The Allies Reap Rich Successes On Western Front. Further Successes Reported for the Austro-German Armies in Galicia.

Paris and Berlin Chronicle Little Activity in Western Theater. General von Linsingen Drives Russians Across Zlota Lipa River—England Will Allow 10,000 Bales of American Cotton to Enter Sweden.

North of Kamoniada, nearly 30 miles southeast of Lemberg, the Austrians repulsed a Russian attack which was made in great force.

Rumania to Remain Neutral. Berlin, June 29.—Foreign Minister von Jasow and Chancellor von Bethman-Hollweg arrived from Vienna, declaring that they have assurance that Rumania will remain neutral during the war.

Will Allow Cotton to Reach Sweden. Washington, June 29.—England has agreed with the Swedish Cotton Men's Association to permit 10,000 bales of American cotton to reach Sweden Monday.

War Summary. London, June 29.—General von Linsingen has driven the Russians across the Zlota Lipa river, a tributary of the Dniester, where yesterday's Petrograd dispatches stated that the Russian army would establish itself on a new line against the Austro-German advance in Galicia. At the same time the German forces have crossed into Russian territory near Tomoscow, Poland. The Russians are beginning to evacuate positions they have occupied along the lower San.

U. S. AGENTS ARE BUSY GUARDING NEUTRALITY. They Are Watching Mexican Leaders in All Parts of this Country—General Angeles, Villa's Right Hand Man, Suspected of Being Involved in Huerta Plot—Suggestions for Action for the United States to Take.

Some officials here believe the time has arrived for a definite step in Mexican affairs. Two courses are now open. One is to increase the pressure on Carranza to compel him to negotiate with Villa and the other is to eliminate Carranza personally from consideration and attempt to get together Villa and prominent men allied with other factions to hold a convention to select a candidate for president, for whom all could concentrate.

The arrest of Victoriano Huerta and Pascual Orozco at El Paso and the strict surveillance over Generals Felix Diaz, Hondragon, Blanguet and Felipe Angeles, now living in the United States, and others, is a part of the American government's policy to prevent the setting aloft of any new military movement in Mexico. Officials here feel that the revolutionary situation in Mexico ought not to be further complicated by the introduction of new elements.

Horrors of Barb Wire Entanglement Described. An Observer in the Middlesex Regiment Gives Graphic Description of How Soldiers Are Torn.

London, June 29.—They got as far as the wire. They hacked at it, tore it until their hands were raw and bleeding and their uniforms went to tatters. From their starting point right up to the wire they left a deep lane of their dead and dying 120 yards long, a sight so poignant that men coming suddenly on that bloody trail broke down and wept at the sheer pity at the undying glory of it.

A German trench, protected by two hundred yards of this terrible stuff, had been overlooked by the British artillery and charge after charge was sent against it.

First the Indians were cut up by rifle and machine gun fire from behind the deadly strands, then the Scotch rifles advanced in fruitless attack. The battalion went into action 1,000 strong and came out with 150 survivors. The men who remained alive remembered nothing afterward save tearing at the barbed wire with their hands, stamping on it, jabbing at it with their ribs.

The one officer left unscathed rallied and withdrew his men and the survivors of the Middlesex came. They sacrificed themselves in vain. Only when the British had fallen back and great shells had been fired upon the front wire patch, to lose charges of high explosives, was the difficulty over come.

"General Wink" always fights on the side of the defender, he they German or Allies. High entanglements are used to protect trenches from the bayonet charge. Stout stakes, five feet high, are fixed, planted in five and six rows, six feet apart, and twined together in intricate patterns with cross wires. Such a man-trap as this brings the attacker to a standstill in such a position that he has no shelter and is a mark for all the concentrated fire (especially that of machine guns) in the defended trench.

GERMANY TO BE INFORMED WHEN U. S. VESSELS SAIL. Washington, June 29.—The United States government has adopted the practice of notifying the German admiralty through Ambassador Gerard of the time of departure of every passenger ship sailing under the American flag and approximately the hours during which it will pass through the war zone.
