The Government report on the condition of the cotton crop, issued Thursday, places it at 84, a falling off from 95 last month. This makes a poor outlook for cotton, taking in the whole cotton producing area.

Recently the Southern Bell Telephone Company made application to operate in Henderson. The Board of Aldermen refused to admit them on the ground that the town already had one telephone system, and two systems in the same community are undesirable and impose double tax on the people without resultant good.

That is a good suggestion made by a correspondent that the people of Greenville let what money they have paid for land and school taxes go to the hospital. They have paid these taxes not expecting at the time to get them back, and even now that the Supreme court has decided against the bonds and school bills, there is no telling when the taxes will be returned to the payers. It cost the town \$225 to collect these taxes, and a matter that has been agitating the Aldermen is how, when the time for refunding comes, it can be paid back without costing as much more. Just let every person agree to let the money go to the hospital fund and the Aldermen can order it turned over in a lump without any cost at all. In this was the whole town will contribute to the hospital in exact accordance with the ability of every person, and will not miss the money. If the people will agree to this the hospital will be built in a short while.

COUNTY CONVENTION.

First Assembly of the Campaign.

The county Democratic convention assembled at noon today to appoint delegates to the State, Congressional and Judicial conventions.

The meeting was called to order by A. L. Row, chairman of the county executive committee. Delegates for a roll call of delegates by W. L. Brown, secretary of the executive committee. H. T. King and D. J. Whigham were requested to act as assistant temporary secretaries.

After the call of delegates, the temporary organization was made permanent. As soon as the chairman announced that the convention was ready to proceed to business, a little friction arose.

R. E. Cotton moved that the convention take a recess of 10 minutes to allow the delegates to select their quota of delegates to the different conventions.

J. J. Laughlinhouse opposed the motion, declaring it an effort to prevent the adoption of resolutions instructing the delegates to vote for certain candidates.

G. T. Tyson moved to lay the Cotton motion on the table. This was carried.

T. C. Williams offered a motion to reconsider the Tyson motion, and E. G. James moved to lay the Williams motion on the table. A vote by townships was demanded, and a large majority voted to lay the matter on the table.

P. G. James presented a resolution commending Solicitor L. E. Moore and instructing the delegates to vote for him. The resolution was adopted.

J. L. Fleming offered a resolution to instruct the delegates to the state convention to cast the vote of the county for Judge Walter Clark for Chief Justice.

F. G. James moved a resolution instructing the delegates to the state convention to cast the vote of the county for Judge George H. Brown, Jr., for Associate Justice.

At the instance of some of the delegates favorable to Judge H. G. Connor, the resolution was withdrawn and a motion was made to take a vote testing the strength of Brown and Connor in the convention.

J. J. Laughlinhouse spoke in behalf of Brown and R. E. Cotton spoke for Connor. The roll of townships was called resulting as follows: Brown 113 11, Connor 29 29.

W. R. Williams presented resolutions endorsing Hon. F. G. James for Congress and instructing delegates for him. The reading of the resolution met a burst of applause. F. G. James arose and expressed his thanks for the sentiment of the resolution and the applause given it, but said he had a substitute to offer. He then requested the resolution be withdrawn and offered a resolution endorsing the course of Hon. J. H. Small for Congress and instructing that the vote of the county be cast for him. This was adopted.

W. H. Hagdale presented a resolution endorsing Prof. J. Y. Joyner for Superintendent of Public Instruction which was adopted.
