No buyer is going to pay a high price for a surplus article, that is likely to depreciate in value for want of impossible attention. THE REFLECTOR does not believe there is a better market in the State than the Greenville market, nor a more intelligent and clever corps of buyers and warehousemen; but the facilities of any market admit only a reasonable margin above the normal volume of trade. The farmer knows this, if he will but stop to think a moment. If he has ever carried a dozen eggs to the store, or a home cured ham to the city, he has felt the law of supply and demand. Why does he disregard it?
