People who come here occasionally ask what makes Greenville grow so. It just can't help growing. The people come and we have to make room for them. You can't hold down a town like this.

Mr. J. D. Boone, editor of the Waynesville Courier for eleven years, has sold his paper and will enter the ministry of the Baptist church. It is often that a preacher turns editor, but seldom that an editor turns preacher. If brother Boone makes as good a preacher as he was an editor, he will do good service in his new calling.

The educational edition of the Raleigh News and Observer, issued on the 4th inst., was another great stroke of enterprise for that splendid paper. The issue was 36 pages and showed the educational progress of the State for ten years. It was illustrated with pictures of many school buildings and colleges, portraits of prominent educators and most of the County Superintendents. The articles on education as well as the letters of Superintendents are interesting reading. It is one of the most valuable editions to the State that the News and Observer has yet issued.

After many futile efforts at peace, the Boer war in South Africa has at last been brought to a close. While it has been a bitter struggle, and both sides equally determined, the English no doubt are more glad than the Boers that the end is here. England has gained nothing by it except an acknowledgment by the Boers of King Edward—a very empty honor—while the Boers got all they asked except absolute independence. It was a costly victory.

WASHINGTON LETTER. At a meeting of the Democratic Executive Committee of the Third Judicial District of North Carolina, held at Winston on June 6th, 1902, the Judicial Committee of the Third Judicial District was called to meet at Winston, N. C., on Thursday, July 10th, 1902, at 12 o'clock m. for the purpose of nominating a Democratic candidate for Solicitor in said District.

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The measure which passed the upper chamber. The Cuban reciprocity problem is causing untold worry to the President and the republican leaders and numerous conferences have been held at the White House. The latest and most annoying complication is a substitute bill proposed by Senator Dietrich of Nebraska. The Senator's plan consists in abolishing the differential on refined sugar, adding a similar percentage to the duty on raw sugar and then allowing the Cuban planters a 25 per cent discount from the total duty. This plan would give the Cubans a 25 per cent advantage in American markets and would not increase the cost to the consumer but would curtail, to some extent, the profits of the Sugar Trust. No objection is urged against the plan except by the friends of the trust; the President approves the substitute and it offers an opportunity for the now divided factions of the republicans to get together. It remains to be seen, however, how strong the influence of the Sugar Trust is in the Senate for it is freely predicted that the Trust is too powerful in the upper chamber to permit any legislation detrimental to its monopoly.

The payments from the treasury were as follows: For papers \$174.50; County Home \$178.12; Superintendent Health \$25; Bridges and ferries \$291.85; Jail \$65.00; printing, stationery &c., \$10.75; making list of poll tax payers \$20; damage to land \$60; interest tickets \$67.75; conveying prisoners \$6.15; Clerk Superior court \$38.75; Register of Deeds \$19.50; Commissioners \$20.40; miscellaneous \$9.46; stock land territory \$38.01.

O. W. Harrington was appointed keeper of the court house and county, his duty to keep the same in good repair. J. B. Cherry, Treasurer and C. O. H. Laughinghouse, Superintendent of Health, made their monthly reports.

The Board agreed to furnish \$100 toward building a bridge at Grimsley creek in Bethel township. The following tax levy for county purposes was made for the year 1902. On each 100 valuation of real and personal property, 25 cents, on each poll 35 cents. Schedule "B" taxes same as State. One horse peddler \$30, foot peddler \$10. For stock land territory 20 cents on each \$100 valuation of real estate.

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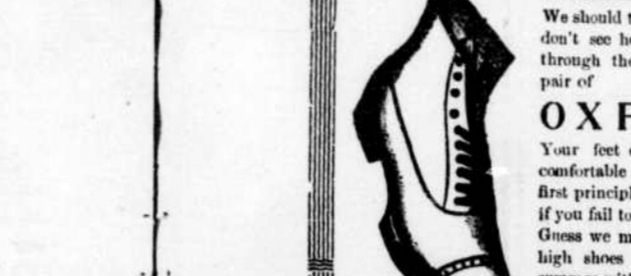
