The dead is Assistant Road Master Stever and the in jured James Mitchell, a negro por ter on the train. The white man was shot through the head and died immediately. The negro was shot in the stomach and was carried to Raleigh. Four negroes were in the shooting party and three of them are in jail at Henderson. The other made his escape by jumping from the train and he is now being pursued. The trouble occurred near Middleburg, between Norlina and Henderson. Conductor Clements was trying to keep the negroes in their part of the train, when they became insulted and the shooting followed. The negroes were being
