PROGRESSING BACKWARDS China has returned to the old form of government and says that she desires no longer to be a republic. The old form is monarchial.

In China we have the symbol of a worn out world empire. Honeycombed and eaten with the ruthless ages of time, when we thought she was just getting ready to get in line with the progressive nations of the world, China steps back into the old antiquated rut. Little harm will this return to a monarchy do China, however, for her days have been spent. Long before this country, or even parts of Europe began to flourish, the Chinese empire was at its crowning height and its learned heads did the world much good, but that time has come and gone. Gradually a piece here and a piece there will be taken of Chinese territory until within a few score years little will remain of the once great empire.

## THE FORD PEACE PARTY

It is consoling to note that when the resolution drawn up by the ministers on board the ship was offered to the different members to be signed, that many of them refused to affix their signatures to something condemning President Wilson. This further attests the popularity of the President, and also shows farther, as Charity and Children expressed it, that there are few brains aboard the Ford peace ship.

## DO "THEY" WANT SUFFRAGE

It is a pleasure to read such as the following from Mrs. Arthur M. Dodge, president of the Anti-Suffragist association, reviewing what the suffrage supporters have accomplished this year: "The voters have asked two questions: First, is suffrage expedient? and their common sense has led them to say 'no.' Second: Do the majority of women stand behind the demand for the vote? and the negative reply has emphatically followed the investigation of facts. It gives still greater pleasure to read the following noble resolutions coming from a source just as noble: "This association deprecates and condemns the lack of patriotism exhibited by the suffragists in uselessly annoying the President of the United States and Congress in making a sham fight which is a scandal and a reflection upon the intelligence of American womanhood."

The idea that the suffragists should annoy Congress and the President at this time when such questions of national importance are at hand by persisting in an effort to have Congress pass on suffrage would give much merit, if it were not counted as an unpatriotic move on the part of the woman suffrage supporters.

Congress has no business to meddle with woman suffrage. Let the test be derived at by the voters of the states separately and in part and not by an attempt to "rush" it over those who do not want it, by an act of Congress.

## THE SHORT SKIRT

The short skirt is a bob-tailed garment which is a lineal descendant of the Coney Island bathing suit, but has not been declared unconstitutional by the police force. Some short skirts are shorter than others, but all of them enable a man who is located two blocks away to tell that the owner's feet could be whittled down several inches without destroying the tout ensemble.

Until the last year or two the short skirt was not worn by anybody but school-girls under twelve years of age. Somebody discovered, however, that a woman fifty-seven years old could be made to assume a very bland and kittenish aspect by donning a skirt chopped off just below the knees, and coyly revealing a pair of imitation stiletts. The result is, therefore, that the streets of our villages, towns and cities are congested with feminine drumsticks, clad in high shoes and a bold, untrifled look.

The short skirt illustrates how rapidly the times do change. # ANOTHER PLOT AGAINST THE U. S. BEING UNVEILED

Said To Be Against The Neutrality of United States.

# An Arrest Is Expected Shortly In Connection With Welland Canal Attempt.

WASHINGTON, DEC. 22.—What is believed to be an entirely new plot against American neutrality has been unearthed by agents of the Department of Justice investigating the alleged conspiracy to blow up the Welland Canal.

Chief Bielski of the bureau of investigation said today that Koenig had been secured from Paul Koenig and others said to be connected with him in the alleged canal plot, which opened up another trail.

Mr. Bielski declined to indicate the nature of the alleged new conspiracy, but said arrests might be expected soon.

New York, Dec. 22.—Two Federal grand juries were investigating today the alleged plot to blow up the Welland Canal and the activities of Labor's National Peace Council in investigating strikes in war munition factories.

Federal officials here expect to arrest shortly a man whose name has not yet been mentioned in connection with the conspiracy to destroy the Welland Canal, and this will complete the government's case in this matter.

It was learned today that the conspiracy is under surveillance and will be taken into custody soon.

Frederick Metzler, who acted as Koenig's stenographer and who is declared to have already furnished the government with important information in the Welland Canal case, went before the Federal grand jury. In so doing it was understood that Metzler regained immunity from prosecution.

# RUSSIANS BEGIN OPERATIONS AGAINST BULGARS

Bombardment of Varna Has Been Commenced Vigorously.

# Germans Report Successful Attack On British Troops In The Vicinity of HULLUCK.

LONDON, DEC. 22.—Arrival of a Russian expedition off the Bulgarian coast is reported by the Athens correspondent of the Exchange Telegraph Company. He says: "A Russian cruiser and two destroyers which are conveying sixteen transports filled with troops have arrived off the Bulgarian coast, and are bombarding Varna vigorously."

The Bulgarian port of Varna is on the Black Sea a few miles south of the Rumanian border. It is a railroad terminus. This city and Burgas, fifty miles further south, are the principal Bulgarian Black Sea ports.

On several occasions since the beginning of the Teutonic drive through Serbia it has been reported that the Russians would attempt an invasion of Bulgaria from the sea, and it has been said forces were being concentrated for this purpose at Odessa.

Previous despatches reporting Russian naval demonstrations before Varna or Burgas presumably preparatory to an effort to land troops were not borne out subsequently.

LONDON, DEC. 22.—Via London.—A success against the British in an operation near Hulluck on the front in France southwest of Lille, is announced by German army headquarters in today's official statement. On the eastern front a movement by which the Russians were driven from a village before the German lines near Wladyslaw, is reported. The statement says: "Western theatre of war: "East of Hulluck a German division captured a British ship and repulsed counter-attacks made during the night. There was lively artillery action at various points along the front. Otherwise no events of importance occurred."

"Eastern theatre of war: "During the night of December 19-20, an advanced Russian division had occupied the village of Dekaschi, southeast of Wladyslaw, which is located near our front. Yesterday the Russians were driven out. South of Lake Wigonowkoi and near Cosenchewka, northeast of Czartorysk, enemy reconnoitering divisions were repulsed."
