### FOR SHUFFLING CARDS.

A card shuffling machine has been invented by R. F. Bellows of Cleveland. It should make business poor for crooked card players. The device is complicated, yet simple in its action.

The shuffling machine is a metal box about 12 inches high, 3 inches wide and 6 inches long from front to back. All the mechanism is inside. The cards are dropped in at the top and rest on a tiny shelf. Below this there are five small fingers, one on each of five thin steel blades extending across the full width of the machine. When a shutter on the front is dropped, the shelf falls and the cards drop upon the blades and are separated into five little irregular bunches by the fingers. The blades separate, and one by one cards drop from the various bunches into a receptacle at the bottom, the drop being regulated by a clock-work mechanism.

There is now a way of telling where any particular card will be found in the pack after they are shuffled. The same card, placed on the top of the pack, will rarely be found twice in the same place after the shuffle—Chicago Inter Ocean.

### Sulphuric Acid For Snake Bites.

Those who fear snakes or live where snakes are found will find comfort in the assurance of Dr. John H. Henry of Montgomery that sulphuric acid is a specific. Dr. Henry says: "The poison of animals and snakes is intensely alkaline, and sulphuric acid taken internally and injected hypodermically, diluted or pure, in the fang puncture immediately kills the poison. This discovery was made by a gentleman who says he has been bitten by snakes and insects over a hundred times. This gentleman takes delight in keeping snakes in his room running all about. Six weeks ago he was bitten in the foot by his big rattler. He immediately used hypodermically the acid, and it did not swell or give him any trouble. He says he fears no poison of animal, snake or insect bites if he has his acid with him."—New York Times.

### Fidels Without Hands.

In Atlanta a small town in Illinois, lives Frank Clawson, a fiddler whose chief bid for fame lies in the fact that he is without hands. Several years ago he was caught in a blizzard, and both hands were so badly frozen that they were amputated at the wrist. Being somewhat of a musician, and a good fiddler, he evolved a contrivance out of heavy wire which enabled him to wield the bow. The matter of fingering was more difficult, but he had a friend who trained the stump of his left hand to make the necessary shifts from one string to another and from position to position. With the fiddle held in place by his chin and knees and with the help of his fingerless arms Clawson manages to play the old time airs with nearly as much success as formerly.

State Labor Commissioner Varner has completed a summary of North Carolina newspaper statistics. He says there are eight morning dailies, with a total circulation of 22,735,193 weeklies, circulation 23,601,200, semi-weeklies, circulation 78,541,100 semi-monthlies, circulation 15,000, four quarterly, circulation 200; total 215,240 circulation 605,035, 10 dailies, 2 semi-weeklies, 177,500 circulation. He says that while ten years ago the average circulation of weeklies was only 606, it is now 1,365, and the improvement mechanical and otherwise has kept pace with this increase.

As to politics there are 145 Democratic, 11 independent Democratic, 20 Republican, 2 Populist, 31 independent papers. There are 13 Baptist, 5 Methodist, 3 Christian, 1 Protestant Episcopal, 5 Presbyterian, 11 educational, 2 holiness, 4 medical, 3 agricultural, 3 textile, 6 news, 2 industrial. Only one paper charges no subscription. It is published at Winston.

### A PROCLAMATION BY THE GOVERNOR

\$200 Reward.

Executive Department.

WHEREAS, official information has been received at this Department that at Falkland, Pitt County, N. C., on or about December 22nd, 1900, John H. Parker shot and killed Alex Little.

And Whereas, it appears that the said John H. Parker has fled the State, or so conceals himself that the ordinary process of law cannot be served upon him:

Now, therefore, I, Charles B. Aycock, Governor of the State of North Carolina, by virtue of an authority in me vested by law, do issue this my proclamation, offering a reward of two hundred dollars for the apprehension and delivery of the said John H. Parker to the Sheriff of Pitt County at the Court house in Greenville and I do enjoin all officers of the State and all good citizens to assist in bringing said criminal to justice.

Done at our City of Raleigh, the 28th day of October, in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and one, and the one hundred and twenty sixth year of our American Independence.
