The liquor dealers, having consulted a prominent attorney, have been advised by him that the State has no legal authority to exact the tax of two per cent. on purchases made outside of the State; also, that it is unlawful to collect that tax on the tax levied by the United States Government on the liquid goods in which they deal, viz., the \$1.10 on distilled liquors, etc. In other words, that the revenue tax should be deducted from the "value" of a barrel of North Carolina "corn liquor," for instance, before the amount of the State tax of two per cent, is levied and collected. 
