In order that our readers may see for themselves that the proposed amendment will not discriminate against any white man who can vote as copy from the 5th section of the amendment as follows: Section 5. No male person who was, on January 1, 1867, or at any time prior thereto, entitled to vote under the laws of any State in the United States wherein he then resided, and no lineal descendant of any such person, shall be denied the right to register and vote at any election in this State by any action in this State or by any action in any other State or Territory.
