When General Sherman said "war is hell" he knew that war of the serial volume 79 of the Federal Record, is credited with the following order of General Sherman, sent October 29, 1864, to General Watkins: "Can't you send over about Fairmont and Adairsville, burn ten or twelve houses of known secessionists, kill a few at random and let them know that it will be repeated every time a train is fired on from Resaca to Kingston? The expression 'kill a few at random' has a fine flavor of barbarity that would do credit to an Apache. On October 19 of the same year he wrote to General Grant the details of his method of covering war into 'hell'—'I am perfecting arrangements . . . to break up the railroad . . . Dalton, including the city of Atlanta, and rush into Georgia, break up all its railroad and depots, capture its horses and negroes and make desolation everywhere.' Sherman and Sheridan have the distinction of having set the hand on the dial of civilization back two centuries and fixed a lower standard of conduct in a war than has been reached by any civilized nation since 1865.—Baltimore Sun.

Instructions to List Takers.
The North Carolina Corporation Commission, in its capacity of a State Tax Commission, has sent out instructions to the list takers in the various counties. These instructions state that all property subject to taxation must be placed on the tax list at its true value in money and value.

It has been claimed that there is a rule in North Carolina among assessors and tax listers to intentionally undervalue property, and instead of putting it on the list at its true value in money, to assess it at two thirds or three fourths of its value. This is a remarkable contention in view of the tax laws that have existed in North Carolina since the Constitution of 1868; but if such rule ever did exist, or if it exists now, it is a most important part of the freedom from daily paper sentimentalism. Week Don't at A. & A. College. Ready for 599 Students Next September.

The growth of the Agricultural and Mechanical College at Raleigh during the past year has been remarkable. 500 students have been enrolled, representing 45 states and 22 countries. The oldest was 60 years of age, the youngest 16, average 20.

Nearly \$1,000 was earned by students during the year, the largest amount was \$161.85, smallest \$16, average \$16.55. Work done was on farms, dairy, dining room, green houses, dormitories and lawns. Many students self-employment and clothing stores, some are farmers. Work is the rule of the college. Every student must learn to work must spend at least two hours a day in the carpenter shop, blacksmith shop, lathe shop, machine shop, drawing room, dairy, grocery store, electric laboratory, or try the lumbering. Nobody is paid for regular work, the pay is the work done outside of study hours.

Besides book studies and practical work in shops, laboratories, etc., the students have many outside hobbies and clubs, which amount to about one a week. Some are the Y. M. C. A., with 50 members, the Agricultural Club, with 100, the Horticultural Club, with 25, the Orange and Pineapple Club, with 15, and the Recent and Future Library Societies with 20.

The college is now erecting two large new buildings, and by next September will be ready to receive 600 students.

One of the cheapest foods that can be grown for stock, and which can be cut and used at almost any stage of growth, may be secured by sowing corn in rows (not using too much seed) and cultivating it one way. Should the pasture grass run short the young corn may be cut down daily, in sufficient quantity as required, and fed as green and succulent food, which will be highly relished by stock.—Philadelphia Record.

The following figures, just given out by the Superintendent of Public Instruction, show the amount raised and disbursed on account of the public schools of the State last year: Receipts, from poll tax, \$328,403; property, \$525,257; special local, \$15,543; special poll, \$104; fines, \$25,412; liquor license tax, \$79,288; from State Treasury (legislative appropriation) \$101,401; from other sources, \$45,984. Total, \$1,119,746. Of this amount \$1,091,276 was expended, leaving a balance of \$27,470. Of the amount paid teachers \$621,628 went to whites and \$219,561 to negroes. The county treasurers received \$22,568 of this school money in commissions.

The State has chartered, among some of Greensboro's latest manufacturing enterprises, the Greensboro Lardwood Manufacturing Company, with \$25,000 capital, Neill Blington, J. C. Bishop, and others being the incorporators. It will manufacture many articles from hard woods.
