a report and the same was adopted. The Water and Light, Ordinance, Cemetery and Market Committees had no report to make.

The report of the Purchasing Committee stated that chairs had been ordered for the Mayor's Office. The committee in its report also recommended the purchase of a desk for the Mayor's Office be renovated. A motion was made and carried as to the purchase of the chairs and the desk.
