WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 14.—Congress is again in session and democrats and republicans appear eager to grapple with the knotty problems with which they are confronted. The news that the Panama Canal Company's property can be bought for \$40,000,000, which by the way, bears out the prediction I made some time ago in these letters, that the prompt action of the canal committee in both the Senate and House was taken with a view to bringing the French company to reasonable terms, was extensively discussed by the members in the lobbies but it seems probable that the leaders will press for action the Hepburn bill in the House and leave to the Senate the final discussion and decision. There is an evident growing inclination, always discernible when the republicans are in control of the House, to treat the House of Representatives as a more or less irresponsible body which must be given its own way like a spoiled child and with reliance on the fact that the Senate has power to reverse all its decisions and render futile its actions.

It is announced that each applicant for the seed will be granted only sufficient for the planting of a single acre, and while no great results are to be expected next year, the 1903 crop will be considerable and the growing of Sumatra tobacco may be expected to increase rapidly in the next few years.
