This is one of the few branches of the government service remaining unclassified, and it is destined to be one of the most important departments of the government's work. There will be no difficulty whatsoever in classifying the rural free delivery clerks in Washington and the special agents and inspectors in the field.

The difficulty comes with the rural carriers. Each of these must have his own horse and must be personally acquainted with the people living along his route. He must have their confidence, for he has authority to sell money orders and postal notes, and the average citizen will not pay his money to the carrier unless he knows him, particularly as the carrier is generally expected, after making out the note or postal order, to mail it for the purchaser. In such circumstances it will not do to select carriers by competitive examination.

The carrier, to be efficient, must live in the country wherein his route lies. Some method must be devised to insure his selection regardless of political considerations and to get the best man obtainable for the work. This is the problem which Civil Service Commissioner Foulke must solve. The President and his advisers think the extension of the merit system to this service will make it even better than it now is.

Postmaster General Charles Emory Smith is so convinced of the importance of the rural service that he has recommended to Congress that the appropriation for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1902, be \$6,250,000, an increase of \$2,750,000, and every cent of that sum will be advantageously expended. In the past four months 1,300 new free delivery routes have been established, an average of 325 a month.

On the 1st of July 1900, there were only 1,264 routes, which had been increased a year later to 1,300, or at the rate of about 250 a month. On November 1 there were 5,600 routes. Each route covers an average of 25 square miles. The population served is estimated to be 8,800,000, inhabiting 140,000 square miles of territory, the average population served on each route being 717. As a carrier is required for each route, it can be seen that with 5,600 routes Uncle Sam employs a small army in this service, which has only begun. And it is an interesting fact that the service has caused a large increase in the amount of mail in the sections covered, so while the cost is not increased much, if any, as compared to the fourth class postoffice system the revenue promises to be largely increased.

The work of organizing this great branch of the Postoffice Department has been directly in the hands of August W. Machen, of Ohio, who was first an assistant postmaster at Toledo, and then, under Mr. Cleveland's administration, was made superintendent of the free delivery service. He is a gold Democrat, and is himself under the classified service.—Washington Dispatch.
